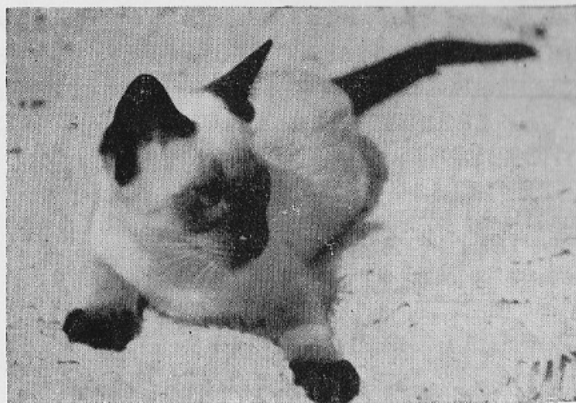

That night I could not sleep, I could only hear her howling voice and her gentle purr. I felt my tears rolling on to my pillow.

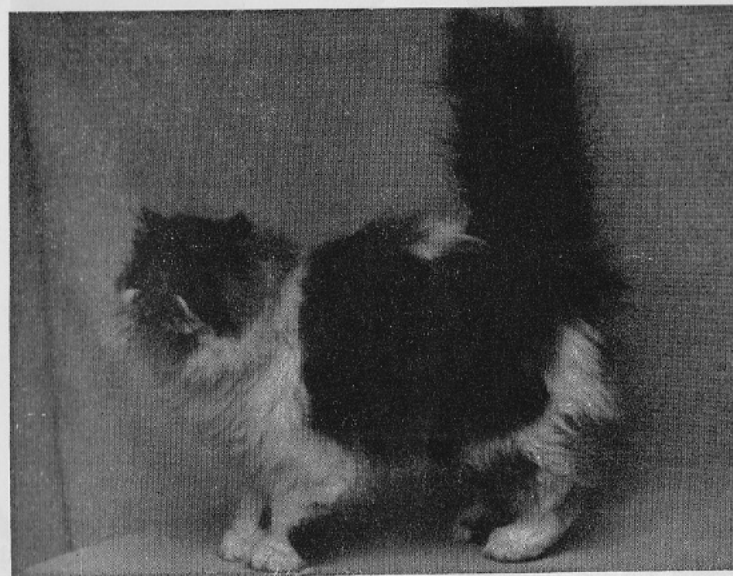
Next day my sister came with a shopping bag and told me to open it. I did. Suddenly there was silence, there was my beautiful kitten peeping out of the bag.

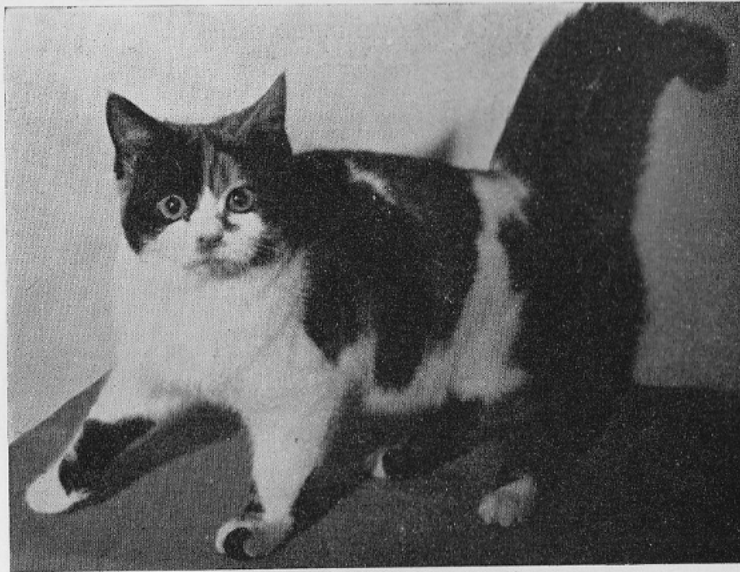


Pathfinders' Forgetmenot

**The Leading Question :** How do you breed these lovely coloured cats, as they are always females ?

There is no doubt that tortie and whites are among some of the oldest British cats that have lived and worked on farms. Here they have lived in communities and led natural lives, breeding and reproducing colours that are involved :—tortoiseshells; red and whites; black and whites; reds; blacks and odd tabbies. On looking through Show Catalogues, odd tortie and whites have been shown both long- and short-hairs, since shows were started. Usually they have no known ancestry. So we know that they have arrived by mistake, not been planned.

About 15 years ago, when I turned my mind to tortie and whites, after having shown Blue, Cream and White Persians, I knew that they were my real love. I had always had some running free and enjoying life generally, then I decided that I would produce a strain and aim to bring the standard, if possible, to a top Show Cat. I selected the Queens carrying the most desirable characteristics and of course I knew a lot about their ancestry as they had been part of Pathfinders since I had taken up residence here. I proceeded to use top sires of Persians to establish type, which is so essential. I certainly improved the conformation and points required in the Show Persian, but while this was taking place very few Tortie and Whites were bred. The first good one was Champion Pathfinders Mayflower who was the most important step in the ladder. From her I had the lovely Ch. Pathfinders Rosebud and Pathfinders Trail, outstanding sire of these lovely Tri-coloured cats. There was no doubt that the Bi-colour male was the answer to breeding Tortie and Whites, but there must also be in the pedigree as many as possible queens carrying Tortie and White. The Bi-colour has now been recognised and granted Championship status. It can be

bred to reproduce Bi-colours with careful selection of pedigrees and also there is no reason why the Tortie and White cannot be bred as in other breeds. The problem is solved. **Bi-colour males bred through Tortie and White are the male of this eye-catching cat.**

Since these early days there have been numerous Champions bred from good pedigrees carrying Top Champion males, blacks, blues and whites in the background. A great success is Pathfinders Forget-me-not, considered the best Long-Hair Tortie and White ever seen and as near perfect as one can hope to get. (See illustration page 5.)

She has the desired lovely broad strong head, short nose, strong chin, small ears, good orange eyes, good short Persian body, bone and tail and has well marked front legs. She is brightly patched; it is essential that the coat is patched and not mingled. When studying her pedigree, there is a great likeness to Champion Pathfinders Posy, another top queen, and Forget-me-not is line-bred back many times to the famous Champion Pathfinders Mayflower. The present males bred through these lines should continue to establish the Tortie and White breed as proof that they can be bred with success and correct pedigrees. This applies to the Persian and also to the short-haired variety on the same principal.

Short-Haired variety have many admirers because their clear cut patching shows up to advantage.

Many difficulties have been met establishing a strain, as the British Short-Hair cats are not numerous at all, and the same principles have been used to improve type, hoping to keep the colour.

I commenced establishing a Short-Haired strain four years after the Long-Hairs and to get away from the "Form Cat" I used my Long-Haired males in early matings, which did improve type, but at this period of pedigree it should not be necessary to go out of the Short-Haired variety.

I have bred 17 Champion Long-Haired Tortie and Whites and 11 Short-Haired variety plus others that have become Champions abroad.

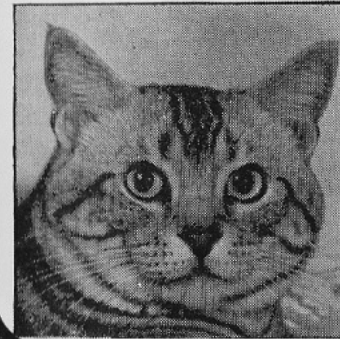

#### STANDARD OF POINTS FOR SHORT-HAIR BI-COLOURS

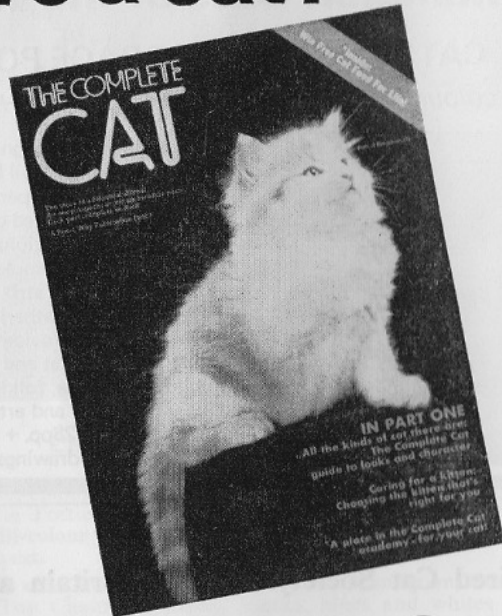
##### Points

25. Any solid colour and white; the patches of colour to be clear and evenly distributed. Not more than two-thirds of the cat's coat to be coloured and not more than one-half to be white. Face to be patched with colour (and white; blaze desirable) omitted from L.H.
15. Coat and Condition : coat to be short and fine in texture. Body hard and muscular, giving a general appearance of activity.
25. Head : round and broad, width between ears, which should be small and well placed. Short nose, full cheeks, wide muzzle and firm chin (level bite).
15. Body and legs : cobby with short straight legs.
15. Eyes : large and round set well apart, deep orange, yellow or copper in colour.
5. Tail : short and thick.

**Faults :** Tabby markings, long tail, green eyes and brindling within the patching.

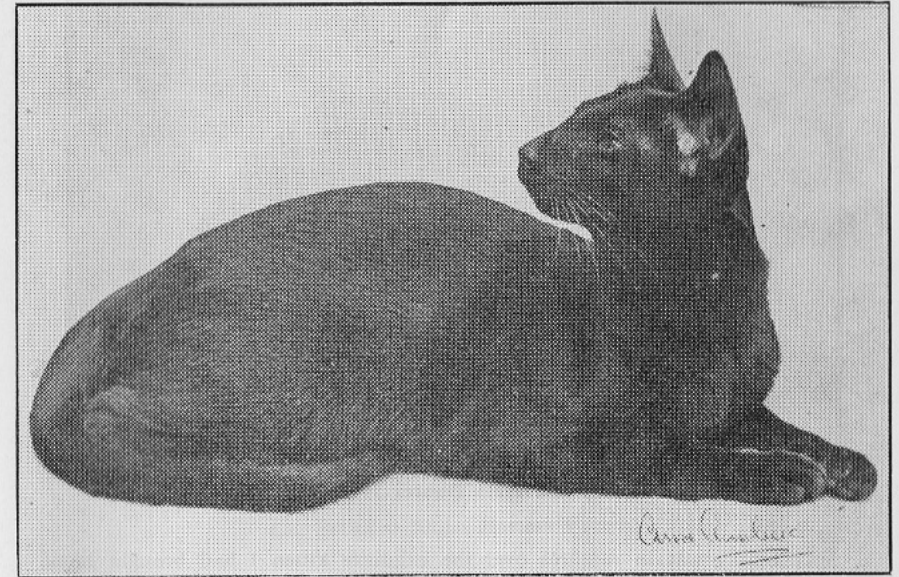

## THE SOLITAIRE CATTERY'S HAVANA BROWN CATS

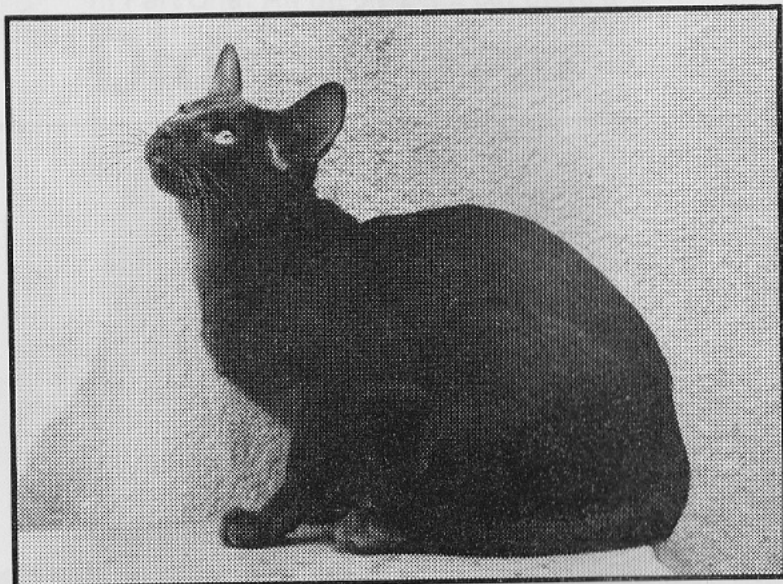

It was in 1960, when I and my family lived in South London that I first met the Baroness von Ullman, who lived on a barge, and was introduced to her famous "Roofspringer" Havana cats. She had been constructive in the pioneering and development of this attractive self-chocolate Siamese, making the original crosses between chocolate-point Siamese and plain black "alley" cats of foreign type. Together with Mrs. Armitage Hargreaves and Mrs. Elsie Fisher, a group was formed and worked together, achieving recognition for the breed by the G.C.C.F. in 1956, when these lovely cats were encumbered with the name Chestnut Brown (Foreign) Short-Hairs. I had just made up my third Siamese Champion, and for me, at that time Siamese were the only cats; however, I was greatly impressed by the Havanas' gleaming brown coats and appearance of glowing health, and determined to buy a female kitten as soon as I found one with the type and bone structure of my Siamese. Alas, the few kittens I saw on the show bench were not of the type I desired and I felt that I would never have an Havana of my own.

### First Female

Nine years passed, and then, at the Croydon Cat Club Show, 1969, I saw her. She was long and skinny—all legs, tail, nose and voice. She had large bat ears and was determinedly reaching through the bars of her show pen, trying to grab everyone within reach. I came, I saw, SHE conquered. Her owner and breeder agreed to sell her and I bought her, or I should say, I paid a cheque and allowed her to take me over! The Goddess Bast was certainly hard at work that day, for I had just returned from a trip to Hawaii and was full of impressions of those wonderful islands, and this little brown bundle of mischief was named **Dandycat Hula Dancer**.

My family was in raptures over the exquisite kitten I had brought home from the show and thought what a bargain she had been—until the following morning, when we discovered that the booms in the night had been caused by a game of pirates, resulting in all the antique cut-glass decanters on the top of the highest kitchen units being knocked down and smashed. Hula decided that her best policy was to become the favourite of my husband Mike, which she accomplished by spending long hours sitting on his chest and gazing hypnotically at him from her bewitching green eyes, and after methodically breaking every movable china and glass object downstairs, settled down to become THE PERFECT CAT.

Having great artistic flair, Hula always chooses the burnt orange carpet in the sitting room for reclining to impress visitors, the deep, bright colour offsets her mahogany coat to perfection. Her ability to open every door in the house, from either side, ensure that she is able to become pregnant the moment her previous litter is off her paws, and she is a prolific as well as persistent brood queen; her six litters to date consisting of a total of 32 kittens, all strong and healthy and of good type. Hula is retired from the show scene, having quickly achieved Championship status, winning a total of five Challenge Certificates.

#### Two Males Acquired

Being captivated by Hula's Havana charm, I bought two males, the first, Florentine M'Bele, was an outcross for Hula, and quickly became a Champion, winning four C.C.s. Hula's half-brother, Dandycat Zulu Warrior who had a phenomenal first show season having three Best in Show awards and his three C.C.s to make him a Champion, then going on to the National, 1970, where he won a Grand Challenge Certificate in the Champion of Champions class, and achieved Best in Show. One leading judge nominated Zulu as her choice for Short-Haired Cat of the Year ("Cat Lover's Journal", 1971/72) and he is a truly magnificent specimen of his breed.

#### The Kittens

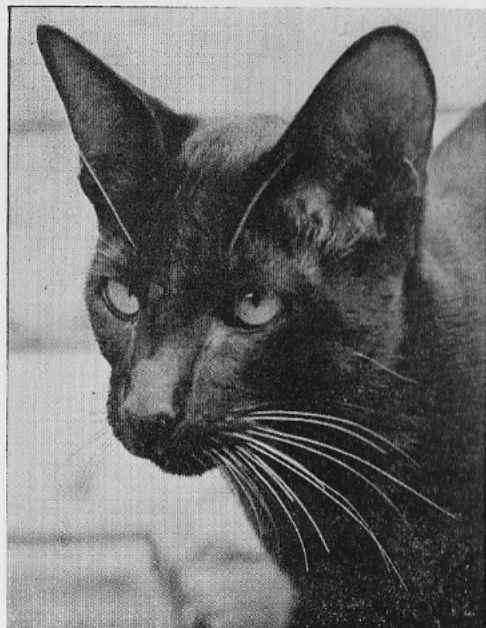
Hula Dancer's kittens have been very successful so far, in show competition. Her first litter produced **Champion Solitaire Aloha**, Havana female, and two outstanding typy Foreign Lavenders, **Archil** and **Amethyst**. Her second litter sired by my chocolate-point stud, **Hazelwood Apollo** produced four lovely chocolate-points and two Havana females, my own **Champion Solitaire Pikake** and **Pinaster**, exported to Germany. Hula's third litter was sired by Zulu, and the two females were very beautiful. **Kaiulani** did well at her only show, the K.K. & N.C.C. 1971, winning her Open and a huge novice class and being nominated for Best in Show. She has a beautiful litter at present and may be debuting as an adult next season. Her sister **Kamamalu** is on breeding terms with Ann Imlach, and has just achieved Championship status. Hula's fourth litter of four Havanas, again sired by Apollo were very even and sound. All four won open kitten classes and received Best in Show nominations at different shows. One female was exported to the U.S.A. and the other, **Tiare Tahiti** has been retained for breeding. Tiare was Best in Show as a kitten at the Coventry and Leicester Show in February, and won her first C.C. and a Best in Show nomination at the age of nine months and one day, Croydon Cat Club Show, March, 1972.

With these excellent queens, I have formulated my breeding plans for the next three generations, and hope to remain in the final selections at the top shows of the Seventies.

#### M'Bele Lost, But Son Carries On

M'Bele suffered from gingivitis, and despite specialist treatment, his throat became very infected and he was submitted to three operations. Unfortunately, no improvement was achieved, and the condition became diphtheroid, so he was

regretfully put to sleep. His life however, was not in vain, for his son **Solitaire Maneki Neko**, from my chocolate-point queen **Garnet**, has been my most successful winning Havana to date. Born on New Year's Day 1971, Maneki was twice Best in Show as a kitten, at the Three Counties C.C. and at the Herts. and Middlesex C.C. He has won seven consecutive Challenge Certificates under seven different judges, 61 first prizes and 63 rosettes and specials.

His first kittens, just born, look of equal type and promise, and will make their show entrance at this year's Kensington Show in July, 1972.

#### **Hawaiian Names**

I am often asked where I find the names for my Havana cats. They are all named in Hawaiian and are pronounced as written, but broken down into short syllables. There are only seven consonants in the Hawaiian alphabet, and the usual five vowels. "K" is used a lot, giving the words a soft and attractive clicking sound.

Alo-Ha was an apt choice for my first home-bred Havana, as it is the first word one hears upon landing at Oahu Airport in the Hawaiian Isles. Pi-Ka-Ke is the Hawaiian wedding flower, a tropical jasmine. Ka-i-u-lani and Kama-ma-lu are two sister princesses, gay and extrovert. Tiare Tahiti is the Hawaiian flower of love—a tuber-rose. Maneki Neko is the Hawaiian God of wealth and happiness.

#### **Havana Breed No. 29**

Havana cats were re-named in 1970 with their original title, and are gaining in popularity. Best in show wins are always good for boosting a breed and the improvement in type has given the lovely browns an added exotic appearance. I have found that many people wanting a Siamese kitten have been so attracted by the Havanas, that they have added their names to the waiting list for kittens. I always point out, however, that if they want a fireside cat only, the Havana is not for them. Havanas need lots of exercise, a well-balanced diet and plenty of affection and companionship. If left alone too long they became morose and introverted, and would-be owners who work should only have an Havana if another pet is kept as a companion.

#### **Good Health the Secret**

I am often asked the secret of my grooming techniques to get the chestnut gloss on the coats of my show cats. The answer is that I do not have one. The main essential in producing any cat to top show condition is to feed a correct and well-balanced diet, which may well vary from cat to cat. A ruthless eradication of all parasites and disease from the cattery is essential, and breeding from healthy stock, a must. All the cats at Solitaire are treated alike, except the stud males, which are not allowed indoors. They all have plenty of fresh air and running and climbing exercise. Their diets are carefully calculated for weight and content and all young stock is checked and weighed regularly to ensure correct and satisfactory development.

Very strict attention to hygiene prevents diarrhoea problems and worm infestation, and a careful routine in the cat houses ensures that we never see a flea. All the cats have warm beds but are not allowed to become used to very high temperatures as they would then notice the cold at Winter cat shows. They are combed through and buffed up with a pad of cotton wool every day and once a week they have their ears and teeth checked and cleaned if necessary, and indoor cats have the points of their claws shortened and smoothed with an emery board. I endeavour to keep all my cats in show condition at all times, which entails quite a lot of time and effort, but certainly pays dividends. All my cats are vaccinated against *Escherichia Coli* and *Feline Panleukopaenia* and regularly boosted. Show cats are isolated for three days after each show, and usually all the cats being shown are kept together in a large outside house and watched constantly for any sign of infection. After a show they are given extra rations and a concentrated vitamin supplement for three days to help ward off any infection that they might have contacted.

With my foundation stock well established and proven, I shall endeavour to keep the flag flying for the Havana breed and to ensure that this glorious variety is publicised and popularised through the world of show cats.

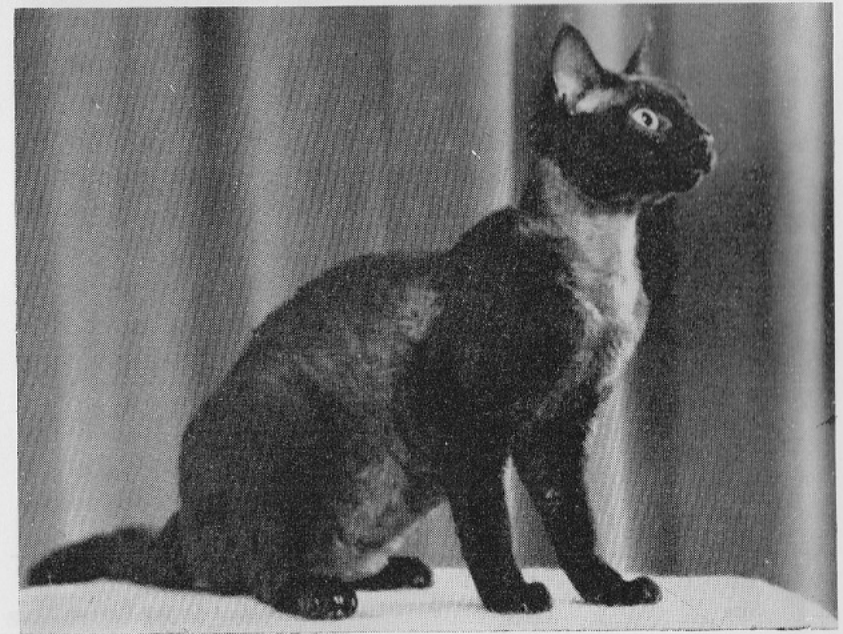

## REX CATS

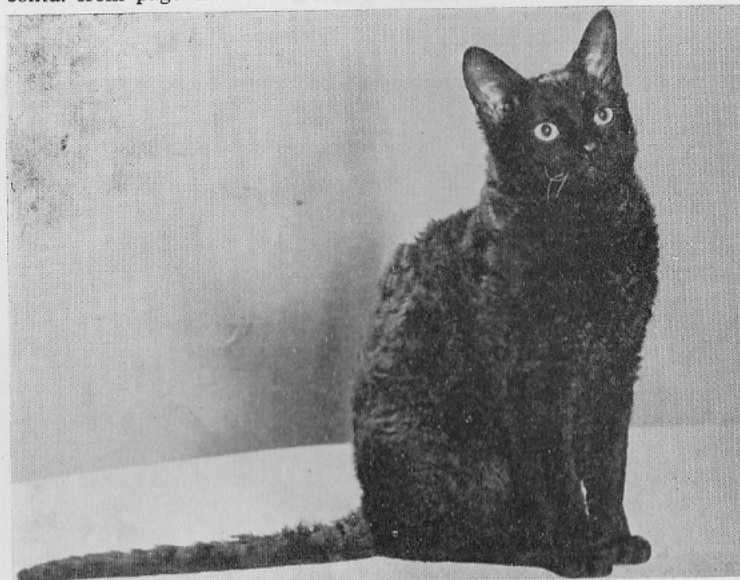
Wavy hair having been found in the coat of *FELIS DOMESTICUS*, the fur of any cat can be rexed. It seems probable that the gene for waved fur has been present in the cat for a very long time; on both sides of the Atlantic there are records and mentions of cats that had coats that were wavy in whole or in part, for instance the Karakul cat in the U.S.A., and this appears to indicate that the character has been in existence for an unknown and unlimited amount of time. However, we must not assume that this is true, for eminent geneticists have expressed the opinion that rex in the cat is a **new** mutation.

In any case, now that this character is present and recognised in the world of fancy cats, it is not difficult for the fancier to breed it into any variety of *FELIS CATUS*. From the moment rex fur was found, the breeder could decide what should be the type assigned to cats officially recognised as rex-coated, and able to be entered at cat shows. In fact, rex has been introduced into Siamese and, in Australia, into Manx.

### Genetics

Dr. A. G. Searle and the late A. C. Jude, who discovered the first Cornish rex cats, which had been recognised for what they were by their owner, Mrs. Ennismore, concerned themselves with, among other aspects of this character, analyses of individual hairs from a rex cat, and gave a detailed description of their findings in the "Journal of Genetics" in 1956. And Mr. Roy Robinson has done much careful work along the same lines. From the geneticist we know that rex-coated cats have no guard hairs; that Cornish and Devon rex coats are produced by different genes at different loci so that mated together they will produce only kittens with normal short-hair fur—and with, of course, rex fur in the F<sub>2</sub>; and that Cornish X Cornish and Devon X Devon will have only rex kittens.

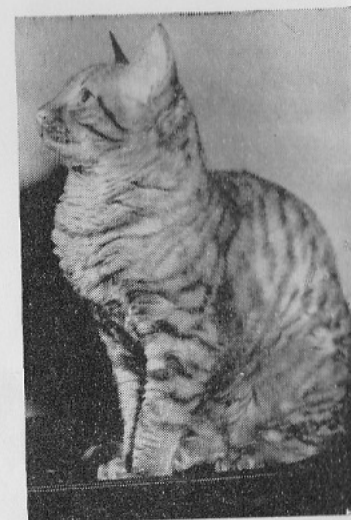
**Type**

From breeding records both in Britain and in America we can know that different varieties of rex have been interbred, so that a knowledge of pedigrees is required in order to find, for example, a line that is "pure" for Cornish or for Devon—or for German rex, for that matter. But the type of the Show rex cat in Britain is immediately recognisable: the good show Cornish has a head which is of the modified foreign kind—a medium wedge with ears a-top; the head of the Devon has ears set low, round cheeks, whisker-break and nose-stop—a most unusual face and head. In appraising the cats, however, it is of prime importance to realise that the type was decided upon in committee. True, the original Devon, Kirlee, and the original Cornish, Kallibunker, were guides for the type decided upon; but those who drew up the standards were not bound to choose the particular type now demanded for a rex-coated show cat. They could have determined that the type be British, or Siamese—or of any contours proper to FELIS DOMESTICUS.

As things are, a judge's duty is, as always, to judge to the standard. He may even not agree with it—may have sat on the Committee which formulated it and been out voted upon some point or other; in such a case he will either refuse the engagement or judge to the standard approved by the Governing Council. Therefore, it behoves the exhibitor to show a cat who approximates to that standard, for otherwise, his entry cannot expect to win. And in the case of rex-coated cats, it is advisable to show individuals whose type conforms with that asked for in the standard; if the judge knows the breed and sees an exhibit entered as a Devon but with no nose-stop or with ears high upon the head, he will think to himself: "There must be Cornish ancestry in this cat". And he will no doubt be right, for inter-breeding has taken place on a considerable scale. In addition, a good judge of rex cats will be looking for other characters besides the approved type; he must consider colour and, in Britain, white in a rex coat is frowned upon unless it be absolutely symmetrical; in America, all colours, as in Manx, are allowed for rex: after all, there was white in the coat of Kallibunker, and the first (provisional) British standard asked for exactly that: all colours permitted, as in Manx. The judge also, and above all, will be looking at the coat.

Fifty marks are allotted for coat in the standard for Cornish; only 45 for Devons since their breeders wished to give an extra five for the unusual head-type. The 50 marks are the measure of the importance of the coat: rex exist as a fancy breed because they have wavy coats. They have been fostered by breeds **only** because of the unusual quality of their fur. Without this character they would not have been noticed by their original owner, nor have attracted the attention of scientists and fanciers. Even the unusual shape of the head of Kirlee, the first Devon, would have gone unobserved if his fur had not been wavy.

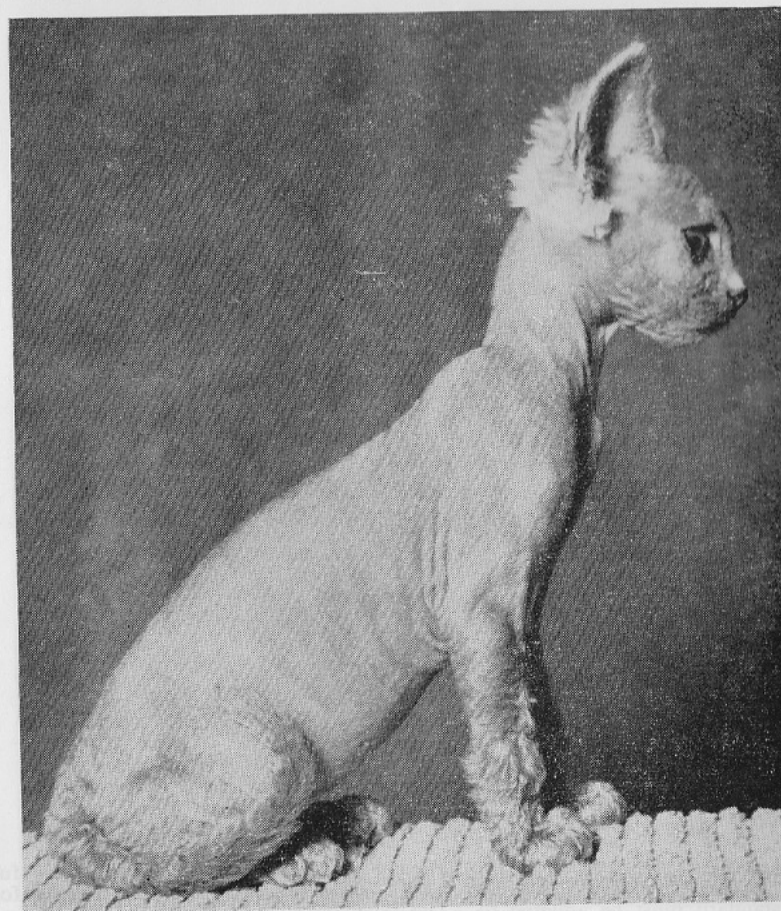

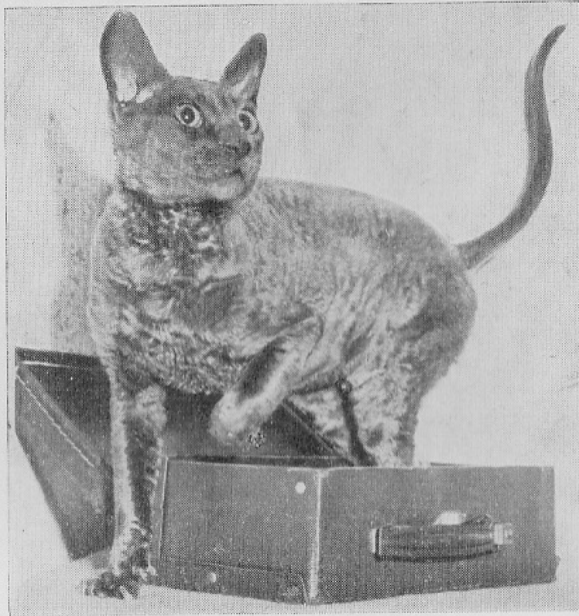
### Hairless Cats

It has been found that there are no guard-hairs present in a rex coat, but only down-hairs. In Devons there is present a gene h for hairless, so that some of these cats have had and even still have bareness of neck and underparts; but this factor, to go by exhibits recently to be seen at shows, is in process of being eliminated—partly by selective breeding and to a considerable extent by out-breeding, as evidenced by the introduction of long-hair Smoke.

### Wavy Coats

In Cornish rex and, very often nowadays, in that of Devons also, the fur is deeply waved, and covers the cat entirely: exhibits have been shown with waves covering even their paws, like little mittens. In addition, a good rex has fur which grows very thickly; in the early days it was said that rex cats were so thinly-covered that they needed small knitted coats to wear out-of-doors, and this was, at the time, true of the Devons. It is not often so today; I have a Cornish rex queen nearly eight years old whose fur grows so thickly that it is hard to find the skin.

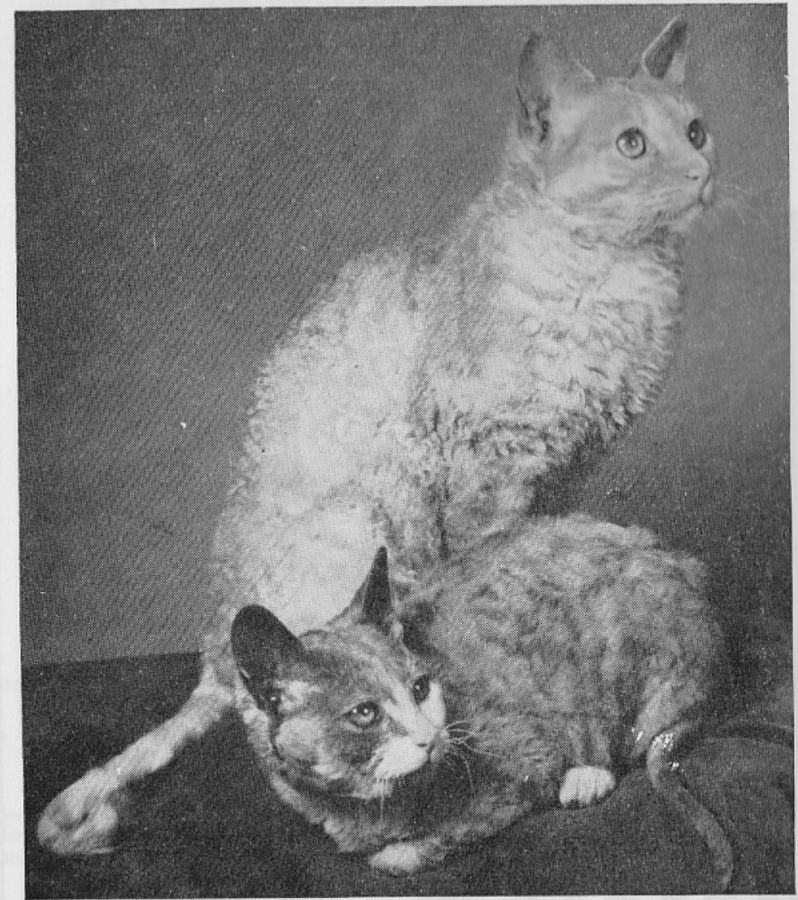

People are, today, inclined to associate the selected type with the wavy fur and, indeed, in appraising the cats from a show point-of-view, this is right, for the standard must be adhered to. The type, however, of the first rex to come to the attention of the fancy had nothing to do with their coats; and we must beware of attaching too much importance to type and too little to coat in these cats; to think, for example, of an exhibit with type exactly conforming to the standard as being necessarily in the running for championship honours is a mistake. It will not do to forget that such a cat must, if he has straight fur, lose fifty marks at a stroke.

The hairs in the prelage of a rex cat are wavy because they are all down hairs, curved, and with each individual hair thin by comparison with guard or awn hairs; short, but by the action of the gene controlling the mutation concerned, able to grow very thickly for the very fact that the guard hairs are absent. Every Fancier will surely agree that the great beauty of a thick, deeply-deeply-waved feline coat is such that it ought by every means to be cared-for and preserved.

now in Canada**

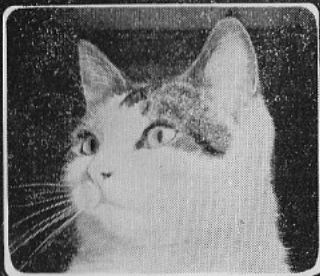

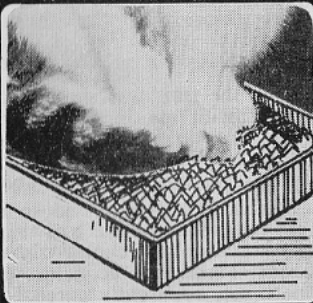

It is difficult to find homes for such as these so they will probably end their days on the boat, but they seem to look forward to the prospect.

When I first entered the KAT BOOT three or four cats leaped straight at me. An unnerving experience for any but a devoted cat lover. They were only clamouring for affection; after all, there are not many laps to go round and after a few minutes fussing they were quite happy to make way for the next cat to have his share of petting. A big spotted tabby with markings like a leopard completely stole my heart. He could not have been very old and was engaged in a spot of wrestling with a black and white job. Both of them seemed to be enjoying the exercise. What a magnificent creature he was and so full of fun! I wanted to go out and rent a house immediately and take him out

Moreover, even if I caught them, I couldn't keep them caged because they could squeeze between the bars. So I let them run free.

A week later there was a thunderstorm late at night. I wandered downstairs to find my motherly Soda Cat struggling to carry Scylla in through the cat door. She deposited the catkin at my feet and went off to return with a second soggy moggie. Then she sat watching me dry them on the kitchen table. (That's the trouble with Soda—she's got a 'little mother of all living' complex!)

From that time on, Scylla and Charybdis joined the family. They were driven down to the vet for their enteritis injections and a check-up on ears, etc.—one of them had the worst case of ear mite I've ever seen. They got into every kind of mischief. They feasted on my goldfish and scattered my papers to the winds. They climbed up my velvet curtains and launched themselves at the Woolworth chandeliers. They broke plates and cups and vases with a splendid impartiality and they made their bed in a hideous Spanish shawl and fortunately tore it into little pieces.

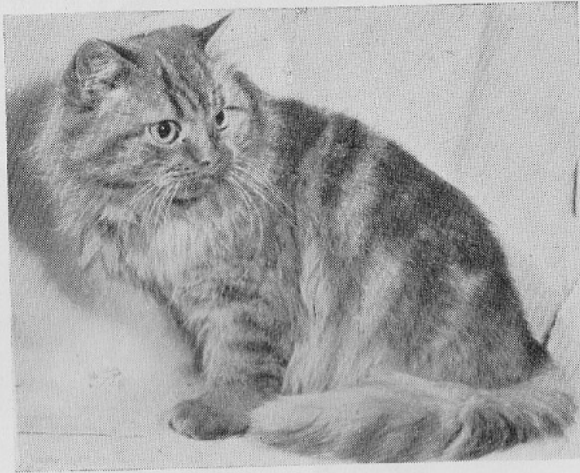

gradually acclimatised to Club Life. None looked frightened either in the flat or in the boat and I would imagine that newcomers would soon settle down and enjoy the life.

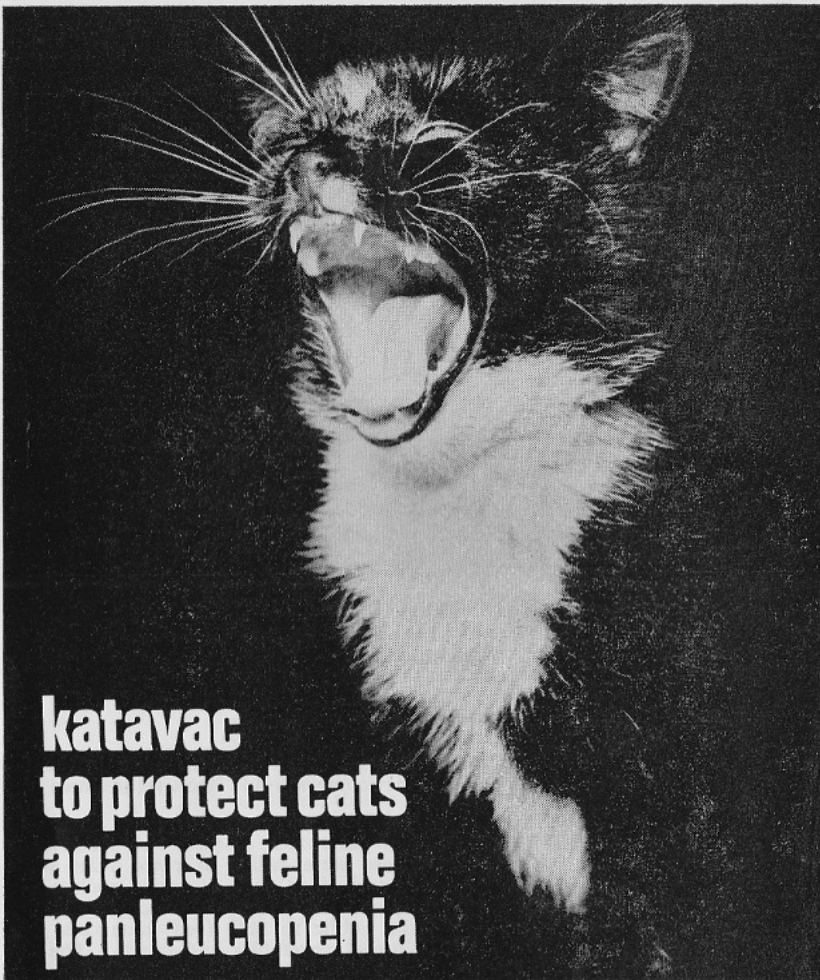
**Pedigree Cats on Board:** During the 15 years, four Siamese and six Persians had passed through the boat's care. These were easier to place than some. Approximately 500 per year have to be put to sleep as they are in such a dire state when they come in due to being maltreated. Mevr. van Weelde does her best, but she relies on donations from the public to help feed these cats, who live on cooked fish, raw lamb, vitamins, bread, vegetables and salads. The Kat Boot daily consumes 50 pounds of fish, 15 loaves of bread and 25 pounds of lamb!—and there is no State Subsidy. Three people help with the feeding and newspaper is used in the litter trays. An interesting fact was that there was no smell whatsoever on the boat. All was fresh and sweet smelling.

If you can spare a thought or a pound or two for these cats, I am sure Mevr. van Weelde would be delighted to hear from you. Her address is:—

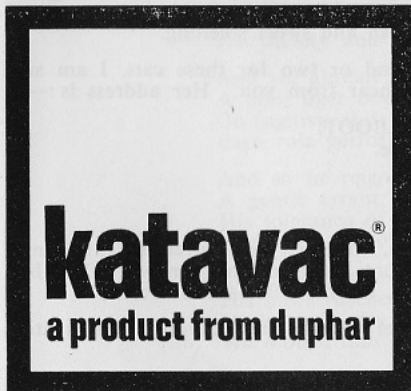

## HANDREARING KITTENS

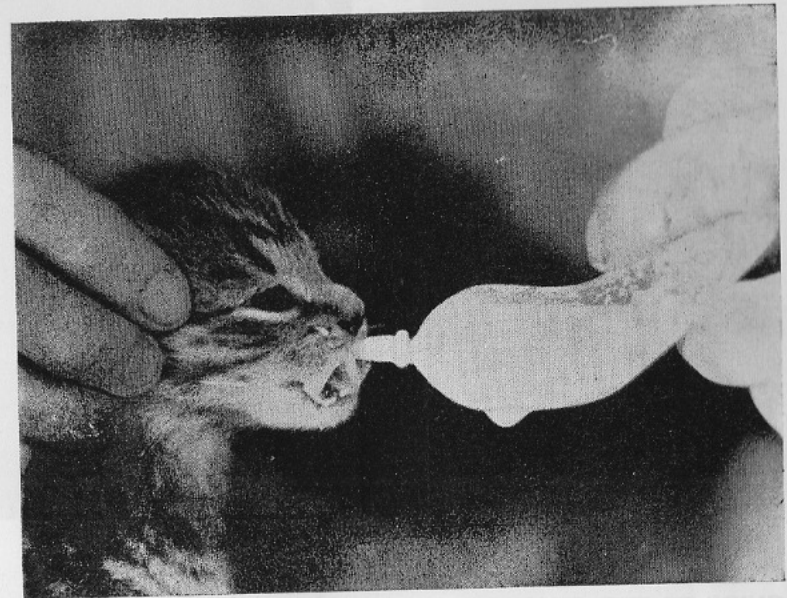

We are all faced at sometime or other with the problem of handrearing; where queens develop mastitis or where she has such a large litter that she cannot cope alone.

The following is intended as a guide to successful handrearing. No two kittens are the same, some will be far hungrier than others and will therefore need a stronger feed, some will be the "little and often" type, etc. It is up to each breeder to assess during the first few days the individual needs of each kitten and adjust the following chart to suit.

I have now handreared many litters of kittens, some litters presented numerous problems such as early teething, constipation, diarrhoea, loss of fur, colds, flu. I have tried to cover all of these points in the following text, however, if you experience a recurring problem not mentioned then I shall be glad to receive details and will try to help.

Several items will be required when handrearing. i.e., Foster Feeding Bottle, obtainable from Cat Accessories of Bedford or from any Cat Show; Ostermilk No. 2 which contains a measuring scoop; Farlene or Farex Baby cereal; Evaporated Milk; Cotton Wool; Teats.

### FEEDING CHART

**A GUIDE TO THE QUANTITY EACH KITTEN SHOULD CONSUME AT EACH FEED TIME**

- One week             $\frac{1}{4}$  to  $\frac{1}{2}$  bottle every 2½ hours.
- Two weeks         $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 bottle every 3 hours.
- Three weeks      1 to 2 bottles every 3/4 hours alternately.
- Four weeks       2 to 3 bottles every 4 hours during the day, every 6 hours during the night.
- Five weeks       3 bottles plus small dish of Farlene every 4 hours. However, kittens vary and in most cases they will be lapping and eating solid food from the fourth week onwards.

If all the kittens in a litter are strong and healthy it will be possible to strengthen the midnight feed considerably towards the end of the third week enabling the kittens to go six/seven hours before needing another feed. However, it is important that this not be attempted if there are any weak kittens in the litter that only consume a small quantity of food at each sitting. Keeping to a regular feeding time table is also important, and all feeds should be served at 101° F. approximately. If feed is given too hot or too cold a kitten will often start to refuse its feed.

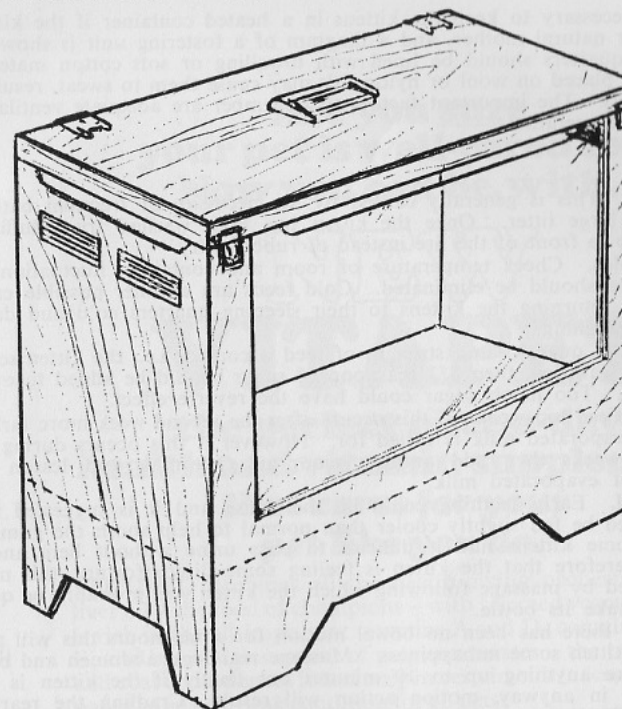
**METHOD OF REARING**

It is necessary to try and duplicate the role of the Mother. You will know that a natural mother frequently licks her kittens as well as giving frequent feeds. This serves two important purposes, firstly the licking action stimulates circulation, secondly it assists with bowel movement and the passing of urine. The method of rearing is therefore to give each kitten in turn half of the stated feed, and then to work through the litter top and tailing, i.e., sponging the kittens head, tummy, hindquarters, etc., with warm water—this aids digestion, bowel movement and circulation. When all kittens have been dealt with in this way, the remainder of the feed can be given, working in strict rotation. Before placing the kittens back into their sleeping quarters gently massage the lower abdomen

The box is made of 3/8" WBP plywood with plastic ventilators and additional anti-condensation ventilation slots on all four sides. Heat provided by the use of a low powered electric bulb mounted in an angled bulb holder. A dark red bulb as used in electric convector heaters is suggested as the light is not quite so stark as white.

parts so that all urine accumulated during the last part of the feed is expressed; kittens will often start to whimper if this is not done. Bowel movement should take place at every other feed.

For the first few days topping and tailing is all that is necessary, however, after the fourth or fifth day it will become necessary to bath the kittens fully every 24/48 hours, depending on the number of kittens being reared. The larger the litter the dirtier the kittens become, for obvious reasons. Bathing is best carried out in front of a fire, away from draughts. The kittens will need to be bathed in very warm water if chills are to be avoided. If the kittens are very dirty then you will need to cradle them in the water sponging with cotton wool from head to tail, particular attention being paid to the tummy area and rear legs as this is the area where most bowel dirt will accumulate. The kittens should be thoroughly dried before being returned to their sleeping quarters. If the kittens are long-haired it helps to run a comb through the fur to remove knots and tangles. Once dried hold in front of the fire for a little while—not too close—to ensure that the kitten is warm all over, as kittens generate very little heat and once cold find it almost impossible to regain their body requirements, in this respect. I have found it best to dry the kittens off in a warm towel as towelling absorbs the moisture very quickly.

## SLEEPING QUARTERS

It will be necessary to keep the kittens in a heated container if the kittens are without their natural mother, and a diagram of a fostering unit is shown in Figure 3. The quarters should be lined with towelling or soft cotton material: if the kittens are placed on wool or nylon this may cause them to sweat, resulting in chills and colds. The important factors to remember are adequate ventilation and a constant temperature.

## PROBLEMS

- (a) **Loss of Fur.** This is generally caused by the necessity of frequent bathing due to a large litter. Once the kitten has been washed try "fluffing" them/it up in front of the fire instead of rubbing dry.
- (b) **Chills & Colds.** Check temperature of room and container, fluctuations in temperature should be eliminated. Cold feeds are another possible cause as well as returning the kittens to their sleeping quarters cold and damp following washing.
- (c) **Constipation.** If quantity and strength of feed is correct, i.e., the kitten seems completely satisfied, then  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon of sugar should be added to every other feed. Too much sugar could have the reverse effect.
- (d) **Diahorrea.** Feed too weak—if this occurs after the second week more farlene and less evaporated milk is called for. However if this occurs during the first two weeks then add another scoop of Ostermilk and less on the quantity of evaporated milk.
- (e) **Feed Refusal.** Early teething could be the cause and it is suggested that the feed be fed slightly cooler than normal to help soothe the gums.  
**Urine.** Some kittens find it difficult to pass urine without help and it follows therefore that the kitten is feeling some discomfort, this must be corrected by massage following which the kitten will probably be quite happy to take its bottle.  
**Bowel.** If there has been no bowel motion for some hours this will also cause the kitten some unhappiness. Massage rear legs, abdomen and back it may take anything up to 10 minutes but finally if the kitten is not malformed in anyway, motion action will result. Cradling the rear of the kitten in warm water often brings quicker results.  
**Colds & Flu.** If the kitten refuses two feeds in succession and infection is thought to be the cause veterinary help will be required immediately. remember pneumonia sets in very quickly with newborn kittens. It will be necessary if the diagnosis is cold/flu to have a supply of antibiotics—oral dosers. The kitten should be given  $\frac{1}{2}$  c.c. twice daily according to the antibiotic used and veterinary advice. Two types are necessary as the kitten quickly becomes immune to one if continually used. A change of antibiotic should be made after 48 hours. Penbritin and Aureomycin are suggested. If the kittens have difficulty in breathing then a small pad of Vick can be placed in the sleeping quarters which will help clear the nasal passages. The kittens affected should now be fed every hour as they will probably only take in a small quantity of feed at each sitting.  
**Teats.** A number of teats should be used and they should be kept in soak to prevent them from becoming hard. As a kitten sucks a teat over a period of time the teat swells and grows in length, therefore it is advisable to use several teats, alternating these at each feed time, so that as the kitten grows so do the teats. Kittens quite often reject their feed when a new teat has to be broken in.

## EMERGENCY FEEDING BOTTLE

Should you have the misfortune to break the feeding bottle and be in the position of having no standby available, then it is possible to construct a temporary feeder from the following household items:

Remove the red top from a Fairy Liquid Bottle—insert the neck of a squeezy bottle (such as used for hair laquer) into the red top—to the nozzle protruding attach a feeding teat.

Milk must be squeezed from this type of bottle into the kitten's mouth as it is not possible to suck out the liquid.

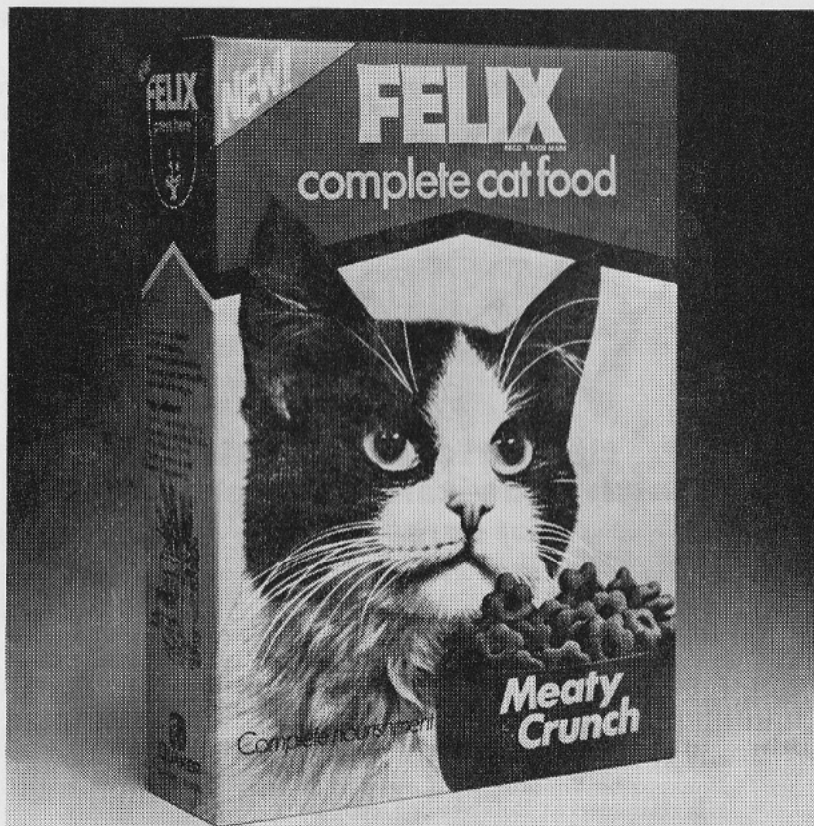

**CALCIUM DEFICIENCY**

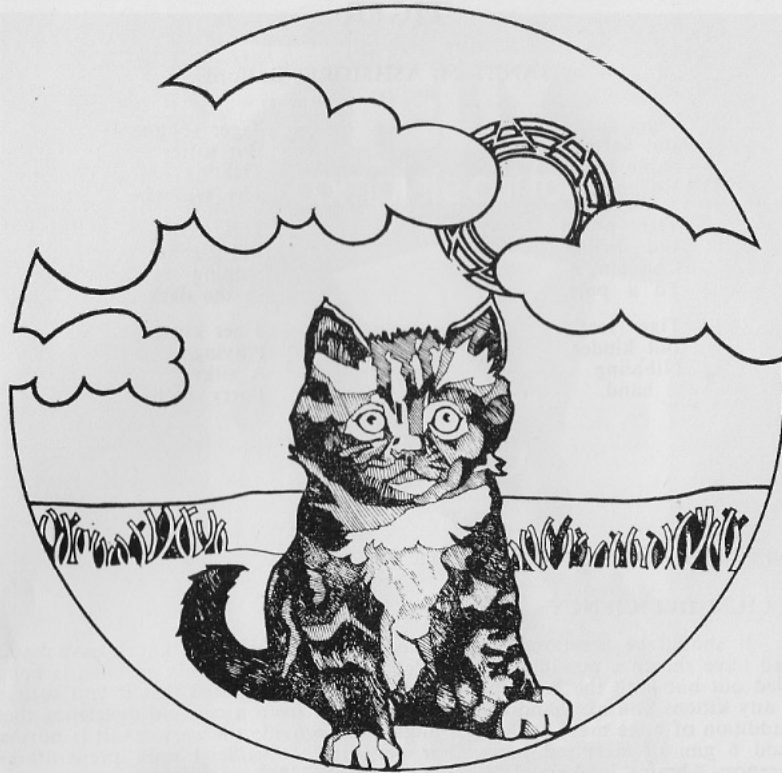
It should be mentioned that a number of the kittens that I have hand-reared have shown a possible calcium deficiency. Work on this problem is being carried out but until the final answer is known it is suggested that if you suspect that any kittens you are handrearing are suffering from a calcium deficiency then the addition of bone meal to the diet might well provide the answer. It is normal to add 6 gm. of sterilised bone flour per litre to artificial milk preparations. Reference: Abrams in Animal Nursing—pages 152/253.

My own experience of this has been where kittens are still on the bottle at 5/6 weeks. If the kittens are weaned early this problem does not arise, however in every litter there is always one kitten that refuses to relinquish the bottle.

**MINIATURE KITTENS**

One other unexplained result of handrearing is that of the mini-kitten. This has also been known when rearing pigs, etc., by hand, and would seem to be the direct result of handrearing. I have handreared a large number of kittens to-date, and this lack of growth has occurred on one occasion only. "Hetty" at the age of three months was the size of a six-week old kitten; at the age of 9 months was the size of a 10/12-week old kitten and so on. She refused all solid food until she was three months old. Hetty has been under the observation of a veterinary surgeon since birth, and now at one-year-old appears to be perfectly normal in every way, perfectly healthy, apart from failing to attain normal size. However, unless the reader undertakes handrearing regularly, it is unlikely that she will experience this phenomena, but it is worth mentioning.

If any reader has any particular problem relating to this article I shall be pleased to try and help. Alternatively, I should be pleased to hear from anyone that has handreared kittens successfully. New problems are discovered with each litter; breeds may vary in their feeding habits and the gathering in of information will eventually mean, I hope, a 100% success rate for all those wishing to rear by hand.

## OESTRUS IN THE CAT

by a VETERINARY SURGEON

The female cat reaches puberty at between seven and twelve months of age, one or two months before the male.

A queen has several oestrus cycles during her breeding season which lasts from January or February through to September. Peaks of cyclic activity are reached in February, May and June and occasionally in September. There is usually no oestral activity from late September until late January and during this time the queen is said to be in an-oestrus.

The cycles are thirteen to fifteen days long and, in the presence of a male cat, oestrus lasts about four days. If no coitus occurs, oestrus lasts five to ten days. Ovulation occurs twenty-four to thirty hours after coitus. A sterile coitus may be followed by a false pregnancy lasting thirty to forty days.

Oestrus can be recognised by the distinct activities of the queen, she crouches, extends her pelvis and holds her tail laterally. She also calls and shows frequent rolling and treading.

Mating occurs several times during the three to four day oestrus and fertilisation occurs one or two days after ovulation, that is, two to three days after coitus.

Miscarriage is a fairly common happening in cats. Pregnancy lasts about sixty-three days and most queens have two litters, of two to seven kitten each year.

Birth is followed by a four to six week lactation period and oestrus returns two weeks after weaning.

Keeping entire cats in the average size house can present all sorts of problems. With tom cats, the scratching and spraying during the breeding season can reduce your home to a shambles and, if you own a queen, other people's tom cats can have a considerable disruptive effect on your own domestic life. Your queen will make herself more than just apparent with her vocal proclamations of her readiness for a suitor.

### Neutering

It is because of these problems that neutering has become a widely accepted practice among cat-owners. Probably the most frequently performed operation in cat practice is ovaro-hysterectomy of the female animal. Ovario-hysterectomy or spaying of cats is a very safe and trouble-free operation when performed by an experienced veterinary surgeon. The queen is usually operated on before she reaches puberty when she is three to four months old. The operation wound is small and heals in most cases without a detectable scar. The cat suffers little or no change of temperament as a result of the operation, but is probably less likely to go roaming afterwards.

### Postponement of Oestrus

Although an operation on their cat relieves an owner of the regular inconvenience which occurs during the breeding season, not all owners want their animal operated on in this way. It is possible to control oestrus in the cat by the use of a hormone preparation called a progestagen. Hormones are clinical substances which regularly appear in nature and in fact occur naturally in all living

things in one form or another. Their function is to control various systems and activities in the body. These chemicals have become far better known outside the world of science in recent years because of their use in the human contraceptive pill. Progestagens have, in fact, been used in preparations for contraception in humans.

There are various preparations on the market for the control of oestrus in cats but because of the nature of a cat's cycle and the difficulty in deciding just when such preparations should be given, the advice of a veterinary surgeon should always be sought.

These preparations are available either as injections or tablets. The injections are for longer term use and the treatment of breeding animals is not advised as oestrus may be postponed for variable periods, sometimes up to three years. The cats have to be carefully selected for suitability for this type of treatment.

Oral progestagens, the hormone in tablet form, are used on a more regular short term basis. Three types of dosage are suggested for one tablet preparation, one given for a short time each time calling starts. This dose will prevent that particular oestrus and the cat will start calling again in two or three weeks. Alternatively, a short or long term course of treatment may be given to postpone cyclic activity for the whole of one breeding season or up to two years.

Such dosages have no effect on the ability of the cat to breed and breeding can commence with the next oestrus following discontinuation of the tablets.

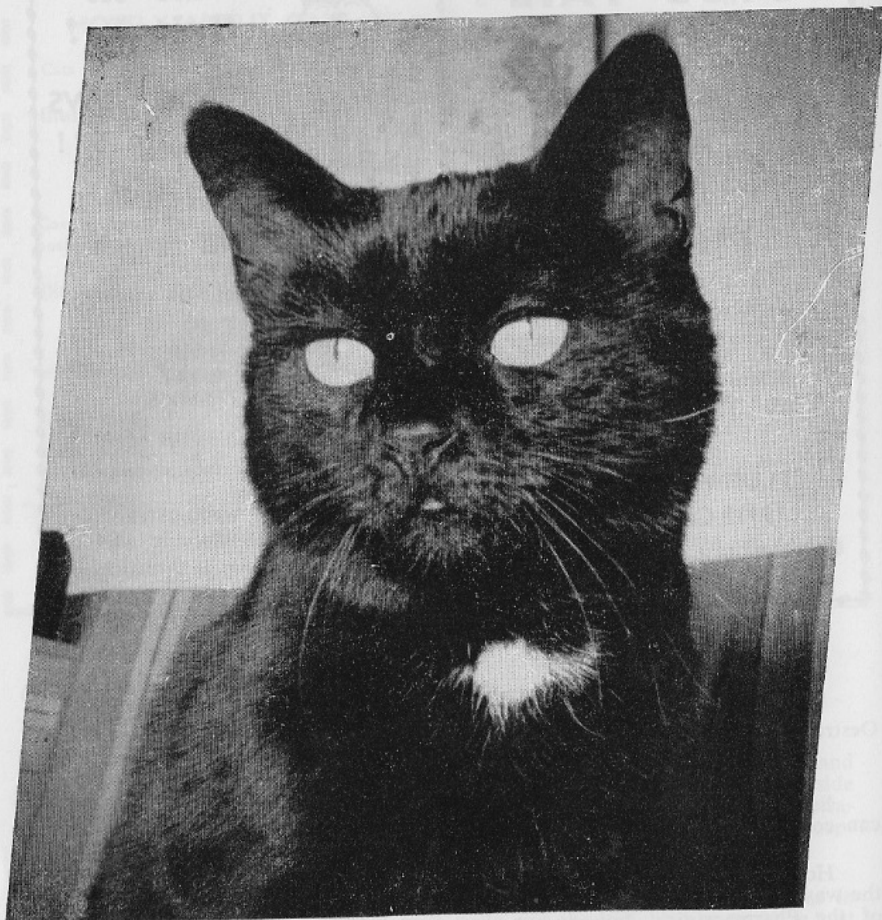
Hormone preparations for the control of oestrus in cats is another example of the way human medical research can benefit animals. The huge research resources of the Pharmaceutical Industry play a major part in producing preparations beneficial to animal health in all its aspects. Many of these medicines, as with oestrus prevention agents, are off-shoots of medical research, but many others are the result of scientists working specifically on problems of animal care and health.

The use of these progestagen preparations as with any other drug should be directed by the expert—your veterinary surgeon, always seek his advice. With so much care and scientific efficiency behind the medicines your cats receive you may be sure that your veterinary surgeon is getting the best possible assistance in caring for your pet.

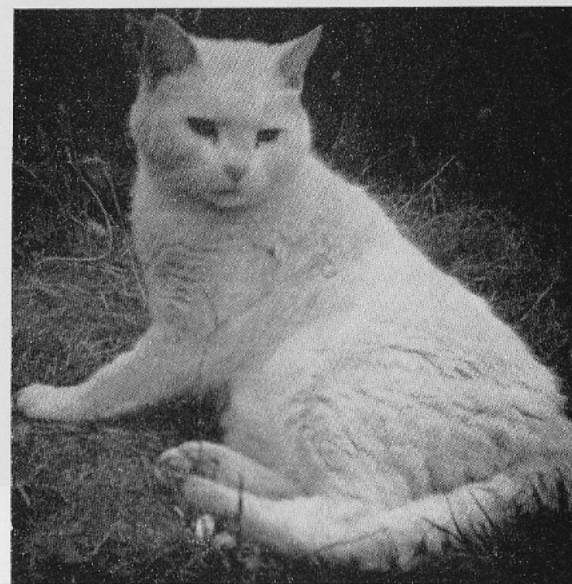

## "CATS, GETTING-IN OF: INSTRUCTIONS TO HANDLERS"

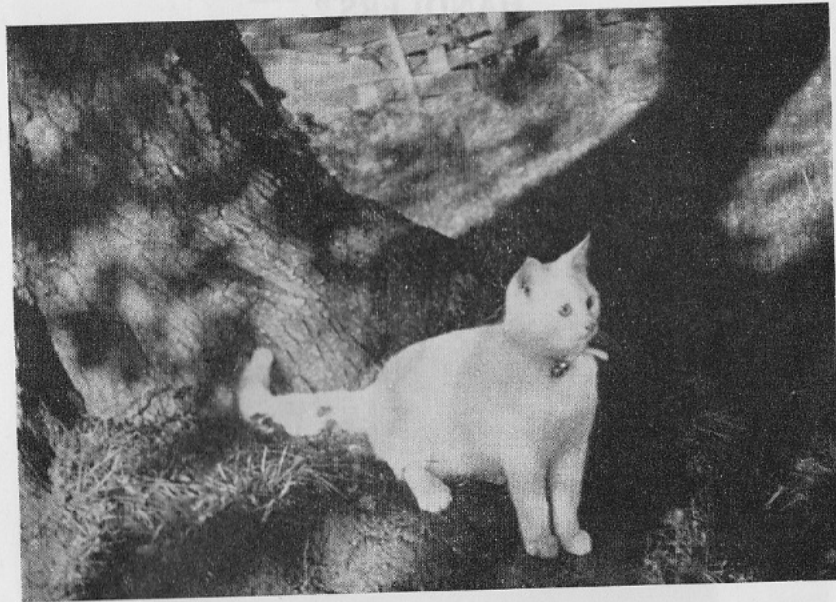

"Boots, brown, officers for the use of : how often has Dad or Grandad relived the old Army days and ways or resurrected Army jargon in fun that is partly sentiment? Perhaps when about to retrieve the family moggie at day's end?

Getting in a wide-eyed, prepared-to-stay-out-all-night cat on a dark night being something akin to a military manoeuvre, a few hints on similar lines may be helpful. The following Instructions, Cats, Getting-in Of, should of course be suitably amended according to the character of the Cat, the number of obstacles and nature of the defences of the local terrain, and the age and muscular condition of the Officer or Cat-Handler appointed to conduct the operation through to completion.

1. **Correct Number One uniform** to be worn: shoes or boots, rubber soled, cats for creeping up on, with cuddle-coat, thick, hairy and warm.
2. **Proceed bent double**, with head well down, from Handler's H.Q. Step quietly, you are entering enemy territory, i.e., neighbour's garden overlooked by uncurtained window. Neighbour may be watching the telly only one wall's thickness away. Cross barbed wire entanglements with care (certain gardens include standard as well as bush roses in unexpected places). Tread carefully when penetrating still deeper into enemy territory, the next-door-but-one garden; do not be deceived by total blackout; there may be hidden booby traps to give the intruding Cat-Handler away, such as the tail of the owner's coal-black Tom which will emit a loud screeching alarm call on being stepped upon.

3. **Collect Cat**, which will probably be lurking in the dimmest corner of the porch. Treat as for unexploded time-bomb, grasping firmly but without accidentally touching off some such explosive device as a newly battle-torn ear.
4. **Return carefully to base** with Cat, back paws to be supported in the left hand while rest of Cat is draped over Handler's right shoulder.
5. **Enter Cat's night residence**, immediately closing door of same firmly.
6. **Deposit Cat in hall**, and proceed to prepare Code—SPR-FIH-WTR (Supper, Fish, Water) in kitchen. Cat should now begin to call for SPR-FIH-WTR as well as for Code—CDL (Cuddle). Deposit SPR before Cat and walk away. **ON NO ACCOUNT ATTEMPT TO WATCH CAT WHILE EATING**; this is a ceremony to be conducted in strict privacy.
7. **Commence evening newspaper crossword** during SPR ceremony. After about five minutes calling for CDL should commence, rising from a soft "Ow" in a steadily increasing crescendo. Do not proceed to door until Cat is calling loud and clear. On opening of door, Cat should utter loud sharp "WOW".
8. **Pick up Cat**, still wearing cuddle-coat (yourself, that is: the Cat already has one unless she is one of the new bald varieties). Drape Cat across right shoulder, rhythmically patting back. Give occasional attention to the pleasure-point near base of spine; if performed correctly, this should make her throw head back and twitch with ecstasy. **ON NO ACCOUNT SIT DOWN** if the Cat is female; sitting in a queen's presence is not allowed, and will be greeted with struggles and annoyed clawing towards the Handler's bare neck.
9. **Continue cuddling** until Cat looks several times towards the door, signifying that Cuddle, Second Stage, is about to commence. Saying "BED" quietly, carry Cat upstairs to bannisters on landing, where the bed should already

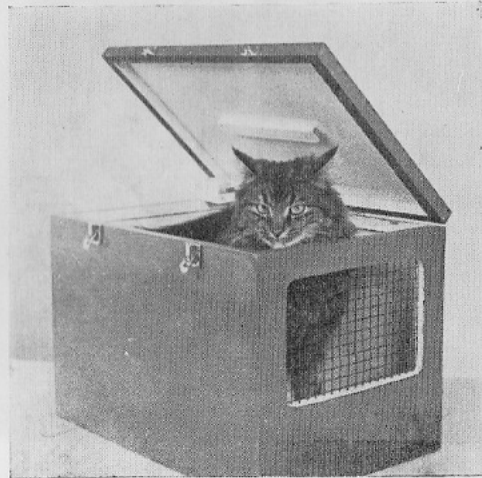

10. **Deposit Cat on bed** after further short cuddle as described in Section 8.
  11. **Continue patting** after depositing Cat on bed. Final "Eeows", "Ows" and "Wows" should decrease in volume, to be replaced by purring. Cat should now sink to rest, when the Handler may depart, having first turned out the light and ordered silence throughout the household.
  12. **Go to (human) bed** until about 2.30 a.m., when the Cat-Handler should be prepared to repeat the exercise, not forgetting to provide further fodder and to allow time for performance of the usual offices. Time should also be allowed for fighting neighbours' black Tom before Cat is returned to bed for second half of night, i.e., until lunchtime next day. By the time she is ready to arise and shine, you should already have laid plans for the next performance by preparing liver, fish, tinned cat-food, gravy, cream and drinking water. If less than six assorted saucers are not on show in the hall, the Cat is liable to complain to the R.S.P.C.A. of malnutrition, rendering the negligent Handler liable to Court Martial for neglect of duty.
- Handlers who on reaching the age of 92 decide that the above routine is becoming Too Much At My Age should consider the two courses normally open: (a) continue life of a Cat-Handler until overcome with exhaustion on neighbours' doorstep at 2.30 a.m., or (b) apply for posting to one of the less demanding corners of the globe such as Africa (where the intermediate food preparation stages can be omitted, allowing the Cat—large, maned and tawny—to tuck straight into yourself), or the South Pole (where the Cats have flippers and are too busy hatching eggs between their feet to wander by night): the latter offers the extra incentive of your being one of the few Cat-Handlers to have lived with this unusual flippered Cat, sometimes called a Penguin, ultimately becoming an acknowledged expert on the subject of Penguins, Getting-in Of as well as Other Cats, Getting-in Of.

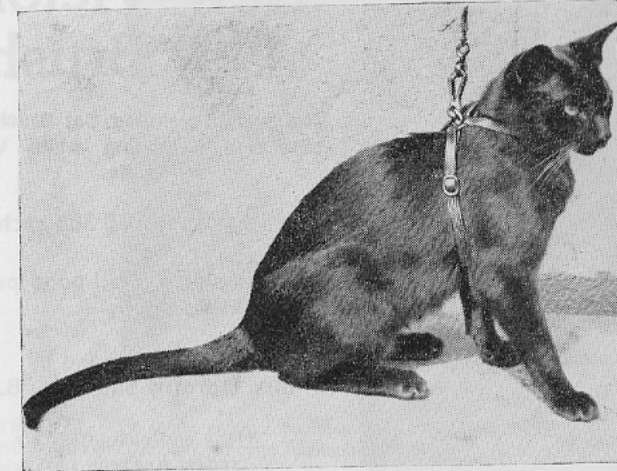

## TAKING CATS ON HOLIDAY

Cat in Elastic Harness

It is becoming more and more popular to take your cat on holiday with you. People have been taking dogs for years, but the cat is a different matter! Providing it is handled correctly however, there is no reason why a cat should be any more trouble. **DO NOT FEED BEFORE THE JOURNEY.**

**CAR JOURNEYS:** There are dog safety belts and car seats, but these are generally unsuitable for cats, although the odd cat has been known to travel in one of these quite successfully, and some cats will sit on the back shelf of a car the whole journey. On the whole it is much better to have the cat under control in some way; apart from it being illegal to have the cat loose in the car if there is only one person in it. If the cat wants to sit on your lap, the best way is to put it into a **Cat Harness**, so that you have control over it at the same time and it is not under the brake pedal when the driver puts his foot down! The passenger will have to hold the cat whilst in his harness. An elastic harness is most suited to the cat, because it moves with the animal and does not rub against his delicate fur (see above). In traffic or on the journeys, you just have it a little tighter than normally, to stop the cat extricating himself in moments of possible panic from strange noises, dogs, etc. If you are travelling alone in a car, it is better to have the cat confined altogether in a **Box** or **Basket**. He may mew a lot at first, but he will soon get used to it and settle down to sleep. Should you have an estate car, not too full of luggage, you could put up a **Wire Pen** to take the cat, his **Basket** or sleeping box and a **Litter Tray** as well, not to mention dried food, **Water**, etc. If a long journey this will save you worrying about whether he wants to keep stopping to attend to the various calls of nature. (See pages 80-81).

**CAR VENTILATORS:** These are very practical for summer travel and it is a simple matter to install one or more in hot weather. They fit very easily into a car window and are buglar proof. They are ideal when travelling with children, dogs or any live animal, allowing everyone to breath easily and to be safe from theft at the same time. (See pages 53 and 80-81).

**TRAIN JOURNEYS:** Cats have been seen travelling on harnesses or collars and leads on a train, but if the cat is nervous, only a confining box or basket will suffice. If the compartment is empty or the others travelling are asked first, the cat may be let out on a long journey to stretch his legs or sit on a lap, but remember to box him up again well before the doors will be opened, most car ventilators will fit train windows too!

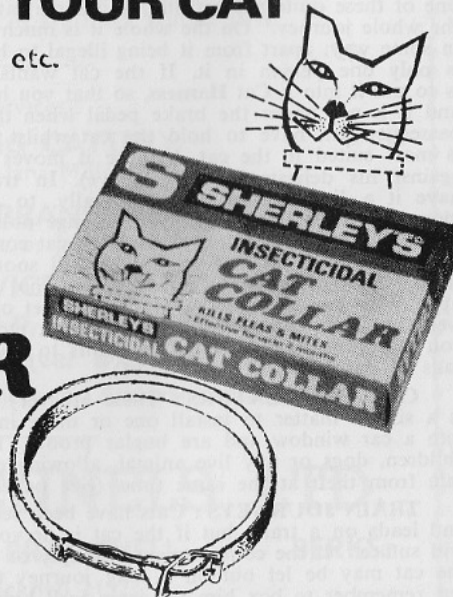

**AIR TRAVEL:** In some inland routes and on some transatlantic lines, you are allowed to have the cat in the compartment with you. However, many airlines insist that this is pressurised. Again, it must be properly confined in a box, preferably made for the purpose in wood or fibre glass. Some airlines will not accept cats in baskets or other fragile carriers unless accompanied by the owner in the cabin. Some will insist on a cardboard carrier which folds flat. You must make enquiries from your chosen air line before the day of the flight. Remember that owing to our quarantine regulations animals taken out of the British Isles may not return without going into quarantine for some months, so it is virtually impossible to take an animal on a foreign holiday with you.

**CARAVANS:** Many cats enjoy a caravan holiday. Some are allowed to roam at will on arrival and always come back when called. However, I would prefer the cat confined in a wire pen at night or in a bed with the windows shut. In the day time most cats will come for a walk wherever you go yourself and will enjoy it immensely. Beware of traffic and dogs, and have a harness on and the lead at the ready when nearing civilization.

**HOTELS:** Many hotels will not have cats or dogs, or will have one or the other. Never arrive at a hotel with a cat without making previous enquiries. Some hotels welcome all animals and allow them in the rooms. Some have outdoor kennels for cats and dogs and allow visitors to take them for walks during the day time. This in some ways is the best of both worlds. The hotel feeds the animals, but they are there for you to go and see, groom and cuddle or take out walking whenever you want to. Many such establishments are listed in these pages.

**SEDATIVES:** It is not normally necessary to give a sedative to a cat. For a journey with a very nervous cat an exception can be made, but not as a rule; the same goes for travel sickness tablets. **Cats Do Not Respond Well to Drugs of any Kind.** Try him **without** first and you will probably find that they are not needed. If they are, make sure that they are suitable for cats as well as dogs, the ones on the market are by no means necessarily safe for both. For instance, **An Aspirin Can Kill a Cat.** If in any doubt ask your Veterinary Surgeon to prescribe something.

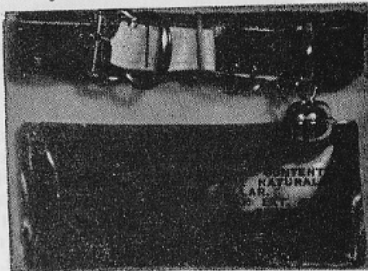

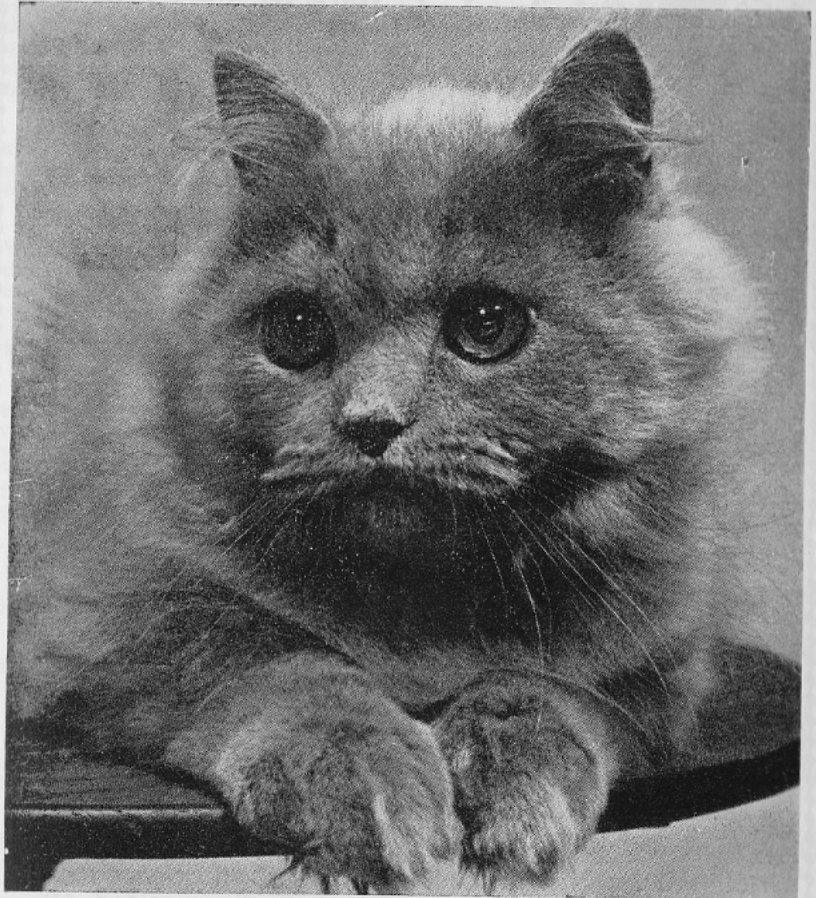

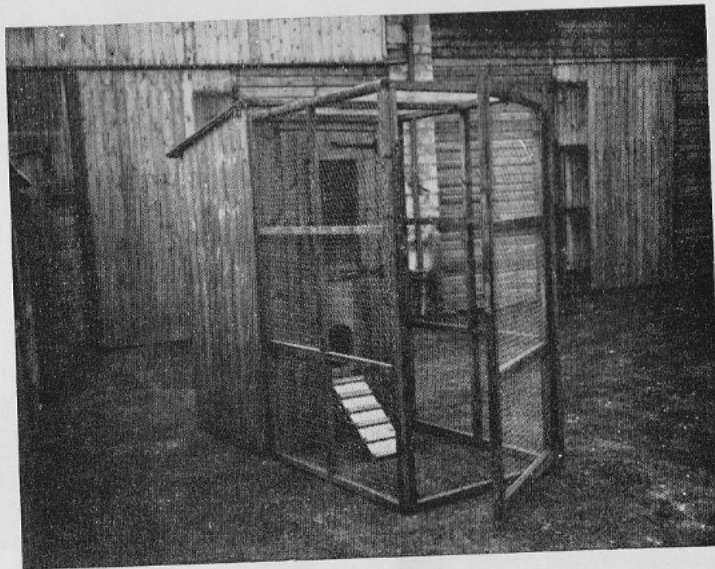

I arrived home with a ten weeks old kitten—he was pleasantly clean, and everything was in order, pedigree, transfer form, registration and diet sheet neatly clipped together. I opened the carrying basket and the copper eyes looked at me puzzled, then he leaped out and rushed at Puss, who, scared to death, dived under the fridge. Kitten chased him round and round the kitchen, and finished his act by swinging on Puss's beautiful tail, so that I had one scared cat, and one triumphant blue kitten with a thick white moustache of trailing fur.

## CATS AND THE LAW

### Animals Act, 1971

Attention is drawn to the Animals Act, 1971 which is now in force.

In brief, the Act states that where damage is caused by an animal (including cats) the keeper is fully liable unless:—

- (i) the damage is wholly due to the fault of the person suffering the damage;
- (ii) the person suffering the damage has voluntarily accepted the risk.

A keeper of a cat is defined as the owner OR a person IN POSSESSION—OR the head of a household of which a member under the age of sixteen owns the animal or has it in his possession.

Any person who owns a cat remains as owner of that cat until another person becomes the owner, this should be borne in mind in the case of straying animals. Where a cat is taken into and kept in possession in order to prevent it from causing damage or to restore it to its owner, the persons so doing does not become the keeper and, therefore, does not absolve the rightful owner of his responsibilities.

It, therefore, behoves all cat owners to ensure indemnity against possible claims made on their finances through damage caused by their animal. Various Insurance Companies provide the necessary third party cover to safeguard owners against such contingencies.

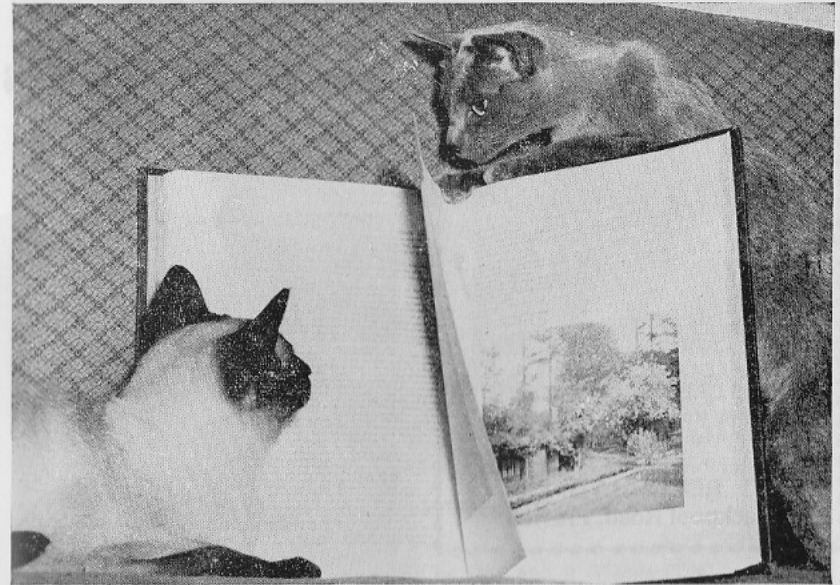

by JEAN PRATT



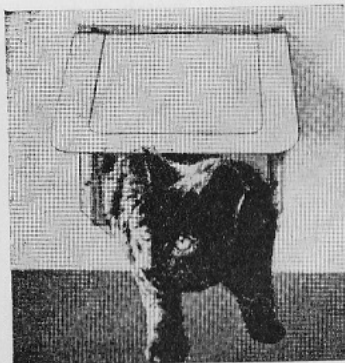
There is no doubt, CHAMPION CATS OF THE WORLD is the cat book of the year. Published by George Harrap at £4.50, it is worth every new penny of the price and is the third in Harrap's series on champion breeds, "The World's Finest Horses and Ponies" and "Champion Show Dogs of the World" having already met with great success.

The authors, Catherine Ing and Grace Pond, have combined to cover all possible information. There are studies of the cat in mythology, folklore, literature and art, and a comprehensive review of breeds throughout the world, including the new and exciting Korat and Tonkanese. Additional contributions have been drawn from authorities in America and Canada, Europe, Turkey and Japan. Illustrations in full colour are the work of Sally Anne Thompson, who has achieved an international reputation for animal photography. They are magnificent, each cat posed against a background skilfully planned to display eye and body colour and type to the best advantage. Cats and their owners are listed and include champions belonging to Mrs. Hogan, Miss Sellar, Mr. Chapman, Mrs. Thompson, Mrs. Paddon, Mrs. Turney, Mrs. Harding, Mrs. Fisher, Mrs. Richards, Mrs. Sayer, Mrs. Ashford, Mrs. Hudson, Mrs. Deakin, and many other breeders in Great Britain and abroad.

Dr. Ing is a lecturer in English Literature at Oxford, where she is known as a "University wit". She obviously has a great interest in and love of cats and her survey of the cat in modern science is well-balanced and timely. Too many of us verge on hysteria at the thought of animals used in laboratory experiments, but as Dr. Ing points out, we must look at facts objectively. The practice will and must continue and by law and other factors "scientists are compelled to treat these animals rather better than many laymen do theirs. It has been established

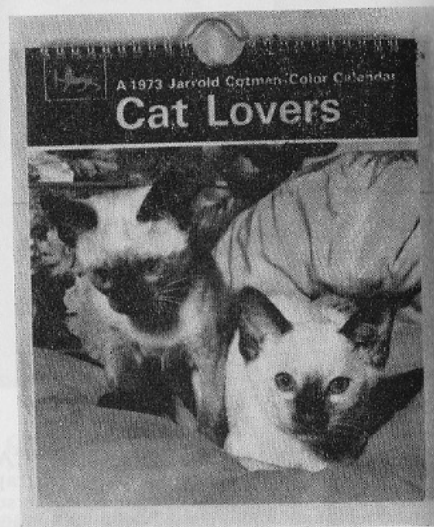

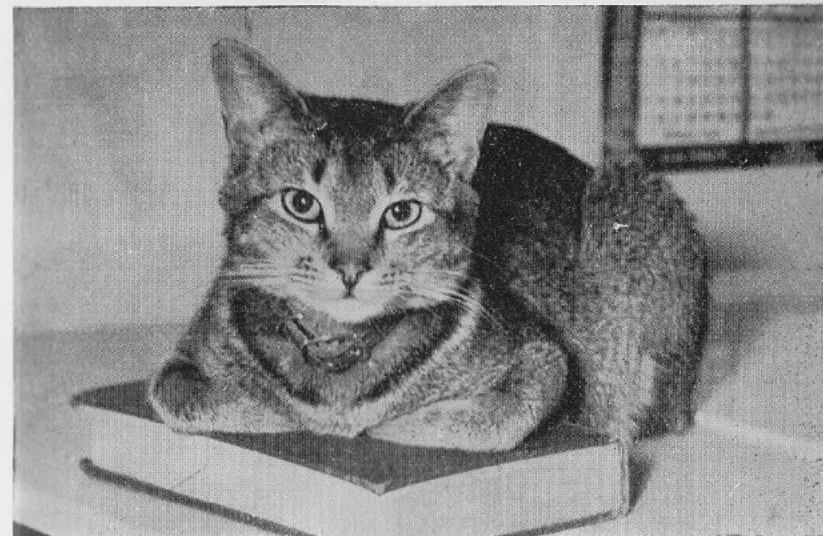

that an unhappy animal is never entirely healthy and it is scientifically necessary that those used in experiments be kept under conditions ensuring their maximum happiness. No animal is allowed to emerge from the general anaesthesia into consciousness of acute pain. Many cats outside laboratories have benefited in various ways from this scientific work, and experiments with drugs on cats have led to great extensions among medicines available for treating cats."

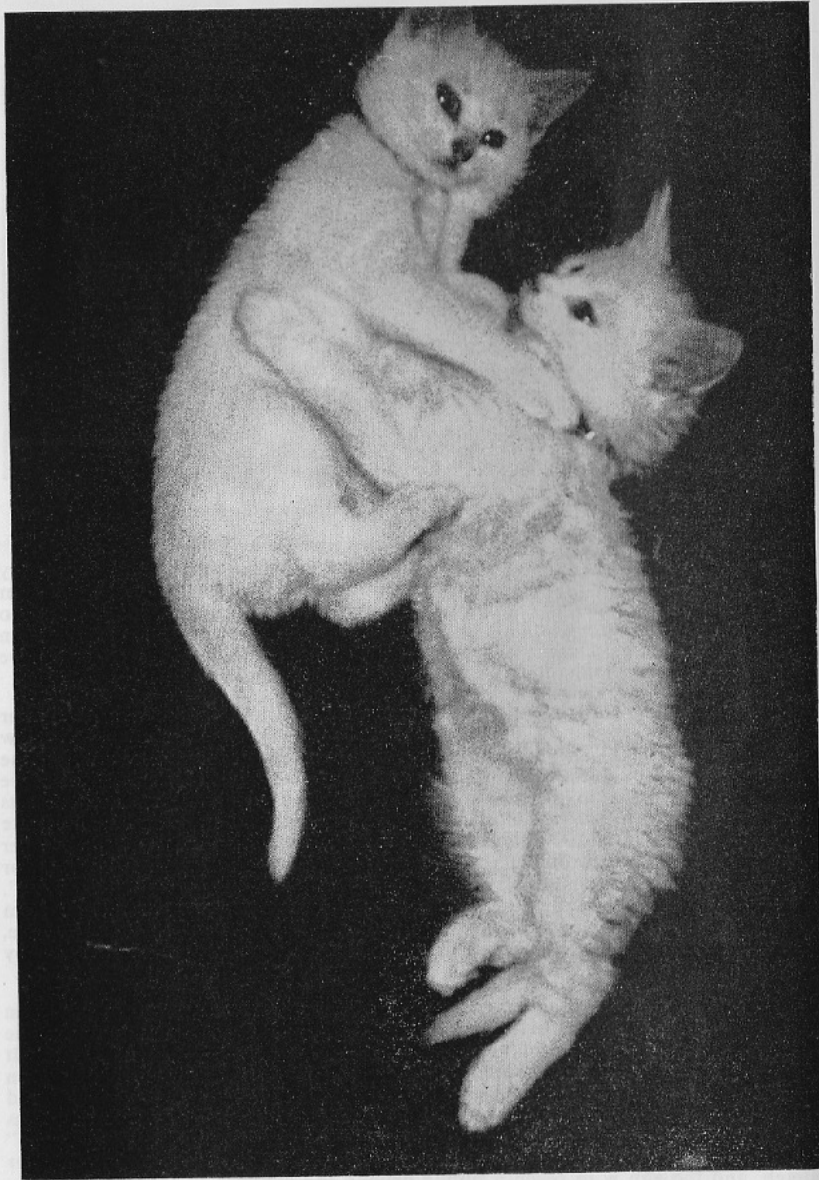
It is hard luck and one of the hazards of publishing that works of similar intent and content appear at the same time. Preceding Harrap's by only a few weeks is **CATS & KITTENS** in the Orbis Book series. It is translated from the Italian and has throughout a strong European bias—maybe a foretaste of what we can expect on entry into the Common Market. Like "Champion Cats", it sets out to sort fact from fiction but in much more compressed form and to illustrate all known breeds. The 100 colour photographs include also some of the smaller wild cats. Nomenclature differs slightly, e.g. the short-haired Blue is "Steel" or "Silver", the Russian is "Russian-American" and Birman is spelt "Burman". Also illustrated are the Polish set of "cat" stamps, the famous cat mosaic from Pompeii and some intriguing cat paintings from foreign collections. On the whole, good value at £1.25, but be warned—the standards are not those as laid down by the British Cat Fancy.

An entirely new method of presenting information for cat lovers has been thought up by Peter Way Ltd., in **THE COMPLETE CAT**. It is in magazine format but is not a periodical to replace the late-lamented **CATS** magazine. It is being published in six separate parts and will furnish a complete record on care, character, mentality, breeding and showing, and the history of domestic and wild cats. A binder is available to contain all six issues, the first of which describes looks and character with colour illustrations of "all the kinds of cats there are" from pedigree to alley. Editorial advisers are Angela Sayer, Grace Pond and Ivor Raleigh, and the aim is to reach a public beyond the confines of the Cat Fancy.

For lighter reading, don't miss Doreen Tovey's latest, **DOUBLE TROUBLE**, and an excursion into autobiography by May Eustace, **MOSTLY ABOUT CATS**. The latter has great charm and humour and makes for pleasant reading.

## THE TOPSY, TURVY STORY

Stray cats usually appear out of the blue, stay for a few days or even weeks and then disappear as suddenly as they appear.

Not so, however, with a fine black and white cat which adopted us one recent autumn. We expected her to be on her way again before the colder weather came along but November with bitter nights and cold days found her waiting at the kitchen door each morning for her breakfast and a warm seat by the kitchen fire. 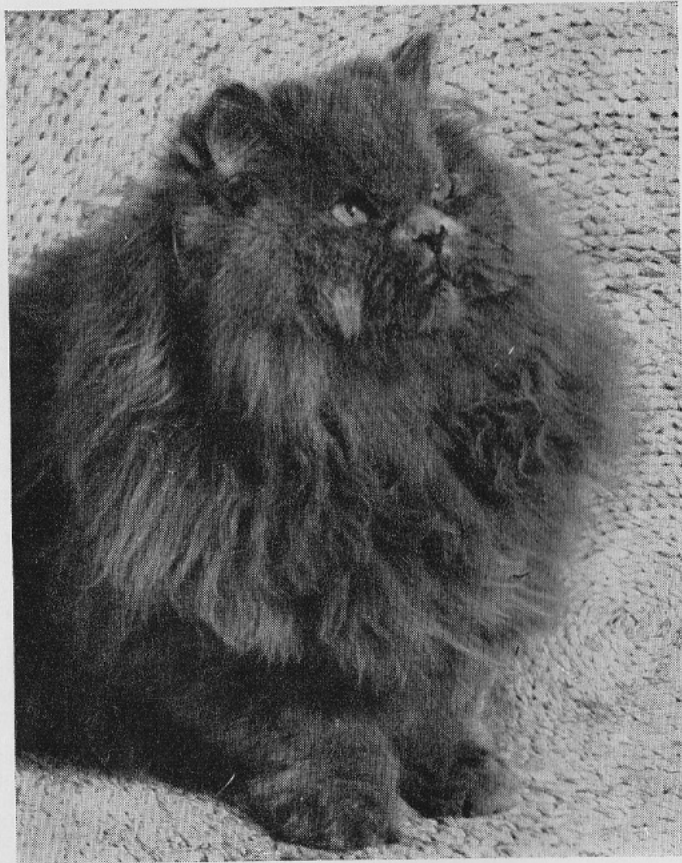

Neighbours kindly looked after Turvy and her family whilst we were away and when we returned we began to make plans for the future of our protégés. Through living rough, Turvy had acquired fleas and by changing her blankets frequently, sometimes daily, and dusting with a powder from the vet, we quickly disposed of that problem. The kittens were thriving, Turvy was a splendid little mother: we gave her several meals a day and added an egg to the evening milk before locking up the garage. As the kittens became more active my son designed a huge play-pen from two large cardboard boxes. This was lined with newspaper which could be changed daily and was adjoining their sleeping quarters in a large wooden box. A gang-plank connected the two and a tray of cat-litter was placed in the play-pen as we were determined that our kittens would be thoroughly clean and house-trained before we found homes for them.

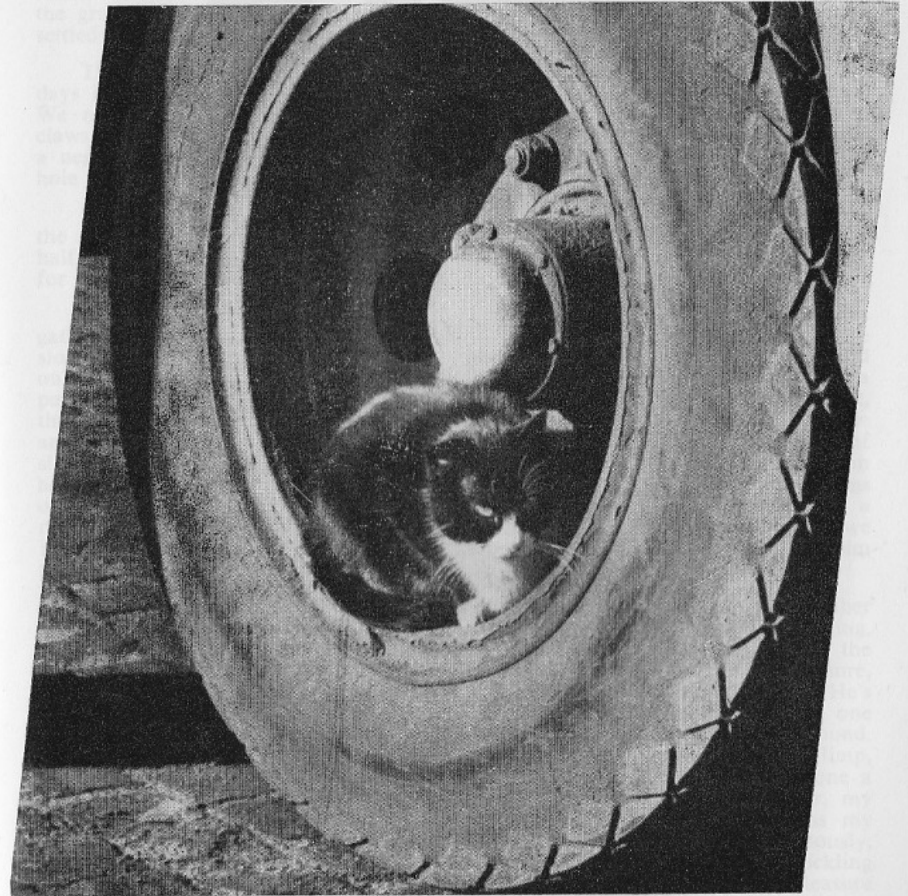

We coaxed him into the small back garden that was little more than a yard separating the house from the fields beyond. It took patience and perseverance and a modicum of bribery because despite his thinness and exhaustion he was not disposed to trust. We felt that perhaps in the past he had trusted in vain and was now a cynic, placing no reliance, giving no affection to those who walk on two legs, but the drift of vapour from the small dish of minced meat and gravy was more than his small, emaciated body and independent spirit could resist. He approached on unsteady feet, bent his round black head and lapped the gravy, and having tasted, wrapped his wisp of a tail tidily about him and settled to devour this unexpected bounty from a coldly unsympathetic world.

That was the start of what could perhaps be called a tolerance. In those days it was certainly not friendship. Butterfield gave nothing of himself to us. The coming of spring was also Butterfield's coming-of-age in that friends gathered mysteriously, from out the shadows, and held singing parties on the sloping scullery roof. It was more than time to have him neutered if we could only get hold of him, but even after three months of regular meals and a perseverance of kindly tone and words, often maintained only by valiant effort, this was an exercise still to be practised. We resorted in the end to sharp practice and laced his rations liberally with a powdered sedative. It had the effect of slowing him down and dulling the sharp edge of his reflex. To his humiliation he was caught easily as he blundered unsteadily away from outstretched arms only to run headlong into a wheelbarrow. He expressed his opinion in a particularly explicit range of spits and yowls. We could still hear him as we left him in the unyielding professional hold of the Vet, arranging to collect him the following evening.

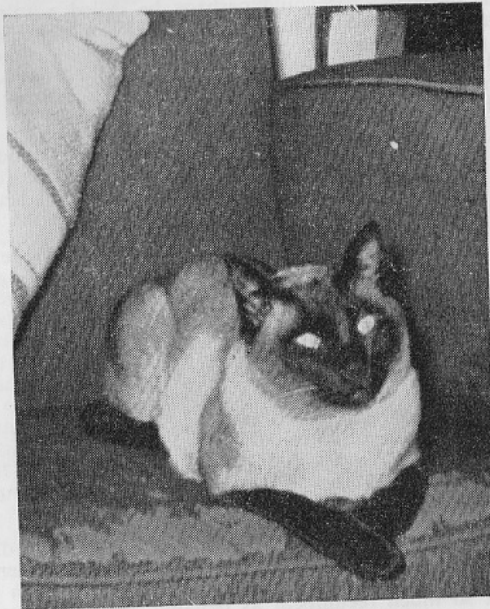

Cautiously, with the recollection of past injury I risked a finger behind his ear, tickling exploratively deeper and deeper into his fur. I felt his neck arch with pleasure and somewhere deep inside him a vibration started, hesitant at first, then growing in volume. We looked at each other in wondering disbelief, then at the black head pressed back against me, the half-closed eyes that held a look of rapture! So, at long last we had won him over. We had played it dirty, delivered him to the enemy, but now we had redeemed ourselves and taken him back to our hearts. Butterfield was mellowed with relief, doped into forgiveness. He showed his appreciation in the manner of all cats since the beginning of time. In a basso profundo that could be heard above the sound of the car engine, above my delighted laugh, Butterfield purred.

## DON'T BE AFRAID OF RINGWORM

Ringworm is only a word—why fear it? It does not even properly describe the complaint it names; there is no worm. It is a vegetable fungus disease, of the same ilk as athlete's foot. Yet, I never heard of anyone fearing that complaint.

I have to confess, though, that when I first discovered our kitten had ringworm I was filled with fear and foreboding. She was a tiny, scraggy thing, about two months old when we got her from the local cattery of strays. One evening while stroking her I could feel a slight lumpiness all the way down her back and on examining her fur saw what appeared to be bad patches of dandruff. That's all it looked like: white, flaky scurf. But after a few days it seemed to get thicker and crustier and I decided she better see the vet.—it could be eczema, and I might be causing it by giving the wrong food. The vet. said he would like her to have a laboratory test to “rule out” ringworm but, unfortunately, it confirmed that she had it. It could be cured, we were told, but it might be a long job. By now the only parts not affected were her head, the fronts of the paws and the tail.

Treatment started with an injection by the vet. and after that I had to give her a quarter of a tablet of Grisolvlin every day and a shampoo with Hexocil solution every three or four days.

There were warnings, of course, about how careful we must be if we were to avoid catching it ourselves, and I was very fastidious at first; I bought tablets of carbolic soap, antiseptic toilet soap, barrier creams and disposable plastic gloves in my anti-ringworm campaign. For almost a week we lived in a state of fear and panic every time we stroked our pet or she accidentally touched us. We were becoming irritable—almost nervous wrecks—and I was sleeping badly through worrying about it.

When Tinker had first come to us she had been allowed on my bed and on one or two cold nights I even woke up in the night to find that she had crept beneath the bedclothes to keep warm. When this thing broke, however, she was bannished to the hall of the flat at night, mewing piteously at first. So,

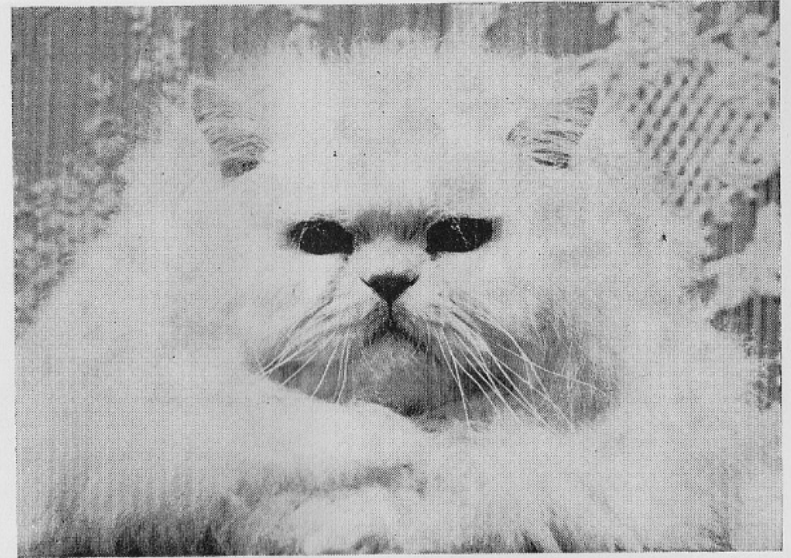

Mrs. Harding's Sealpoint, **Ch. Mingchiu Ghunti**, a lovely male and a very successful sire, is by **Ch. Mingchiu Polo** and **Ch. Mingchiu Gala**. Mrs. Bentinck owns **Ch. Chestermere Copplestone**, whose sire and dam are registered in Canada by his breeders, Mr. and Mrs. Borritt, who visited England a few years ago. Their Chestermere Colourpoints are very well known in Canada and U.S.A. Mrs. E. Fisher, who imported the first Birman into England, has bred the latest Champion, **Ch. Praha Mi Wa**, which is announced as the twenty-first Birman Champion. She owns seven Birman queens and two males, **Ch. Praha Sik-Kim** and **Ch. Praha Hu-Tsung**, both Seals.

The **Long-Haired Cat Club** was founded in 1969 by its President, Mrs. Barron, Mrs. McVady and Miss Page.

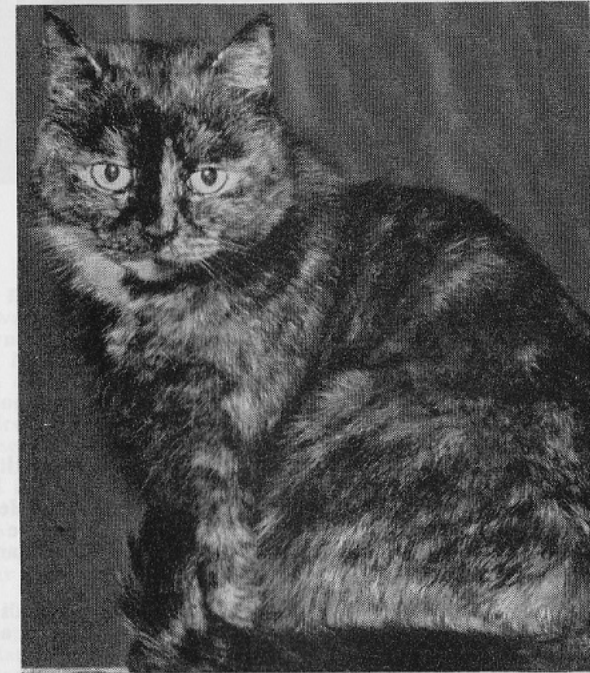

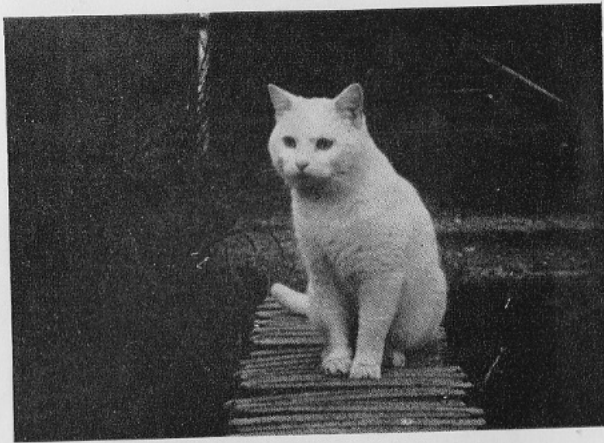
#### Best Short-Haired Cat, 1971-1972 Show Season

I have again been asked to name a "best" Short-Haired cat of the year and to say why.

This has been a difficult task as I have seen so many good exhibits during the past season, especially as last year's winner is still shewn and looks wonderful. I feel, however, that I must nominate Mrs. E. White's **Ch. Burnt Toast**, a really spectacular **Tortoiseshell**. She crowned her Show honours by winning a big Champion of Champions class (facing great competition among British and Foreign Cats) at the Bedford and District Cat Club Championship Show on April 22nd, 1972.

**Ch. Burnt Toast** was also voted Best S.H. Cat in Show on that day. She is of excellent British type, the coat colours are well distributed and her orange eyes are really lovely. Let us hope she will produce a Tortie daughter as good as herself.

The runner-up and opposite sex must be Mrs. C. Betts' **White S.H. male, Ch. Dellswood Saint**, another lovely cat of good British type, always beautifully shown. This cat was born on St. George's Day, hence his name. He visits the local primary school with Martin Betts, aged nine, whose special care he is. All Saint's rosettes and cards are exhibited in the school hall. I understand that he has a good type white daughter who may carry on his honours.

This season seems to have been remarkable for lack of some breeds of British adults, but many kittens have been shown. This is very encouraging, as it shows that quite a lot of breeding is going on.

**Blacks** have been good in the Northern Shows. Mrs. Stewart's **Ch. Sweethope Magician** and **Ebony Prince**, the latter owned by Mrs. Vickers; Mrs. Maddocks' **Mana** cats are all good, also Mr. Pearson's **Ch. Jezreel Mostyn**, bred by Mrs. I. Johnson. Few **Whites** have been shown, but some good **Creams** bred by Mrs. I. Johnson, Mrs. J. Richards and Mrs. Foster, and a very few **Blue-Creams** have good type and eye colour with an improvement in coat colour.

Few good colour **Silver Tabbies** have been seen. Mrs. Watts' **Ch. Hillcross Silver Waratah**, Mr. Pearson's **Ch. Lowenhaus Percivale**, Mrs. Ford's **Marimoglet Silver Delight**, bred by Mrs. Corbould, are good. **Brown Tabbies** have been represented by two very pretty females, **Sherada Nut Brown Maid**, bred and owned by Mr. Warde, and **Ch. Westways Alice**, bred by Mrs. West and now owned by Mrs. A. Sayer.

**Red Tabbies** are encouraging; Mr. Higgins' **Ch. Gias Rufinus Augustus**, Mr. and Mrs. Edwards' **Taliesin Alexander Severus**, Mr. Winder's **Ch. Peerless Firefly** and **Ch. Peerless Firebird** owned by Miss Hardman are two males and two females of excellent type and colouring.

Mrs. Higgins' **Ch. Culverden Charlotte** is looking as good as ever and several of her kittens have obtained Show honours and have firmly established the popularity of the **Brown Spotted**s. Mrs. Menezes' **Ch. Culverden Stardust** is one of the best **Silver Spotted**s and we are seeing a few **Red** and **Blue Spotted**s which are of good colour, their coat pattern gradually improving.

**British Blues** are great favourites. Again more kittens than adults have been shown. It was good to see some **Bonaventura** kittens again. One of the best males is **Ch. Brynbuboo Maximilian**, bred by Mrs. Absalom and owned by Mrs. Foster, and Mrs. Bett's **Capstone Little John**. Excellent females are **Ch. Ryelands Blue Baize**, owned by Mrs. G. Smith and bred by Mrs. Entwistle, Mrs. Clover's **Ch. Sweethope Meditation**, bred by Mrs. Stewart, Mr. Lovat's **Ch. Smoke Sundoe**, bred by Mrs. Clover. **British Blues** tend to live to a good age and until they begin to lose their eye colour, improve with age. **Ch. Jezreel Jomo**, **Ch. Pensylva Quicke**, **Ch. Littlewickers Blue Serge**, **Ch. Pensylva Bella** are good examples to name but a few. Mr. Winder has shown some good **Torties** this season, **Ch. Peerless** is excellent for type and coat colour. **Cherrywood Chloe** and **Chiquita**, bred by Mrs. Cobb, are good **Tortie and Whites**. Miss Woodfield has, of course, bred and exhibited more **Torties** and **Tortie and Whites** than any breeder in the Fancy to date. Her **Pathfinders** prefix is known everywhere. (See page 5.)

**Manx** have not been seen in large numbers. These clever little cats should be more popular. Miss Atchison, Mr. Jordan, Mrs. Butcher and Mrs. Colville keep the Manx flag flying with the **Amberwood**, **Brightwell** and **Rosenthal** prefixes. A few kittens have been exhibited; we must hope to see them as adults next season. **Bi-Colours** are improving. Miss Woodfield has shown **Pathfinders Peter**, **Biscuit**, **Rinty** and **Stells**, new this season. They are valuable for breeding.

**A.O.V. Classes** (ex. Burmese) have been interesting. Some beautiful **Foreign Whites** have added beauty to the Shows, also some foreign type **Lavenders** with green eyes. Some of these are lovely. A few **British type Smokes** are also very good. These are bred from pedigree cats and in my opinion should be recognised as a separate breed as they are very valuable for breeding.

**Abyssinians** are good, both normal and red. Miss Scatchard's male **Ruizsam** and Kittens **Duamatef** and **Philos Rose Quartz** won well at the Croydon Show. Mrs. Kidd's **Prindos Chacha** was best S.H. Cat. This win was all the more interesting because Chacha was one of a number of cats and kittens rescued from a bad home some months ago. All were neglected and starving. Chacha was having kittens but lost them. Through the efforts of the R.S.P.C.A. and the Cat Care Committee, the cats were placed with a lady who devoted many weeks to them and gradually restored them to health. Several were able to return to their former owners, Chacha being the only one to be shown, and it says much for the care and attention she had had to be shown in such good condition, a friendly and affectionate little cat. I am glad to say that all the cats and kittens who suffered with Chacha are all well and happy. Chacha was bred and owned now by Mrs. Kidd. Mrs. Threadingham's **Red Lance** has done well, with good cats owned by Mrs. Menezes, Mrs. Reading, Mrs. Warren-Hurlock, to name a few, with many good kittens coming along.

**Brown Burmese** have been well represented. Mrs. Bentinck's **Copplestone Chinga**, Mrs. Warren-Hurlock's **Linlinkye Sioux**, Mrs. R. Pocock's **Tapawingo Tagish**, bred by Miss Allen, and Mrs. Short's **Indianqueen Amaranth** are but a few. There have been very big entries of **Blue Burmese** females, many of them very good. Mrs. Dell's **Kupro Blue Onegin**, Mrs. Bentinck's **Copplestone Bluer**, Miss Mack's **Ch. Belcanto Daphne**, Miss Stock's **Hillcross Minthame**, Mrs. Hance's **Kalos Blue Aedon**, etc. Many **Other Colour Burmese** have been seen, many of them good, especially the **Creams, Chocolates** and **Lilacs**.

A few good **Russian Blues** have been exhibited with several good kittens. Mrs. A. Carter, of Skene, near Aberdeen, is doing very well with hers. Living in a cold area of Scotland should have a beneficial effect on the texture of their coats. I was able to judge a very good entry of adults and kittens at the last National Show. Mrs. Monk's **Jennymay Fingal**, bred by Miss Laughler, won the Open Male Championship, Mrs. LeRoy's **Puskin Xenia** was Best Female, Mrs. Garnett's **Anderida Basil** is another good male. Promising kittens were Mrs. Macleod's **Arctic Tumanaevea** and Mr. and Mrs. Petrie's **Petrovna Tushka**; other good cats I have seen are Mrs. Millman's **Broadweir Tamaroff**, bred by Mrs. Foster.

Last but not least are the **Cornish** and **Devon Rexes**. Mrs. Ashford's **Ch. Elan Lord Nelson** and Miss Stock's **Ch. Elan Hi Bobo**, both bred by Mrs. Hilleard, Mrs. G. Fisher's **Sunbronze Danny Boy**, bred by Mrs. Harrison, Mrs. Wakeford's **Si-Rex, Ch. Worthy Khan**. 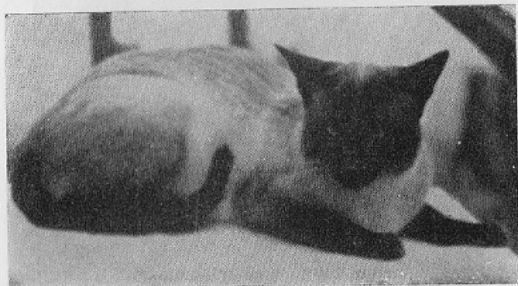
## AN APOLOGY

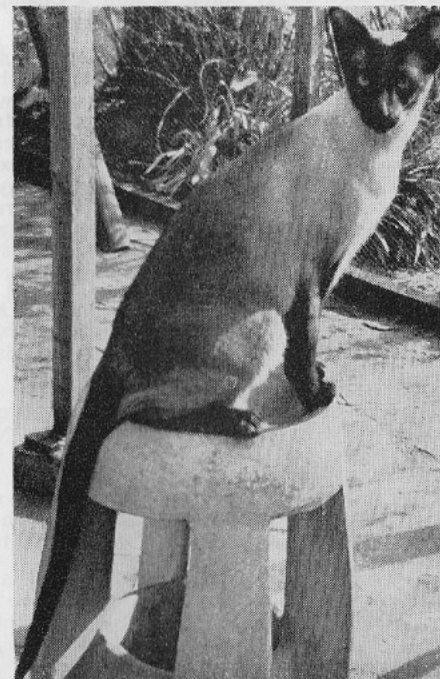
### Herts. and Middlesex

Best wishes to all Siamese exhibitors in the coming show season, 1972-73.

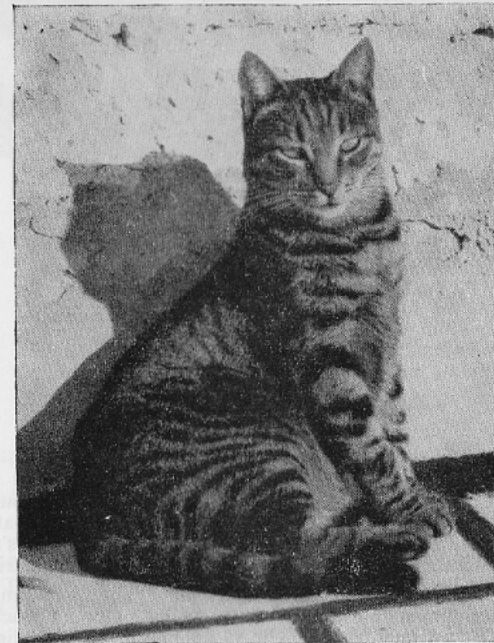

**HINTS FOR USERS OF BOARDING CATTERIES  
AND FOR BOARDING CATTERY OWNERS**

from the  
**FELINE ADVISORY BUREAU**



It is a regrettable but undeniable fact that the overall standard of Boarding Catteries in this country is poor and, in some instances, even shocking. However, since condemnation alone is not constructive, it is hoped that cat owners and Boarding Catteries alike may derive some help from this article.

**Licence required**

In accordance with the Animal Boarding Establishments Act of 1963 all persons who board animals must be in possession of a licence issued by the Local Authority. Whilst it is appreciated that the business of inspecting and issuing licences to boarding establishments, in particular catteries, must form a relatively small part of the work of a Public Health Inspector, it is unfortunately a fact that the majority of these officers have no knowledge whatsoever of the needs and conditions required by cats nor the perils and health hazards arising from bad husbandry, and finally, the distress and suffering, both human and feline, which is the direct outcome of this ignorance.

**Complain**

Many cat owners are unaware that in the event of their being dissatisfied with the conditions under which their cat has been boarded they should complain immediately to the Local Licensing Authority. Many cat owners return from their holiday and are shocked to find that their cat is ill, has escaped or, in some cases, has even died during their absence. Most people in this situation take no further action, thus the Boarding Cattery gets away with it and countless other cats and owners are exposed to the same hazards.

### Inspect first

No cat owners should ever board their cats in a cattery that they have not previously visited and inspected. Both cat owners and Boarding Cattery proprietors alike should realise that the finest buildings in the world are useless unless the husbandry, hygiene and administration of the cattery is meticulous. They should also realise that a Boarding Cattery operates a seven day working week all the year round and shoulders an immense responsibility.

### Help available

In this connection it is felt that it is not sufficiently widely known that real and practical help can be obtained from the Boarding Cattery Information Service of the Feline Advisory Bureau, which is a national organisation, founded in 1958, with a simple and straightforward two-fold aim:

1. Generally to promote humane behaviour towards the cat and to assure its physical well-being by giving advice to owners on its maintenance in health and care in sickness.
2. To establish such special funds as may be thought desirable to promote investigation into feline disorders.

In the pursuance of its primary aim, amongst other things, the Bureau runs a Boarding Cattery Information Service and help from this can be obtained by cat owners, Boarding Cattery proprietors and those considering building catteries. The type of assistance available is outlined briefly below:

**Cat owners.** The F.A.B. maintains a list of Approved Catteries which may be purchased for the sum of 10p, plus postage. The list is divided into three categories:

1. F.A.B. Approved Catteries with star rating;
2. Outdoor Boarding Catteries;
3. Indoor Boarding Catteries.

Those in the first group are veterinary inspected and the star rating awarded by the Council. Those in the other groups are not necessarily constructed to F.A.B. specifications but have completed a comprehensive questionnaire relating to accommodation provided, conditions and management. Included in this list are some of the main points that owners should look for when inspecting a Boarding Cattery and it cannot be emphasised strongly enough that all cat owners should inspect before making a definite booking in order that they may be satisfied that the premises are suitable and that their cat will be well cared for.

**Boarding Cattery Proprietors.** Any Boarding Cattery proprietor can apply to be included in the F.A.B. list and can seek advice or help on any problem of management or husbandry. This service is entirely free.

**Prospective Boarding Cattery Proprietors.** Anyone wishing to build or reconstruct a cattery can obtain the Cattery Construction papers giving the specifications drawn up by the F.A.B. in consultation with the British Small Animals Veterinary Association. Finally, whether owning or boarding cats, to love them is not enough, there must be knowledge, understanding and constant vigilance. Broadly speaking, cats that are boarded are the owner's most precious possession and it is a horrifying fact that there have been many cases of cats escaping from boarding catteries and proprietors of boarding establishments would do well to ponder on the sober truth that a happily and correctly boarded cat will make no attempt to escape.
