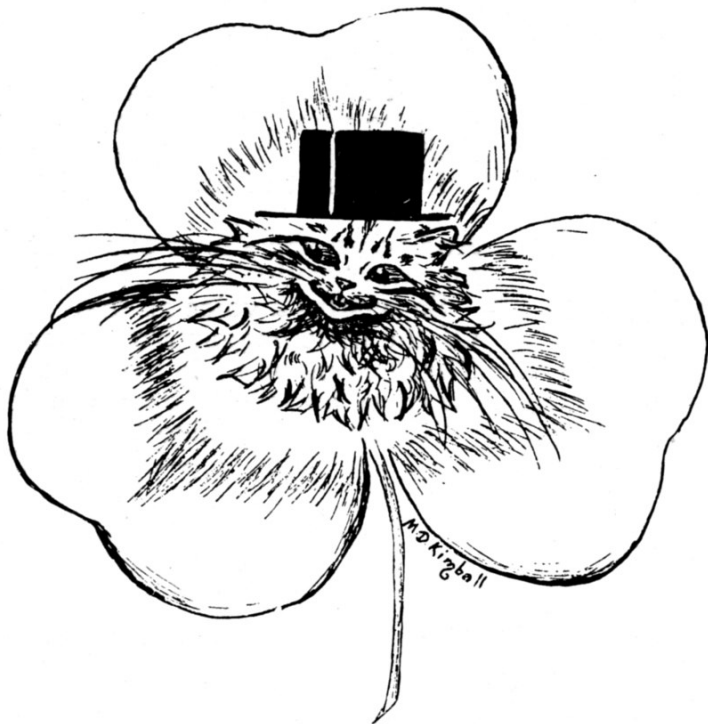

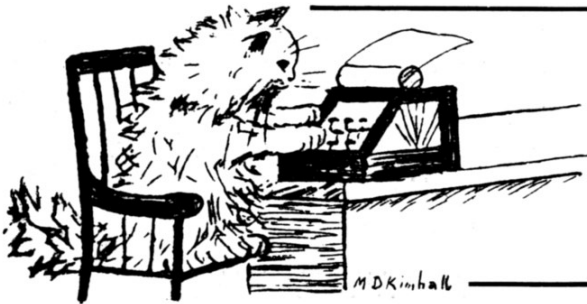

## Correspondence

Editor Cat Review:

Under heading, "Diseases of Cats," February Review, I note the remedy for what is claimed to be a fatal disease. Had the following been tried, results might have been different.

At first symptoms of nausea I give a small dose of castor oil. Then I prepare medicine as follows: Half a teaspoonful of equal parts of carbonate of bismuth and cereum oxilate and fill up spoon with distilled water. I put two such spoonfuls in half a glass of water and give a spoonful at every symptom of vomit. Have cured well-nigh hopeless cases of gastritis and feel that I have prevented others. I always keep a supply on hand, and if puss has nothing more than a hair ball, the remedy settles the stomach just the same. A veterinarian gave me a prescription for tablets of same drugs, to be used in small doses to settle the system after a series of convulsions.

The cat described in this article should have been wormed weeks before this attack; it is fatal to go after worms after the cat is sick. The thing to do is to offset inroads of inflammation and attendant exhaustion; a drop or so of paregoric could be used to keep the cat quiet.

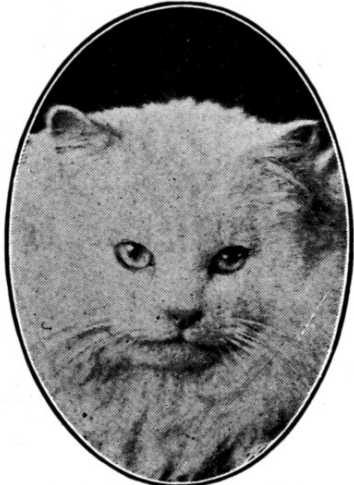

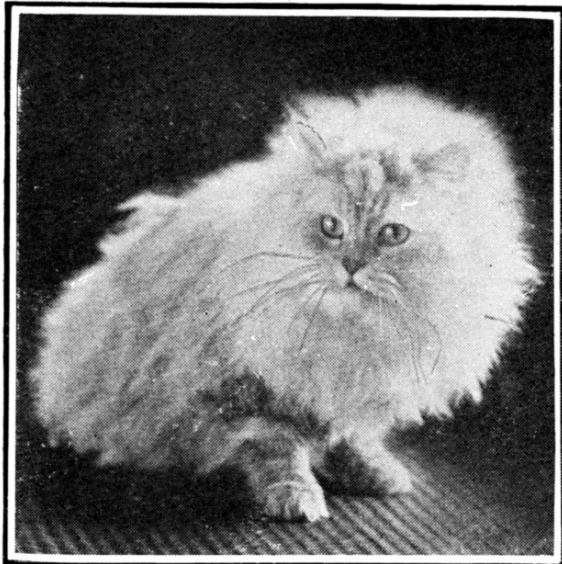

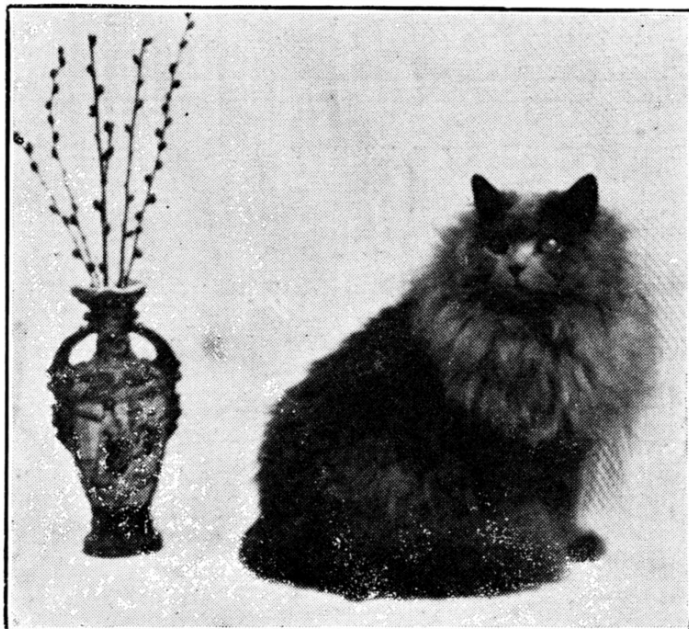
