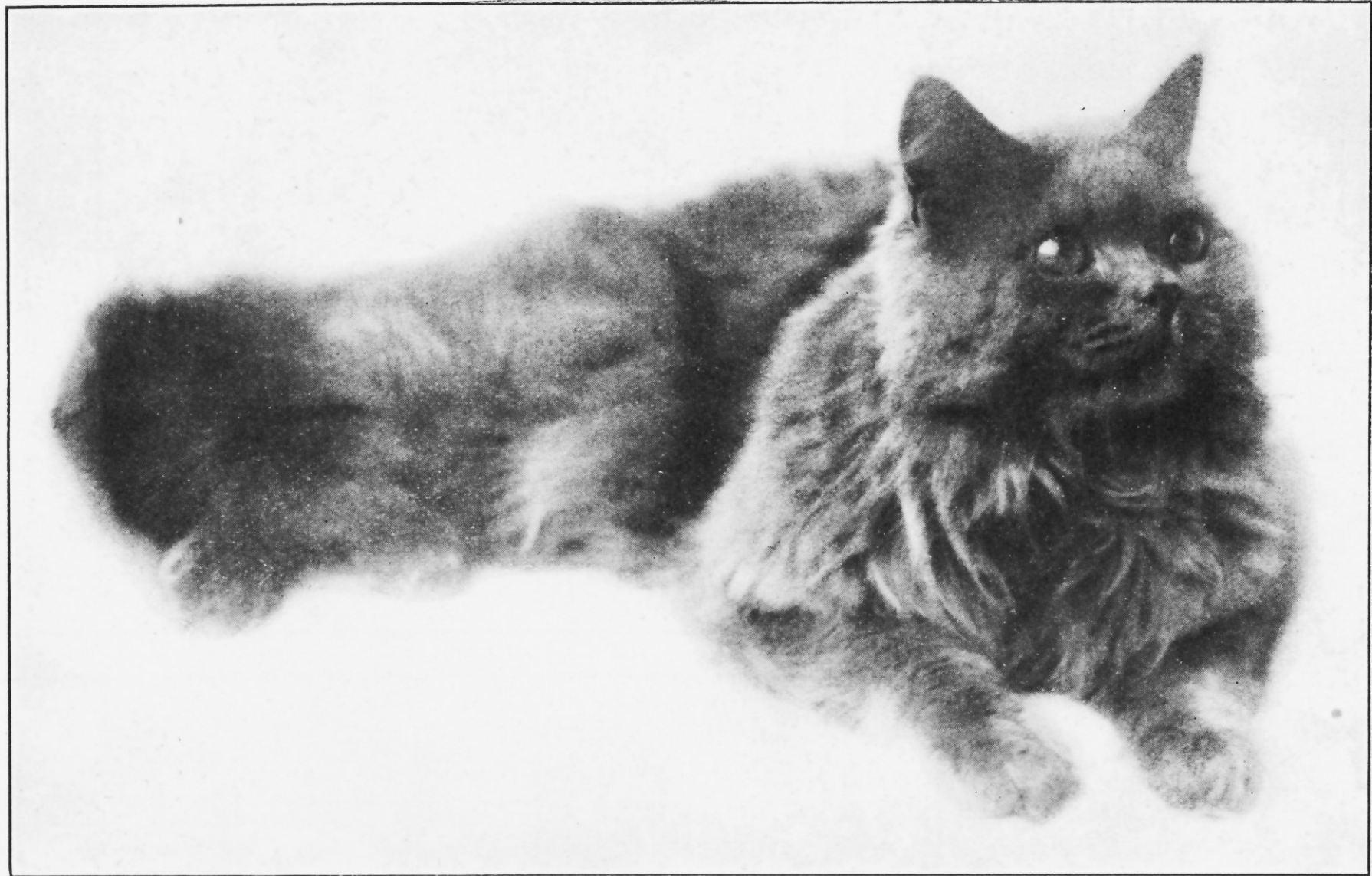

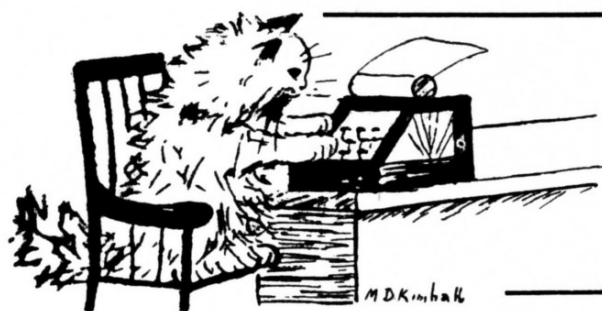

Correspondence

Editor Cat Review.

Thinking that the following from Fur and Feather may be of interest to breeders of blue cats, am hoping that you may have space for it.

“This color (blue) undoubtedly has the greatest following. The star of the Blue has been in the ascendant ever since champion Woolloomooloo was first penned, which, I believe, if memory serves me right, occurred in the early nineties. I am going from memory, only, so stand for correction in saying that Mrs. Dean, of Slough, or was it Mr. Hawkins, was the owner at the time. He will stand out for all time as the progenitor of this charming variety, and to him, I think, most of the present-day blues can trace their origin. Three cats that will never be forgotten are Woolloomooloo, Xenophon, and Zaida. The manner in which the devotees of this color have stuck to their guns, commands, I might say demands, the respect and admiration of all. Fighting against long odds, they have climbed right to the top of the tree, working year in, year out, with unflinching tenacity of purpose, one point in view—success—and it they have undoubtedly achieved. First, they had to contend with the very dark-blue, then the smoky-blue, the slate-blue, and the washy-faded blue. Then they were patchy, full of brindling, and tabby markings, till at last, by dint of sheer hard work, breeders achieved their one ambition, and got the lovely pale shade of blue of a rich lavender tint, which is now the recognized color of the Blue Persian Cat

Society, entirely free from markings and shadings, and which, in most cases, breeds true to color.

"The eyes want to be of the deepest copper color, which is such a glorious contrast, and gives such a striking appearance, and compels your admiration.

"I shall always be the one to give Mrs. Slingsby and Miss Jay the greatest praise for bringing the Blue Persian so prominently to the front, though one must not forget Miss Frances Simpson, with her unflagging energy and indomitable pertinacity of purpose."

In the next issue of Fur and Feather, Miss Frances Simpson replies to the latter paragraph.

"I thank 'Billie Barlow' for his complimentary remarks re myself and Blue Persians, in a late issue of Fur and Feather, but he does not remember, it is so long ago, when I exhibited the first blues ever seen in any other color class at the Crystal Palace. Then, in 1889, Mr. A. A. Clarke and I agitated with other fanciers and obtained a class for self colored blues. For a long time this breed was called 'Self Blues,' in contradistinction to the many blue tabbies. In 1890, the sexes in the self blue class were divided, my famous Beauty Boy taking first in the males, and Mrs. H. B. Thompson's Winkie first in females. It was at Crufts Show, in 1894, that Mr. Hawkins exhibited Wooloomooloo. Miss Jay started blues in 1891, and Mrs. Slingsby years afterwards. In 1901 I founded the Blue Persian Cat Society, and became honorable secretary, which post I held for ten years, and am now president, and am very proud of the B. P. C. S., with its long list of members and good balance at the bank. We have just published a leaflet with the names of 43 blue studs, their owners and parentage. As I write I have a Blue Persian cat curled up on my desk, and an impudent Buzz kitten sits on my shoulder watching my pen. This year I hope to have a very special general meeting of the B. P. C. S. to celebrate the twentieth year of the Society's existence."

I hope to have a little more to say regarding the blues in the near future, if you will allow me space. Very truly yours,

catty, without fear of missing the boat, until the call came, "All ashore that's going ashore."

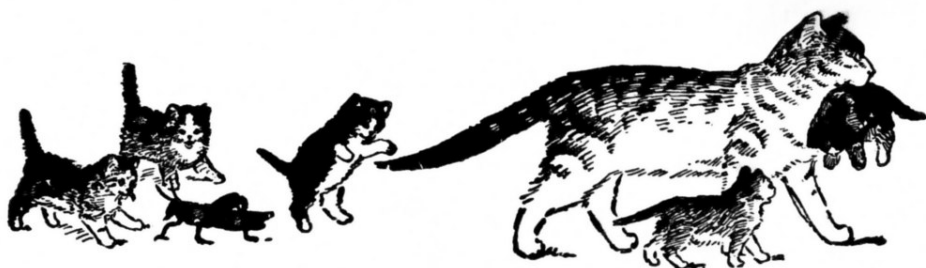
Florida is planning to have two cat shows this winter—one in Tampa and one in Jacksonville.

Most cat fanciers are beginning to think of the coming cat shows, and now is the time to be bringing our cats into condition, if we do not always keep them according to what is best for each season. Ears, fleas, and worms, should be attended to, and coats should be carefully groomed so that there will be no matted hair, for the rule against hair being cut off is to be more strictly enforced than ever, at least by C. F. F. shows. Also be sure that there is no dryness nor irritation of the skin to cause scratching and consequent loss of coat.

It is good business to make good cats well-known. The way our news columns are not used is out of all proportion to our large number of subscribers, and this leads us to think that the methods of the Review, in this respect, are not generally understood. When a cat is bought we can print free in our news columns the names of both parties, the cat's name, and the name of its sire and dam, and tell something interesting about the cat: what it is like, etc., or something about its new home.

Do not let people forget your cats. If you begin with a visit notice, and then a birth notice, people know that you and your cats are alive. Then, if necessary, a "for sale" advertisement, and when a kitten is sold a little free write-up keeps your cats quite constantly before the fancy. Cat fanciers like to become acquainted with you in this way and to read these things. We need to know each other better all around.
