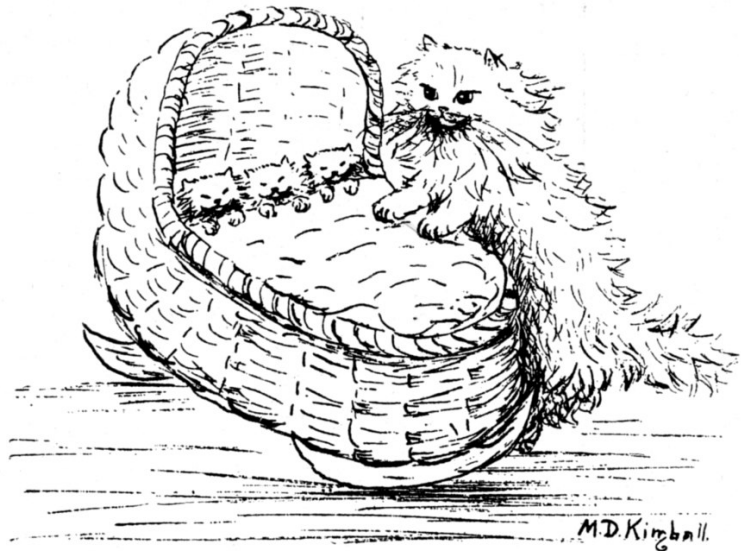

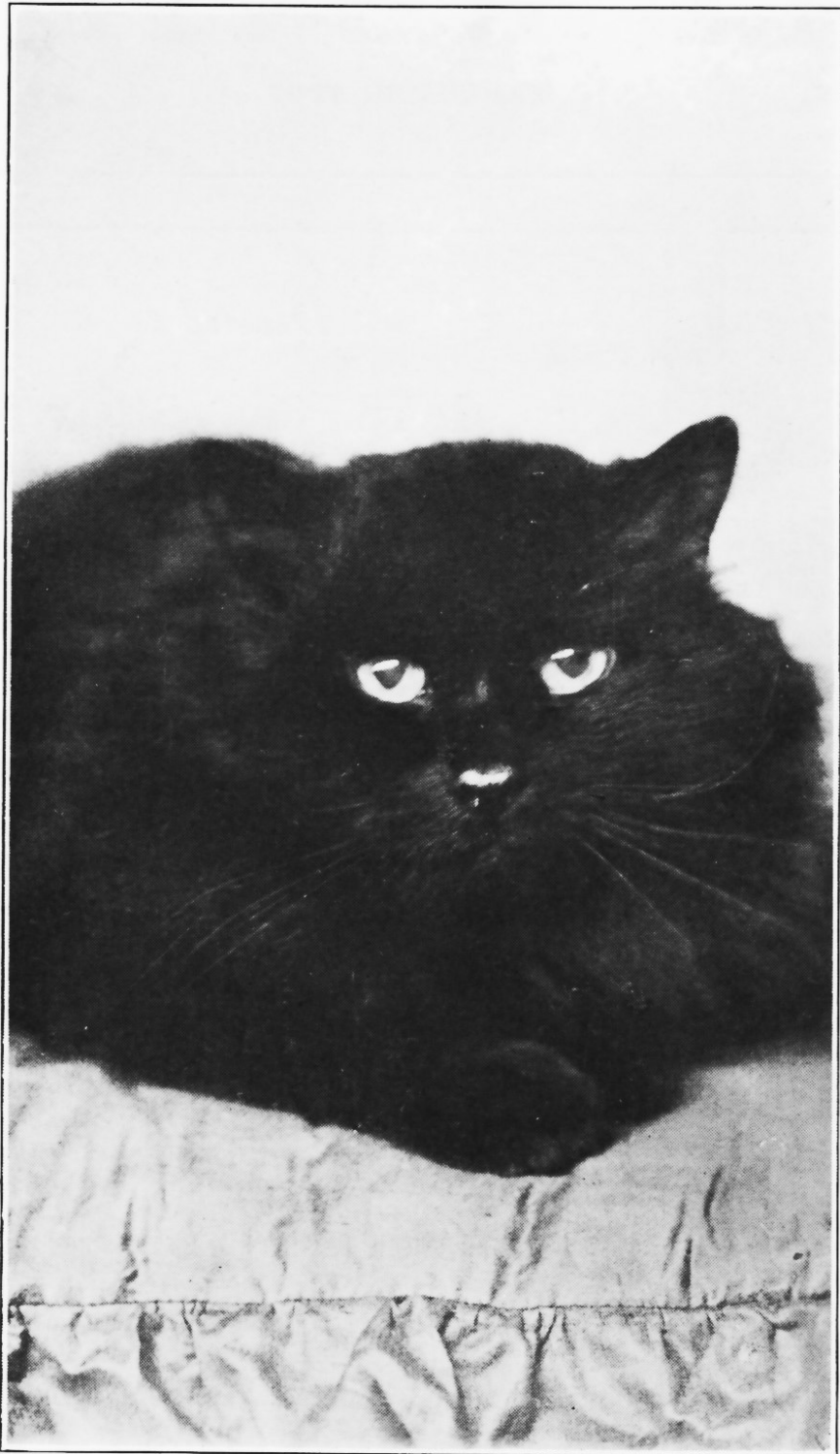

Diseases of Cats



Dear Sir:—A few of my kittens, just over three months (common varieties), have been seized with a sudden illness, which usually ends fatally. The symptoms are: lethargy or dullness, vomiting (sometimes frothy, sometimes yellow or green matter, with violent retching, and occasionally flesh-coloured round worms, having well marked rings). In the final stages the kitten appears to be helpless, staggering or crawling and twisting. The duration is short, about, thirty-six hours from the first appearance, which is indicated by a refusal of all food. I have tried calomel, but this has failed to move the bowels. I should be very pleased if you would indicate the illness and its prevention and remedy.

[Your kittens have died of epizootic gastroenteritis, which has prevailed and destroyed hundreds of cats, especially young ones, all over the United Kingdom during the last eight or nine months. It is of bacterial origin, and is probably conveyed by infection, although in many instances this has seemed doubtful. Your description gives a very fair account of the symptoms. This is a very fatal disease; quite ninety per cent. of the young cats die from it. You might try permanganate of potassium, 4 gr., in 1 oz. of boiled or distilled water, and give a teaspoonful every two hours. If the cat survives twenty-four hours after this, drop a 2 gr. tabloid of carbonate of bismuth down the back of the throat morning and evening, and feed on equal parts of lime water and milk. This is a disease which the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries might investigate, as in consequence of it cats for mice have become scarce, and therefore expensive.—The Bazaar, Exchange and Mart.]

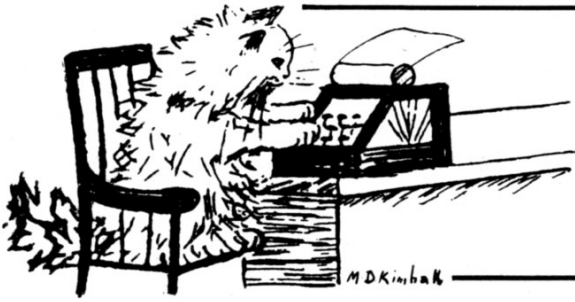

Editor Cat Review:

In response to the request to send in things which have been helpful to us I offer the following as a remedy for some cases of poisoning.

I once had a litter of delicate kittens, and when they were nearly six weeks old I noticed, one evening, quite a large swelling on the side of the jaw of one of them. The next morning this lump had disappeared and I felt much relieved. The kitten seemed all right until the early afternoon of the day after this. I fed him his lunch at two o'clock and at three I noticed that he was weak. I gave him a few drops of olive oil and he lapped water of his own accord. The kitten was growing weaker rapidly, especially in the hind legs. At 3.30 he nursed. At 3.43 I gave him a little water, which he liked.

At that time I had a splendid New England woman with me, who knew a good deal about cats. We both thought that the kitten was poisoned by the abscess breaking on the inside. She said that she had known of a dog that had been poisoned being cured by butter.

The kitten was now so weak that he could hardly walk at all. At four o'clock we gave him a little butter and the mother cat washed

Urge all cat fanciers to use the greatest care with regard to their matings this year. The disease so ably put before us in Mrs. Harris' article in the December number it is feared has crept into other catteries. Those where the greatest care is taken may be the first to detect the trouble. Learn positively if the stud to which you propose taking your queen has been siring successfully right up to date, and if your queen has not been in kitten the last time she was mated, make certain of the cause of her failure before you take her to any sire, even your own. If your queen has miscarried after her last mating it is your duty to inform the stud's owner of this fact and give her the option of declining the queen. Stud owners should examine all queens for local discharge.

Mrs. Crompton's kind letter in the January number moves us to say that we are quite sure that the Review is worth more than the very moderate subscription rate might indicate. Also its cost to produce is not at all in proportion to this sum.

I always make notes of cases such as this for future use, and hope that these may be of help to some one else. Perhaps I did not do everything just right but at the rate he was going he would have died soon and he did get well quickly.

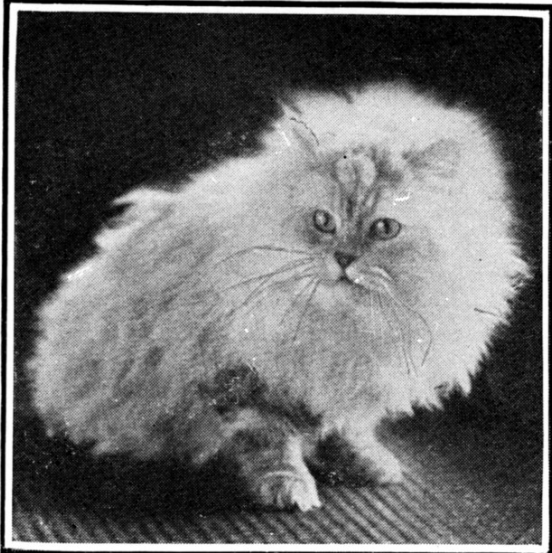

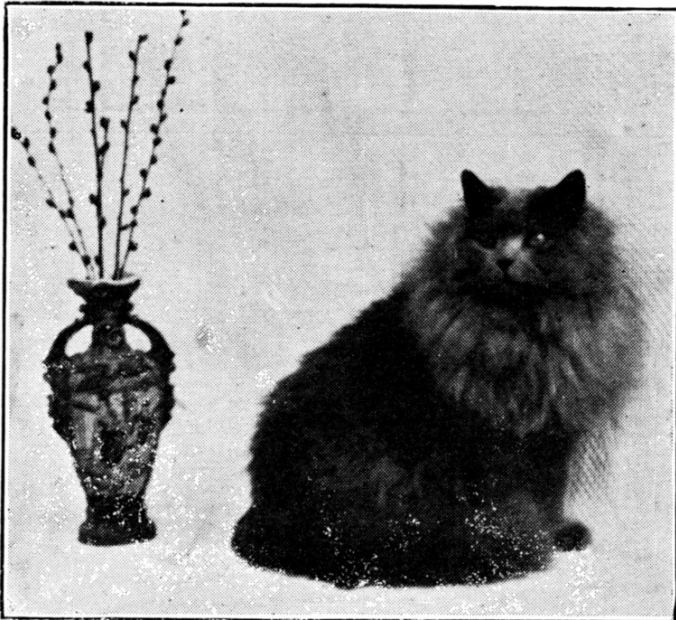
