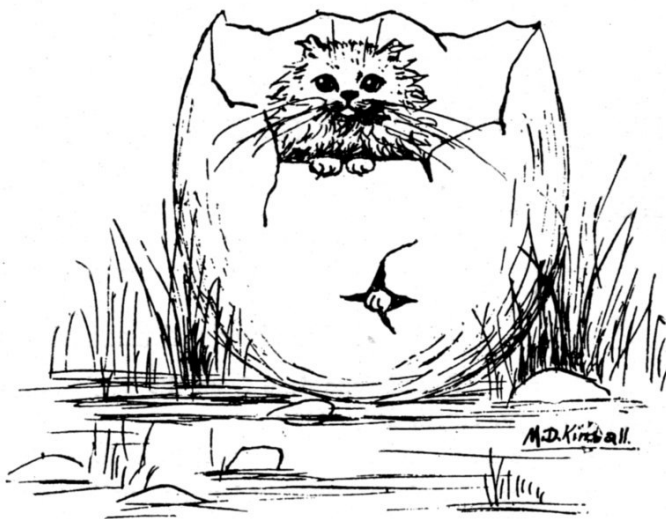

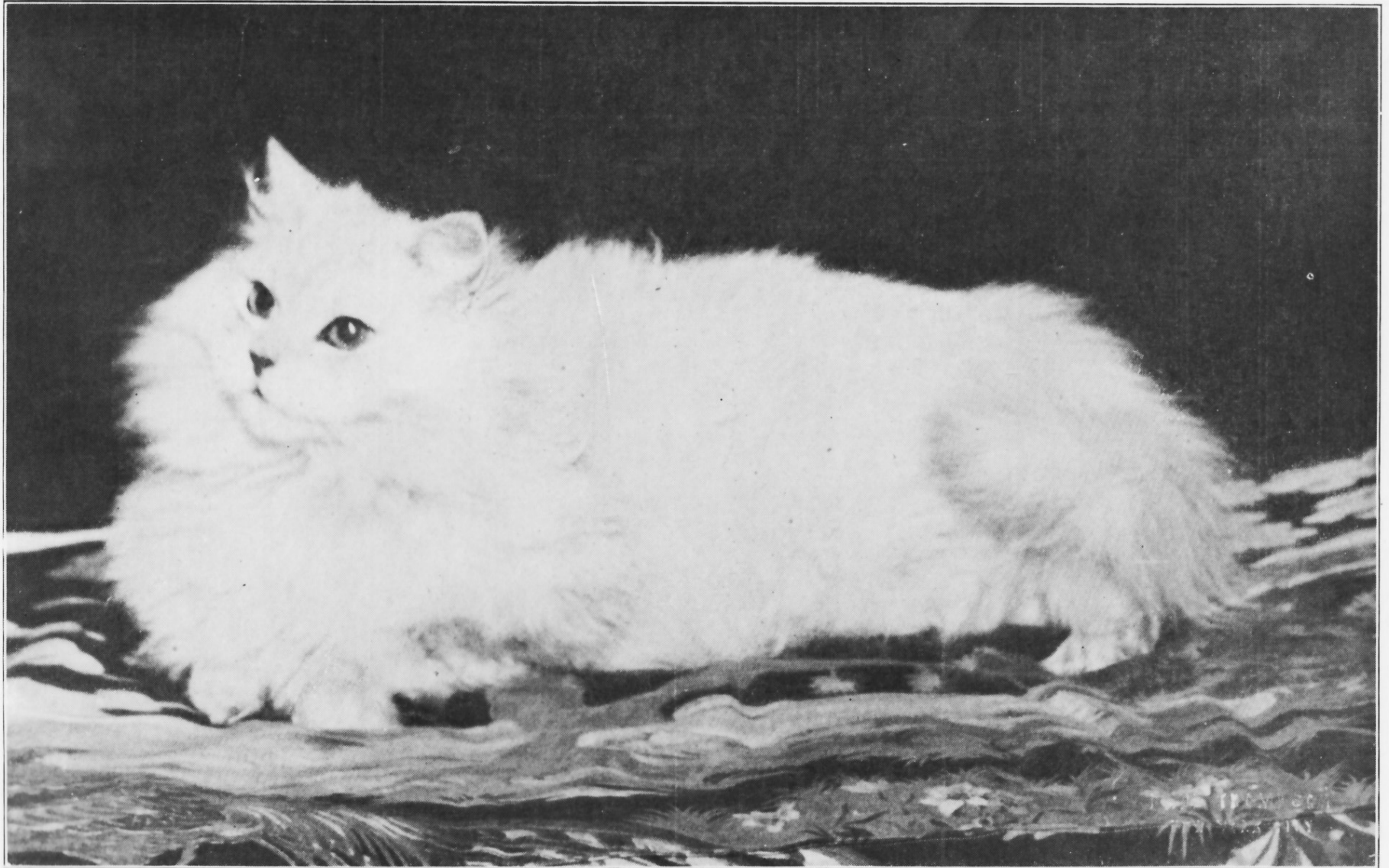

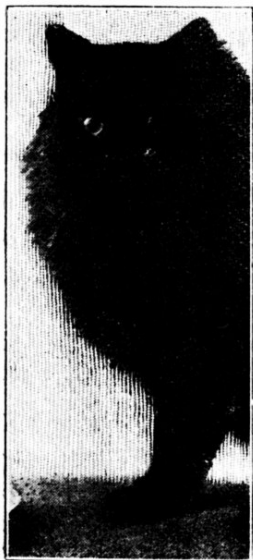

Serenely, as always, he looked at us; but there was no purr, nor was there that other gentle, inarticulate sound which we called talking. He was very still, but very natural. As we all looked at him, he came to us. First, he jumped lightly into my lap, but without the accustomed thud and purr. And, when I stroked his glossy fur, I felt only the folds of my skirt. And he left no tiny grey and black hairs on my dress.

Then, he went to the others in turn, staying longest with my mother, who had, once upon a time, carried him in a basket from Vermont to Albany, and, later, from Albany to the Maine coast and back again. She it was who had given him the most succulent tidbits, liver and steak and cream. She had always been his chief mistress.

We went, as usual, to the sitting-room, and the returned departed tried his favorite old seat in my father's easy chair where, with his head tucked cosily under the tip of his tail, many a happy hour had been slept away. But

he did not take a nap this time. He looked a little hurried. Perhaps it was feline Walpurgis night, with its witching hour earlier than twelve. Or perhaps he had promised the guardian of the animal after-world to come in early. Or, more likely still, there may have been rare sport on in the "Happy Hunting Grounds", or else a duel with some ancient enemy now fated to meet him in ghostly combat, or else some oldtime lady-love, happy with ghostly delights. Be that as it may, Grimalkin, the courteous, the loving, had but a few moments left for us. Gravely, for a trice, he stood beside the register, where he was wont to warm his paws; quickly, he leaped up the stairs, went through each room, gazed at the beds where he had stolen soft, luxurious naps, looked at his own comfortable little corner, and then came buoyantly back to the hall. There, with conscious grace, he arched his back, looking mutely at the door. When we said:

"Goodbye, Kitty, come again," and started for the door, he was gone. He went as he came, unnoticed, alone. Nor has he ever come again.

But, fearing lest his spirit be as jealous as his earthly self was used to be, no other sits upon his rug or lies upon his bed. No interloper has his place. We shall always, everyone of us, love animals, large and small; but he was, and still is, Grimalkin, to whom there can be no successor, no rival. Wherever his brave spirit wanders, he is our little friend, our comrade, gentle, kindly, whether he is a memory, or a silent, departed spirit. Peace to Grimalkin's Shade!
