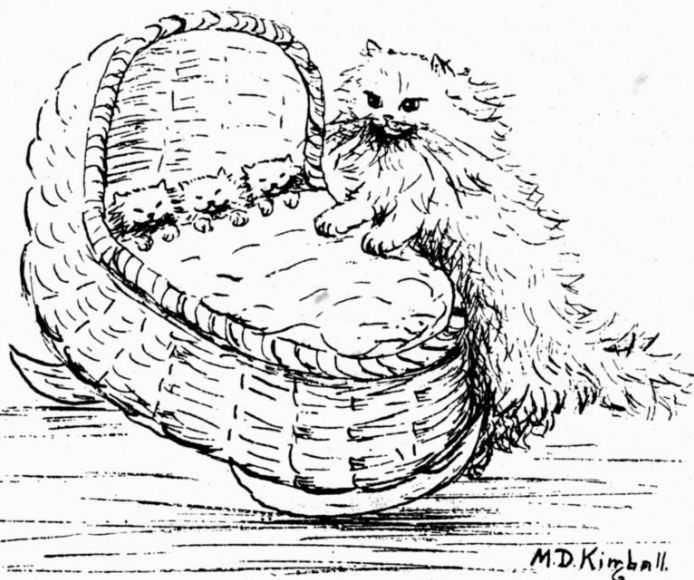

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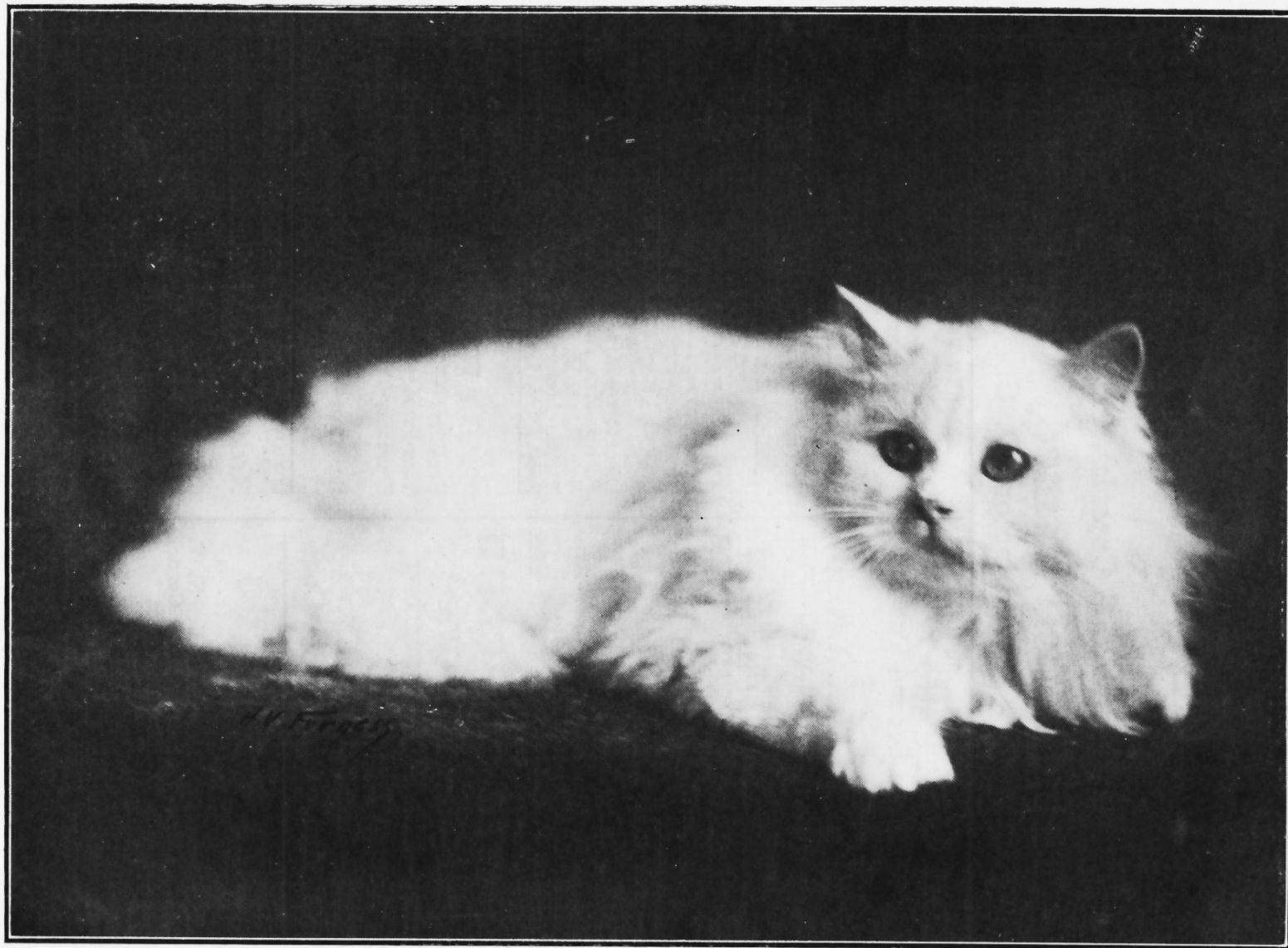

## Suggestions on the Care and Training of Mother Cats and Kittens.

### PART II.



Keep your cats happy. When I think of the well fed, but lonely little cats shut up in small rooms or runs for practically their whole lives, or even for days, it is distressing. People who do this are not cat lovers though they may be cat breeders. The hours of waiting and watching are very long. Try to let each cat take part in the family life for a while every day, if it is not advisable to let them have the run of the house all the time, as in my case. Or, if you have many and they must be kept outside, at least see that they have windows that they can look out of, and

spend plenty of time with them.

One of the first steps toward happiness is to see that there is no cause for annoyance. Worms, fleas and ear canker should be cleared away at once, and I have found that these things are usually some of the unfortunate results of a good time in the country.

Begin by battling with the fleas and the ear canker. If there are only a few fleas, Spratt's No. 8 steel comb will do the work. Talk to puss and make her your partner while you are doing this. It tends to make her intelligent. If she is restless and wants to go just when you are trying to catch one of the pest, an excited "wait a minute, wait a minute," will probably keep her and "there, I've got him" is plainly understood by my pets. It is said that the life of a flea, from the time the egg is laid until the adult flea dies is three weeks, so it should not take longer than this to be entirely rid of them. The white eggs are found where the cats lie down, so sweep these places every day, not forgetting the floor. In warm weather the eggs hatch in less than four days and the first stage of the flea's life is a horrid little worm. If you discover that your cat has many fleas (they may come quite suddenly) make short work of them. Spread a square yard of canton flannel on your lap, soft side up, take puss up and pin the middle of one side around her neck with the safety pin at the nape of her neck. Rub motholine in the fur all around her body then fold the canton flannel up over her sides and across her back. Be sure that her tail is comfortably by her side and double the back side of the flannel up over her back. This puts her in a snug bundle. Have

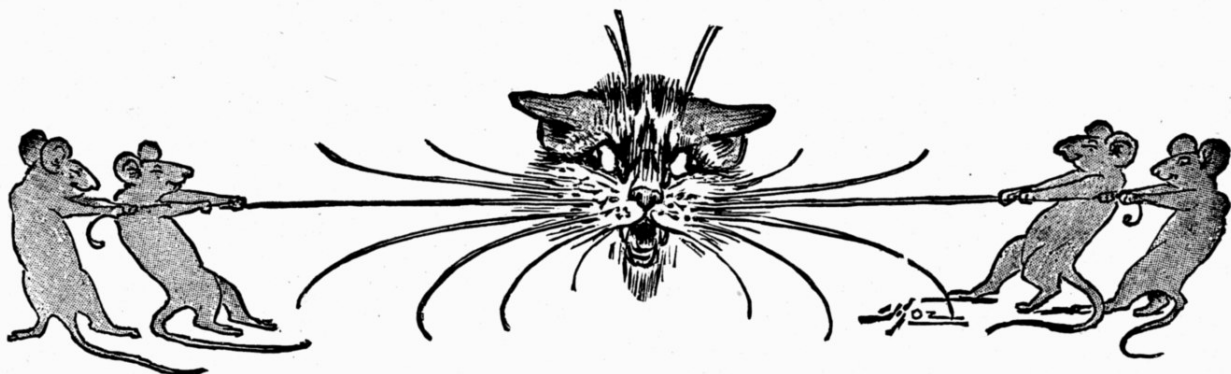
a basin of water and the fine comb ready and you will have a lively few minutes ocmbing off the fleas that try to escape, by way of her neck into her eyes, nose, mouth and ears. Of course, you will talk to her and she will soon know that you are helping her. It takes half an hour to kill the fleas. Then unwrap her and brush and comb out all the mothaline and dead fleas. Brush and comb again the next morning for a few sick fleas may be left. I have heard that spirits of camphor is better than the mothaline as there are no camphor flakes to brush out, but have not tried this.

I used to wrap my cats up in the same way when treating for ear canker but can nearly always manage now by talking to them and by a little extra hugging. It is usually the side of the ear toward the head that is the more tender. If there is any dirt at all in a cat's ear it should be cleaned out. I use the smaller end of a wooden tooth pick. Wrap a rather small piece of absorbent cotton around it so that the tip is safely covered, dip it in a little olive oil and touch around as far as you can see in each ear. Then wipe out the first ear, using fresh cotton after each time you bring out any dirt. When the ear is well cleaned, if there is no danger of any cat or kitten licking its ear, by means of a smooth piece of paper, slip well into the ear a little powdered boracic acid and iodoform, equal parts, fold the tip of the ear over the opening and gently massage so that the medicine reaches all parts. If any of the mixture is on the outside of the ear, wipe it off as it is poisonous. After treating the other ear hold puss and pet her for a few minutes or better still, have a protonuclein tablet in your apron pocket and give that to her so as to take her mind off of what has been done and perhaps make her forget to scratch her ears. Ears should be treated before, not after feeding and protonuclein should be given not less than an hour before a meal. If it is just before a meal time, and puss is a good feeder, her saucer of food may make her forget to dig at her ears, but I like the protonuclein, it is so cute to see them nose for their "candy" as soon as the disagreeable business is over.

Always try to avoid anything unpleasant or exciting after feeding. Take a magnifying glass and see if there are any of those horrid crawling creatures on the dirt you have taken out of the ears. I have never seen these after the first treatment. For subsequent treatments when each ear is cleaned I touch a fresh applicator of cotton in the mixture and wipe the ear with that. The least touch of it stays, and this seems to answer well without the danger of spreading the disagreeable odor.

If cats or kittens might lick the cat's ears, use the powdered boracic acid alone. A pinch of this can be put in each ear with the fingers, but this takes longer to cure canker than the mixture. If it is a bad case of canker treat the ears every two or three days, or even every day if they are dirty.

When there are no more fleas and the ear canker is under control the worming can have attention. It is much better to worm a cat before signs of trouble.



# In Memoriam

Mrs. Clinton Locke

On Saturday, March 29th, Mrs. Clinton Locke died at her home, 2825 Indiana Avenue, Chicago.

Mrs. Locke passed out of this life just as she would have desired—going just as those who loved her would have wished her to go—without suffering—just a drifting across the border in sleep, in the early morning hours. Then there was that day when the beautiful flowers eloquently expressed what words could not. The sweet music, and the comforting last words by a life-long friend, and the last farewell was over.

For many years Mrs. Locke was a conspicuous figure, one might say the principal figure in the Fancy, as there was no one who worked more for its betterment, or who gave more generously for its perpetuation. Five years ago she suffered a stroke, since which time she lived very quietly in her home in the city, but passing a few months each year at her summer home in Wequetonsing, and only her nearest of kin, and dearest of friends were privileged to visit her.

Gifted intellectually, and specially endowed with traits which fitted her for leadership, this quality was recognized by all who knew her; but though she was always a leader, she lead willing subjects; she always dominated where she was interested, but her dominion was based on love and kindness, and her diplomacy was used not for selfish ends or self-aggrandizement, but to harmonize all discordancies, and her retirement from the Fancy, when health begun to fail, left a void that has never been filled

Though not the founder of the Beresford Club, she was its president for a long period, and it was named, at her suggestion, for her personal friend, Lady Marcus Beresford. She was one of the founders of the American Cat Association, and it was her pleasure to give it much time and consideration. When in health she had manifold interests and was always busy with her pen, for charity, for church or club, and an appeal from any source always brought a response, and the response brought comfort, either to mind or body, for her heart was full of sympathy, and her unerring judgment dictated the pressing need. In Mrs. Locke's horoscope occurs the following words, "These people represent the heart force of humanity," and that is so true of her, that it seems that the expression might be personal to her.

It is splendid to have lived a life so full—to have gained so much from happiness and from sorrow—to have learned all the lessons life has offered, no matter how grievous to bear—to have come through with the understanding that can be obtained only through such lessons. To meet all trials, all emergencies, all disappointments with the assurance, the calm, the poise which only strength of character and grace of mind can bestow. With such power was gifted our friend who has passed from among us. . . . May the calmness, the peace, and the sweetness of her influence long remain with us.

### SILVER SOCIETY NOTES

A special meeting of the Silver Society was held on March 11, 1919, with Mrs. Sturgis, the President, in the chair.

After the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, Miss J. R. Kroeh, Board Member, made a verbal report of the proceedings of the annual meeting of the Cat Fanciers' Association.

The report was accepted and after considerable discussion a resolution was presented and adopted to the effect that the members present disapproved of the unfair treatment directed against the Silver Society and of certain irregularities which occurred at the annual meeting of the C. F. A. The resolution furthermore included the following clause:

"That it is the sense of this meeting that the Silver Society should withdraw from membership with the Cat Fanciers' Association."

A final clause of the resolution instructed the Secretary to communicate the action to other associate clubs.

A second special meeting of the Silver Society was held on March 26, 1919, the President, Mrs. Sturgis, presiding.

A motion was properly made and carried that the action of the special meeting of March 11th be ratified, and the Silver Society withdraw from the Cat Fanciers' Association.

Certain proposed amendments made necessary by the aforesaid action, were adopted.

The show report, which had been previously submitted and approved, but upon which final action had been deferred until the war tax should be adjusted, was again submitted, and the Treasurer was instructed to remit \$250.00 to the New York Women's League for Animals.

Still another special meeting of the Silver Society was held on April 8, 1919, with the President in the chair.

By resolution duly carried the formation of a new Association of Cat Clubs was proposed, to be known as the United Cat Fanciers' Association, of which the Silver Society would be a founder. The resolution further stipulated that the Constitution would be the joint effort of those clubs desiring to join the Association.

Furthermore, it was agreed that such new organization would "allow all championship points won at C. F. A. shows prior to February, 1919," and "also C. F. A. registrations made before that date."

Plans for the next show were discussed and tentative dates in January were agreed upon. A double show having been suggested, Miss Kroeh was elected judge of one of the sections. Mrs. H. L. West was again elected manager.
