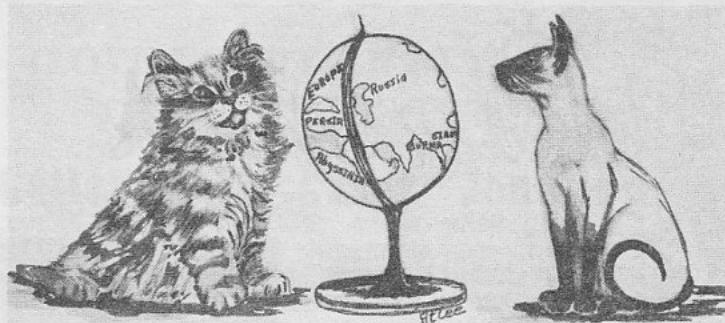

II - BRITISH BLUE, CREAM & BLUE-CREAM SH.

Before 1896 the shorthaired cat was more popular than the longhair, and, from the beginning, the blue has been an extremely appealing color variety. The native British shorthaired blue has been developed into a beautiful animal and has gained the interest of breeders in the United States as well.

In the earliest era Miss Cochrane owned *CHELSEA THISTLEDOWN*, *SPEEDWELL* and *GREY DAWN*,



but it was her cat *BLUE PETER* who won well as early as 1911. Among the early blue breeders were Lady Rachel Alexander who owned *BALLOCHMYLE BLUE KING* and *BROTHER BUMP*; Mrs. S. Woodiwiss had *BLUE BOY*, and Miss H. Hill Shaw owned *CHELSEA TWILIGHT*.

CH. PENSYLVA PANSY, Blue Cream, held 12 Challenge Certs. at the age of 5.

Little is recorded about the blue until after 1930 when *TWINK OF BLAYDON*, *MICKEY OF ODERSFELT* and *CAPER MIDGE* were on the scene. At about the same time the creams began to increase in popularity. Lady Rachel Alexander developed a winning cat in her *BALLOCHMYLE CREAM CRACKER*; *GALBRE*, belonging to Miss Bowley, and *CREAM COURTIER OF PLAICEY* shown by Mrs. Harper were also winners.

Perhaps the most significant event in the history of the British Blue occurred in 1943, a relatively late date in the history of cats, but that year marked the beginning of the most magnificent examples of the color and the breed. It was the time that Rev. B. Rees bred two excellent cats, *SYLVAN JOEY* and *SYLVAN TIMMY*. Although *JOEY* failed to sire, *SYLVAN TIMMY* was the predecessor of the finest lines in recent history.

The cream lines are closely intertwined for Mrs. J. Cattermole crossed a longhaired cream to *SYLVAN TIMMY*, and the resulting litter consisted of three cream males and two blue-creams. The females survived and one was crossed to *SYLVAN QUICKEE* who thus sired *MINGSWYCK APOLLO*, a cream male, and *MINGSWYCK BLUE PRINCE*.

How remarkable it is that the British Blues and Cream Shorthairs continued to do so well from 1943. Most breeds suffered greatly during the war years. The lines were established and continued. The Mingswyck cats and the Jezreel cats of Mrs. I. Johnson continued in popularity.

In the mid and late 1950's the blues, cream and blue-creams established the British Shorthairs in the hearts of American breeders. The blue-creams, although unrecognized officially, were developing well. In 1951 *MINGSWYCK MYSTERIOUS MAID* was born. Mrs. Phyllis Hughes and Mrs. Attwood were important breeders at that time.

BROUGHTON JANE, bred by Mrs. Hughes, was born in 1955. She resulted from a cross between a British Blue female and *DANEHURST PETER*, a cream longhair. Mrs. Hughes played a great part in achieving official sanction for the blue-cream.

CH. PENSYLVA QUICKEE, British Blue son of CH. JEZREEL JAKE and CH. BROUGHTON JANE, was born August 27, 1962.



Two years before *BROUGHTON JANE* was acquired by Mrs. Joan Richards, a very fine blue male was born. This was the famous *LITTLEWICKERS BLUE SERGE* bred by the Misses E. and C. Chatterton of Sussex. (Cont'd on p. 29)

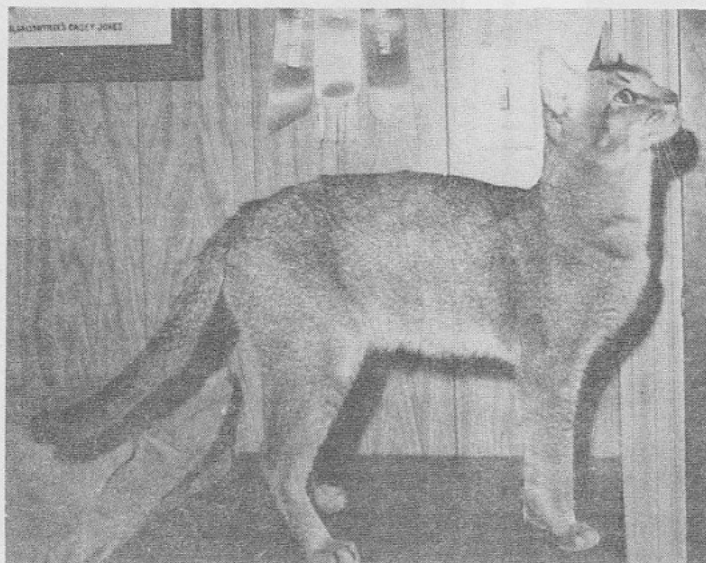

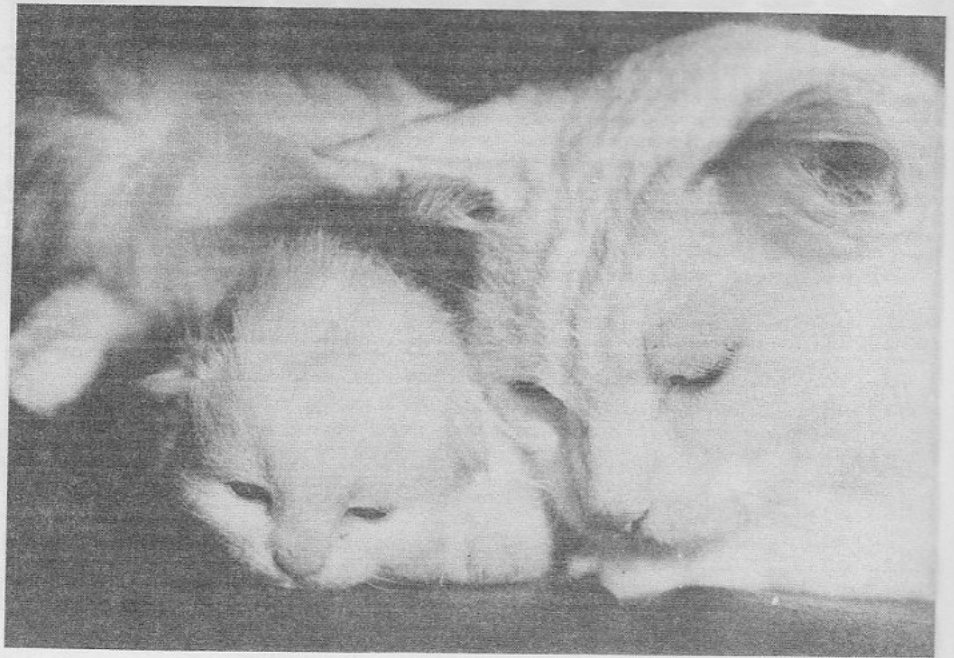

MAINE COON CAT

No cat in the fancy has more colorful legends surrounding it than the Maine Coon. Stories of sailors in the 1800's returning home to the East Coast of U.S.A. from foreign lands bringing their pets with them; Marie Antoinette shipping her lovely pets to the new world; and stories of Bob Cats mating with our own Domestic or with Canadian Lynx, and whatever else, to produce a large cat. As fascinating as these stories are, one must return to reality and find that the Maine Coon Cat of questionable origin has been the favored cat of the Northeastern United States for generations and was used by the farmers in the State of Maine to keep the rodent population down with such success that they

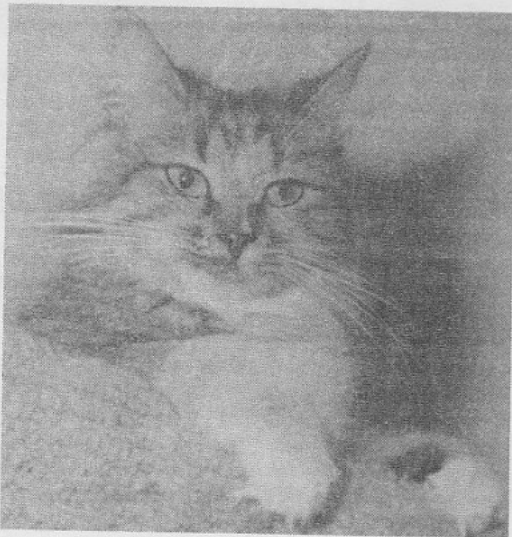
found their way into the farms of other Northern States where they were used for the same purpose.

In the mid-1800's the people of Maine gathered together for good times bringing with them their favorite, as well as what they regarded as their prize cats to tell tales about. Perhaps this started what we now call cat shows.

A Maine Coon by the name of *KING MAX* won the Boston Show in the very late 1800's. The first volume of the CFA Register listed 28 Maine Coon Cats. The Maine Coon dropped out of the show circuit in the early 1900's possibly because of the many new imported breeds. Interest in the Maine Coon remained in Maine, however, where often the townfolks put on a cat show of strictly Maine Coons. Passersby stopped in, liked what they saw, and the Maine Coon made its comeback into the show circuit in the mid-1960's.

The Maine Cat, 1973-style, is not quite as large as our ancestors deemed them to be. The average male at maturity (three years) ranges from 15 to 20 lbs. and the female 8 to 10 lbs. There are exceptions, of course, but the so-called 40-pounder, or anything close to that size, remains few in number; a conservative figure would be around 8 nationwide and most of them are neuters or spays. Perhaps because of its past colorful history, many people still believe the Maine Coon is indeed very massive. There isn't a Maine Coon breeder known who hasn't received inquiries from prospective buyers wanting nothing less than a guarantee of a kitten that will go to 30 lbs. or more!

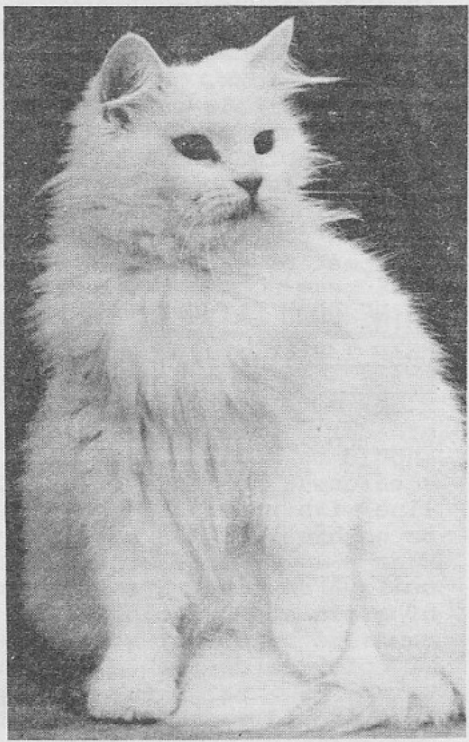
The Maine Coon is a very friendly, intelligent and quiet animal. Its soft coat is unlike the Persian or Angora to the touch.

The fur goes from short on the back to longer as it approaches the stomach and britches where it is the longest. Unlike the Persian, the body is long, muscular and powerful. The rump is slightly higher than the front. Delightful to the breeder and exhibitor is the little grooming required by the Maine. A few strokes with a comb and the cat is ready for a prospective buyer; a few minutes combing each day for a week and the cat is ready to be shown. The breed is extraordinarily healthy and, although like any other cat it can fall to a fatal disease, the minor problems of coughs, aches and pains are infrequent if non-existent. Deafness in the blue-eyed white is rare. There is a large variety of colors and patterns of Maines: they come in every known color as well as a few colors of their own. As one Maine Coon breeder puts it: 'the color of the rainbow plus'.

Over 2,000 inquiries have been answered by the Maine Coon Breeders & Fanciers Assn. since they were formed with a nucleus of six breeders in 1968. This organization has done more for the Maine Coon than anyone and now has members in 34 states and 5 Canadian provinces. Joining in the quest for the promotion and preservation of 'America's Original Longhair' was the Maine Coon Cat Society and the International Maine Coon Cat Society. June, 1972, brought about the beginning of a momentous occasion in the Maine Coon world. The three governing bodies of the organizations got together to begin a sorely-needed "Unified Standard". Maine Coons that were making finals with one association were being rejected by others. Judges in one association were looking for Foxy-Faced Coons; in others, Lynx; some for tails longer than the

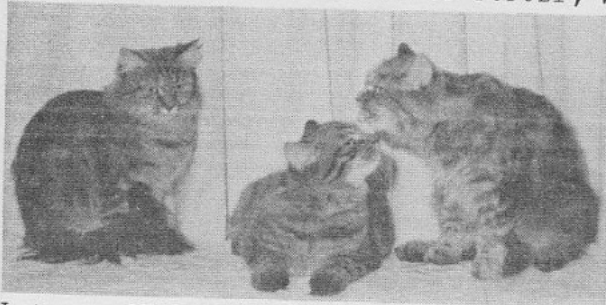
body (like a monkey); and others, if they did not find it a struggle to carry the cat from judging cage to judging table, deemed it too light. It was a consensus of opinion of all Maine Coon breeders that they should come up with a Standard that would best serve the Maine Coon and its breeders. In early January, the final ballots went out to members of all Maine Coon organizations and a "Unified Standard" was adopted.

First to accept the Unified Standard was America's second largest cat association, ACFA. At this writing, it has also been accepted by Crown and UCF although the latter, like CFA, does not recognize the Maine Coon for championship competition, waiting to see how many are registered and shown within its body. All national associations as well as all judges in the U.S.A. and Canada will receive copies of the new Unified Standard and it is hoped that it will be adopted by all so as to allow the breeder/exhibitor freedom to show in all shows within his home limits with the knowledge that his cat will be judged to the same Standard in all associations.

The first association to accept the Maine Coon for championship competition was Canadian Cat Association. America's leader, and original "show home" of the Maine Coon, Cat Fanciers Association, has not accepted the Maine Coon for championship competition waiting until one hundred cats are registered.

NEUTERS WIN FIRST GRAND TITLES

First Maine Coon Cat to become a Grand Champion was *SIR DRIFTWOOD OF PUPULI*, White

neuter owned by LaVera Miller, Glendora, California. He won the title in ACFA in 1970 and, since then, three others have also earned it. However, no entire Maine Coon has yet become a Grand Champion in ACFA which may be due to misconception as to the size of the Maine Coon or to the limited opportunities to show ACFA in the East where entry of 20 or 30 Maine Coon Cats at a show has been common.

Since 1970 several of the breed have become Grand Champions in other associations including *MOR-ACE'S SATAN*, Brown Tabby male owned by Anthony Morace, Springfield, Mass. This cat received the Danish Medal (Danish Cat Club) and is a Grand Champion in three associations, ICF, ACA and CFF. Particularly proud of his feat is his father, *CH. O'NO OF ZIG-KRN*, the author's Black Smoke. Another well-known magnificent Maine Coon is Double Grand Champion (ICF-ACA) *DAUPHIN DE FRANCE OF TATI-TAN* owned by Sonya Stanislow, New York. In 1971 *MIEOUS DANALISCOTTA*, Red & White Parti-Color female reached Grand Champion status in Crown: she is owned by Muriel Corigan, New York. Many other Maine Coon Cats have won finals on both coasts in ACA and are on their way to Grand Championships.

With the adoption of the Unified Standard, it is hoped that the fabled 40-pounder is a thing of the past and that many more of America's original Longhaired cats will reach the peak of perfection.

MAINE COON CAT - UNIFIED STANDARD

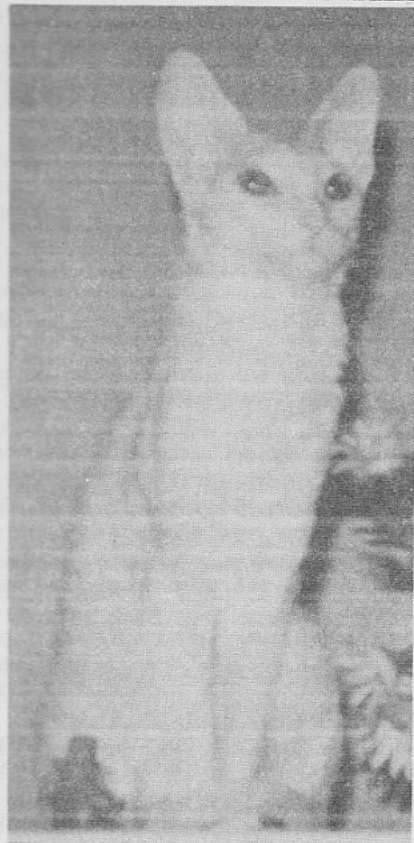
HEAD (30 Points):

Shape - 15 - Medium in width, except in the older more developed studs where it should be broader. Cheek bones high. Nose and face should be medium long, with an appearance of squareness to the muzzle. Chin firm and in line with upper lip and nose. Slight break or no break in the nose.

Eyes - 10 - Large, round, wide set. Slightly oblique setting. Eye color should be shades of green and or gold. In white cats eye color may also be either blue or odd eyed. Clarity of color is desirable.

Ears - 5 - Large in size and wide at base. Ears should taper to a point, and be tufted.

Undesirable - Short flat face, or long point-

ed nose. Undershot chin. Narrow eyes. Very slanted eyes. Dull eye color. Short, rounded, narrow set, or untufted ears.

BODY (30 Points):

Shape - 15 - Muscular, powerful, and long. The cat should be medium to large in size, females slightly smaller. The chest should be full. All parts in proportion. When viewed from the rear there should be a definite squareness at the rump.

Neck - 5 - Medium long giving the appearance of length to the body. In the older, more mature cats, especially studs, the neck should be thick and muscular, giving the appearance of power and strength.

Legs & Feet - 5 - Legs substantial, muscular, wide set, of medium length, and in proportion to body length. Paws should be large, round, and well tufted.

Tail - 5 - Long and full. Wide at the base, and should taper without kinks.

Undesirable - Short cobby body. Delicate bone structure. A rounded rump. Short legs and untufted feet. Kinked tail.

COAT (20 Points):

The fur on the front shoulders is shorter and should become gradually longer along the back towards the tail, ending in a shaggy, heavy coat on the britches. The sides of the cat's coat should gradually get longer until the stomach is reached, where it should be long and full. A full ruff is not expected; however, there should be a slight frontal ruff

beginning at the base of the ears. The fur on the tail should be long and full. Feet and ears should be tufted. The coat should be fine, heavy, and should fall smoothly. The coat should have a lustrous sheen, but should not be excessively oily or dull. A slight undercoat may be carried. This is the optimum coat and will vary with climate. Cats shall not be penalized for less than a full coat during the warm season, nor shall they be penalized for a very full coat.

Undesirable - Even length of coat.

COAT COLOR (10 Points):

White, Black, Blue, Red, Cream, Silver, Cameo.

Smokes: Black, Blue, Cameo

Tabby: Silver, Cream, Red, Brown, Blue, Cameo.

Mackeral Tabby: Silver, Cream, Red, Brown, Blue, Cameo.

Tortoiseshell, Torbie, Calico, Blue-Cream, Bi-Colors, Parti-Colors.

White trim around the chin and lip line allowed except in solid color cats. Winners not to be withheld for buttons or lockets.

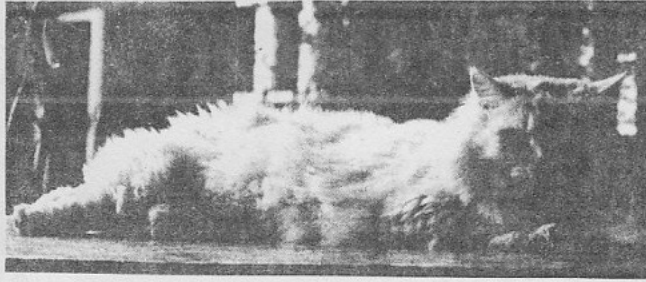
CONDITION (10 Points):

Solid, firm, muscular. Should be presented in a well-groomed manner.

THE CAT FANCY IN BRAZIL

BY ANNE MARIE GASNIER

This is the story of the creation of a cat club in a country remote from the great cat breeders' associations.

Some years ago, the situation of the cats in Brazil was very discouraging. The common cats were often mistreated by people who attributed them with the most absurd faults and beliefs based on legends of the Middle Ages. Persian cats were all but non-existent; small quantities of hybrids, from chance matings between shorthairs and long-hairs, were about the best to be found. Siamese cats were totally out-of-standard: they had round heads and eyes while many had short or kinked tails.

Nobody thought of the possibility of improving the cats by importing from countries where pedigreed cats were carefully mated and no cat breeders club existed to assist cat fanciers. Another negative fact was excessive in-breeding and, on top of all this, the standards were completely unknown.

In 1962, I had an opportunity to learn how little was known about the Siamese. I took a kitten I had just bought to a veterinarian and was told that I had made a very bad choice "as this breed is very difficult to raise and the weakness is inherent in this race". So far as the fragility of these animals here was concerned, he was right. Siamese, more often than not, "broke like glass" due to acute rickets!

With this picture before me, I promised myself that I would prove to everybody that this whole situation could be improved. There was a good deal of work to be done but, with perseverance, good results were bound to be obtained.

BREED IMPROVEMENT

Our first intention, as we had bought a Siamese kitten, was to take good care of this fragile animal but, a few days later, it fell from a fence less than two feet high, broke its back and had to be put to sleep. My feelings toward the breeder were not very kind but I later understood that she was not completely guilty as, like other breeders

here at that time, she ignored everything on rational and scientific breeding.

To soften our grief, we ordered a kitten from another breeder who, two months later, with little explanation, delivered us a long-haired kitten with white feet instead of the Siamese that we had ordered, and told us it was a Sacred Cat of Burma (Birman). We had managed, by luck, to have one exemplary of a race completely unknown here. This kitten, too, had an initial stage of rickets but we were above to control it.

Later we bought a Blue Point Siamese and, to obtain better results, took the kitten at the age of only one month. It was risky but we felt it was safer than to leave it with the breeder. The kitten grew up to be a very healthy cat so we were very pleased with the success we attained.

We had won our first two battles on the health problem thanks to the dedication of our veterinarian, Dr. Marina Moura.

Books on cats proved difficult to obtain locally but some friends brought books from the U.S. which we needed. My first aim was to get information on breeds and standards currently recognized.

At the time we bought our Birman, it was impossible to buy a female and, not knowing that later we could import one, we tried back-crossing to Seal Point Siamese to maintain the breed here. After three generations we managed to obtain some animals which could be considered Birmans although not of championship quality. Most of his offspring were spayed or neutered as we wanted to avoid procreation of cats who differed too much from the official standard.



Up to this time, our work was based only on what we read in books and personal experience with our cats (ten cats and various kittens plus some one hundred cats of other people).

We succeeded in obtaining two other Siamese colors. An American couple brought a Chocolate Point Siamese with them when they came to Brazil and mated her with my Blue Point. In the second generation, with mathematical precision, in one litter were: one Chocolate Point, One Lilac Point and one Blue Point (at least according to the description in the books).

FOUNDING THE CLUBE BRASILEIRO DO GATO
The reading of English and American books on different breeds made us realize the necessity of contacting foreign associations who might help us. We wanted, above all, to know more about modern methods of breeding.

The books we collected gave many repetitions of elementary advice and the ones with more profound information were few. We began to understand why breeders here encountered so many difficulties when we could find only one book, quite an elementary one, published in the Portuguese language.

During a business trip to Europe, my husband had the good fortune to become acquainted with a charming person, Mme. M. J. Ravel, President of Honor of F.I.F.E. and Chairman of the Cat Club de Paris. He explained our problems to her and Mme. Ravel agreed to fight with us for our cause. This was the real beginning of our Club.

To form a Club, we counted on the many cat fanciers, veterinarians, university professors, lawyers, housewives and others whom we had contacted in the earlier phases. In this way we assembled a group of fifty people who became the founder-members. Newspaper reporters helped by publishing news of our new Club. To all these people, we give thanks in the name of all cats in Brazil!

Legally founded on September 22, 1972, the Club began its activities by promoting its purposes and trying to gain more members. This was not easy for not everyone was willing to pay the annuity nor the money to register his cat.

AFFILIATION WITH F.I.F.E.
It was with great joy that we received the support of the F.I.F.E. (Federation Internationale Feline D'Europe). In a general assembly on December 9, 1972, in Amsterdam, they recognized the CLUBE BRASILEIRO DO GATO and let us know that after our first exhibition the club would be formally accepted.

After receiving this good news, we introduced our Club to other associations so that they would know of our existence. We wrote to Mrs. Betty O'Brien of C.F.A. who answered promptly congratulating us and wishing us good luck. Mme. Ravel volunteered to introduce our Club to the G.C.C.F. on one of her many trips to Great Britain. (Cont'd p.12)

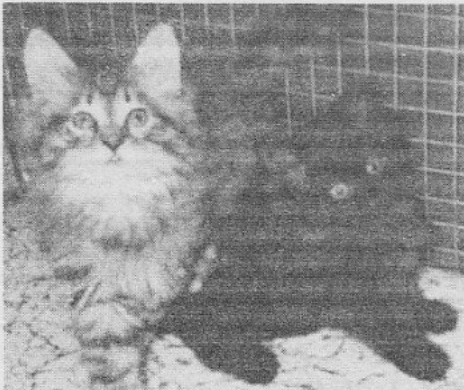

FIRST CAT SHOW

Our first cat show was held on August 12, 1973, in the Jardim da Luz, Sao Paulo, Brazil. The Club has little funds--more goodwill than money--so the Secretaria de Turismo e Fomento do Municipio de Sao Paulo offered a place where we could hold the show without charge.

Mme. Ravel judged the fiftyone cats who were entered in the Primeira Exposicao Internacional De Gatos Do Brasil, including four who came from France. Entries included Persians (Copper-Eyed White, Blue, Cream, Blue-Cream, Silver Tabby and Chinchilla); Birmans; British Blues; and Siamese (Seal Point, Blue Point and Chocolate Point).

Ten Certificats d'Aptitude de Championat were awarded. Chosen International Longhair was VLADIMIR DE POUH-MILOH, Birman owned by Mr. and Mrs. de Pindray, France; International Shorthair was ISIS DE CHENONCEAUX, Seal Point Siamese owned by Mr. Claudio Gornatti. National Longhair was SUNNY, Susanna Jank's White Persian, and National Shorthair was my Siamese Blue Point, LAENRHE. Both of the National winners have only initial registration.

Our first show was a great success even though not all our cats have pedigrees but are only registered in the experimental stud-book in France.

FOUNDING OF MORE CLUBS

This phase is still under preliminary study but seeds have already been planted. We have had an opportunity to exchange ideas with other Brazilian states on what will be necessary for the formation of more clubs so that they may obtain our recognition and that of F.I.F.E. We will be proud to help other states or South American nations on this work.

Veterinary Views

VETTING-IN

BY JULIA M. MAY

At present, the show regulations in Great Britain state that all cats must be inspected by a veterinary surgeon on arrival at the show before being admitted to the exhibition hall.

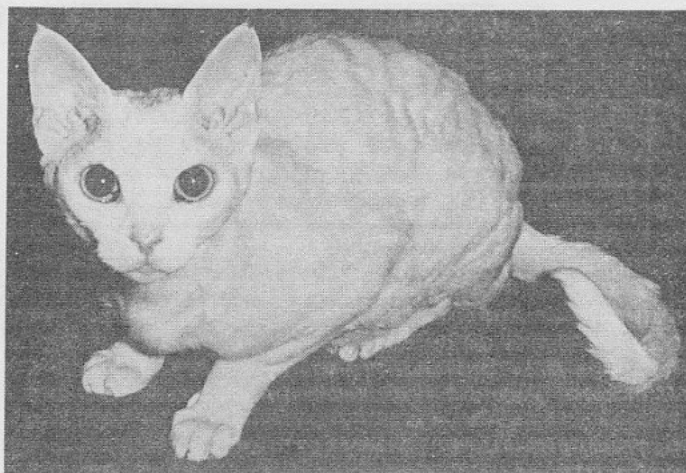
This inspection entails an examination of the cats for any signs of infectious or contagious disease, checking to see that queens are not obviously pregnant or lactating, that entire males have all their equipment (monorchids and cryptorchids are admitted up to nine months of age), and that no cat has been declawed.

The cats' mouths are examined for ulcers, noses for signs of discharge, and eyes for conjunctivitis; their lymph nodes are palpated as enlargement may be a sign of infection. The ears are examined, if necessary with an auriscope, for signs of ear mites, and coats are checked for fleas, mange and ringworm.

If there are no specific signs of illness but the cat does not look right, its temperature may also be checked. It takes very little time to examine a well-behaved cat in tip-top show condition but, if a cat has not been prepared for a show, the examination can be lengthy.

PREPARING FOR SHOW

Show preparation can be divided into two parts: firstly, looks and health, and secondly, behaviour. Preparation of looks and



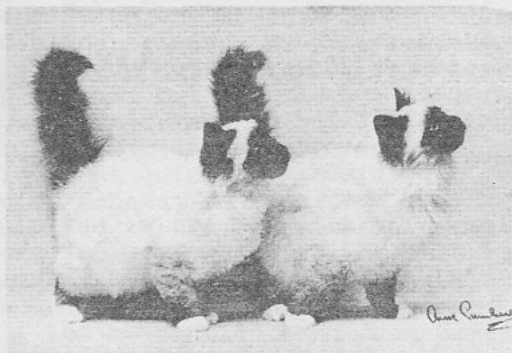

health should be almost unnecessary as the cat should always be in good health and be groomed regularly (the amount required obviously varying with the breed), so the only preparation required before a show would be a little extra grooming and a check to make sure that ears, eyes, nose and mouth are clear.

Unfortunately, I see too many cats which arrive at the show dirty or unhealthy: their ears are waxy and mite-infested, they have fleas (not just the odd one which can be picked up in the queue, but many, together with dirt in the coat), or they may have a purulent discharge from the eyes or nose. These conditions are sometimes so severe that they could not possibly have been missed had the cats been checked over prior to the show. The assumption must be that the owner does not care; but why bring them to a show? Not

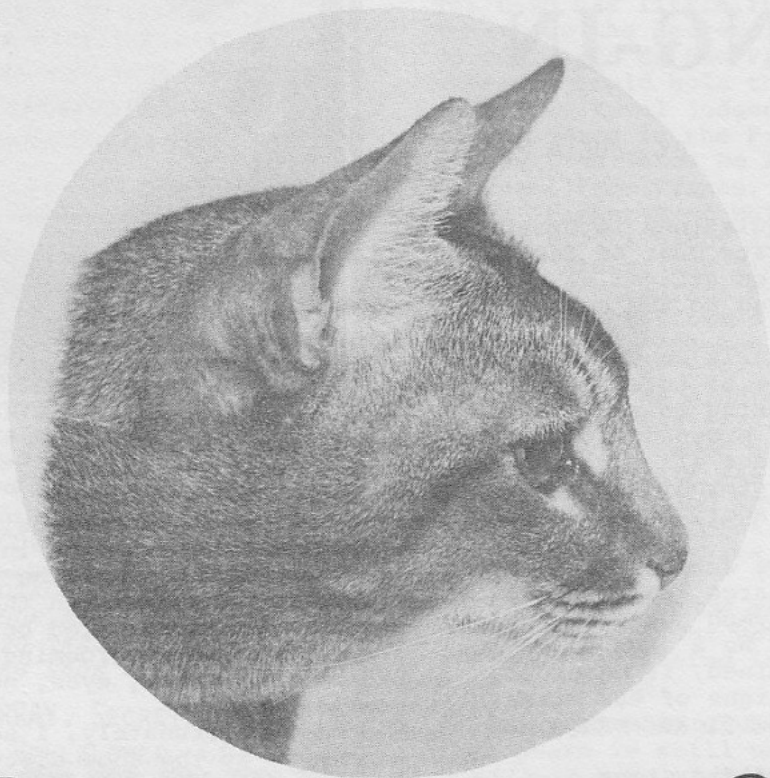

Reminiscences Of Rameses

THIS STORY HAS BEEN WRITTEN BY KIM EVERETT AS A SPECIAL TRIBUTE TO ONE OF
THE GREATEST CATS OF ALL TIME, GR. CH. PHAROH RAMESES II, 'BIG RED'.

Up to 1963, I had had Siamese and Persian cats but had long been fascinated by the Abyssinian and, as fate would have it, I was destined to be 'owned' by one of these cats of wild and outwardly regal appearance.

In the wee hours of the morning of September 26, 1963, the cat was born, along with four sisters and brothers. He was a very unusual, beautiful male kitten with the deep and glowing color of an Irish setter all over but for a little black skull cap. The other kittens in this, our first litter of Abys, were very dark as are most Aby kittens from this line. The litter was also a 'first' for both parents, *RING'S ABI TANJII OF PHAROH*, and sire *CH. PHIL-SARI'S KI-O-KIZAN OF PHAROH*.

At four days of age, we placed this beautiful little boy on a pale yellow pillow to take color photos. He held his head high and listened to all sounds around him. His eyes were not as yet open but he showed no fear of anything.

Next thing was the selection of a name befitting such a princely kitten. I decided that for our first Aby a very royal name should be used and, thus, *PHAROH RAMESE II* was christened. This would be the only Egyptian name we would ever use since he would be king of our future Abyssinians.

Several breeders came to see the tiny fellow and remarked he must be a mutation because of his coloring! Of course he was not a mutation but was closely line-bred from his grandsire, *TRIPLE GRAND CH. ABDEL*, who also possessed the beautiful eye-catching color with jet black ticking and lovely coat.

SHOWING RAMESES

We started *RAMESES* off to his first shows as a kitten at 4 months. To our delight he went **BEST KITTEN** in the All Breed rings and showed just as though he knew what it was all about. He went on to be top 1964 kitten in his Region that year.

His love of shows, plus the encouragement from fellow breeders and exhibitors, prompted us to go forward with him. His first year, 1965, he hit the show circuit as an adult and was dubbed *BIG RED* by his many fans. The name stuck and he was from that day called *RED*.

That year we flew with him throughout the country taking many **BEST CAT** awards along the way. *RED* had a true love of the showing and of being handled and oooed and aaahed at. At season's end he was awarded the title of **ALL AMERICAN SECOND BEST CAT** losing by only about three points to a Silver Tabby American Shorthair. That year, all U.S. cat associations were competing in the All Americans.

The new season for 1966 rolled around and *RED* really blossomed. He was at his peak in all respects with his marvellous disposition remaining the same. *RED* was ready --- I was ready --- and we decided to go all out and attempt to make **ALL AMERICAN CAT OF THE YEAR**, 1966. This took a great deal of planning and preparation. First, every show and association was checked as to dates, location and plane points. We have never picked any certain few judges taking what came in that department, but *BIG* shows were a must as it is most important to hit the shows with the largest entries in order to get the points. This meant going to shows in the East and South, Canada, the West and the Midwest. We exhibited in CFA, ACFA, ACA, Crown and CCA shows, some of which reached 600 cats in the Championship classes. There was no limit and the quality was terrific.

Let me mention that that particular year *SHAWNEE WHITE WASH*, *JENKIN'S DARK HUSSY*, *G(LEN)N'S GERONIMO OF ROGERS HTS*, *MAKHANDA WILLA*, *MIZPAH'S FERDINAND OF BRIERWOOD* and

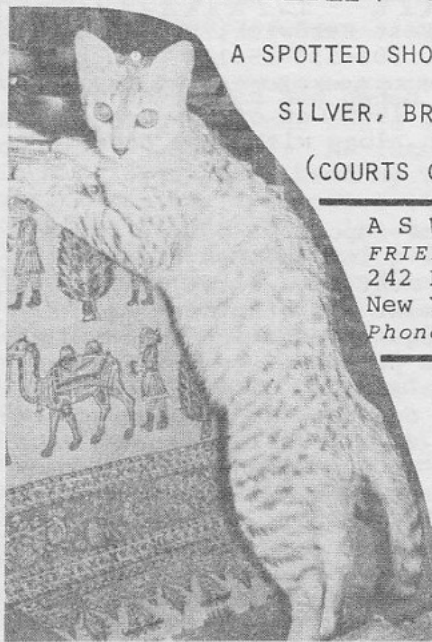

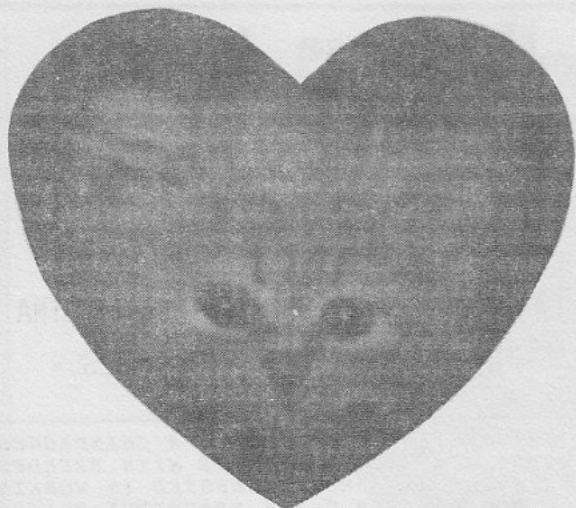

DESIRE TO WIN

There are some important points to consider when you are going to show a cat this extensively. You must have a top quality cat with both temperament and stamina. *BIG RED* fulfilled these requirements and also had the desire to win. He performed for the judges, flexed his muscles and his glowing coat---few could resist! At one show he somehow got out of his exhibition cage. Where was he? Right up on the nearest judge's table in the middle of another class ready for his turn!

During his show career, *BIG RED* picked up a number of traits one of which was to not let a judge forget he was there just in case they were thinking over some other Abys in the class. He would put his paw out of his cage and be very boisterous and vocal until

the judge would come back to look at him again. He would then strut around and beg to get back on the table for more detailed inspection. He would pose, race over and loved being sailed through the air, stretched and whatever. I think that one of the nicest tributes to any cat and especially for our guy was that breeders of both Shorthairs and Longhairs loved him.

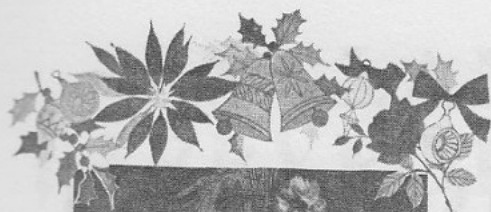
RED always looked and performed best when I would go to shows with him. He would step out on to the judge's arm and go to the table, quickly look for me and, once getting me in his sight, was ready for the spotlight. We seldom agented him and, unless it was someone he knew and communicated with, he would sit and sulk in the judge's cage. Several judges commented on this and how he pouted.

Another little trait he picked up that year was spraying the audience and, sometimes, even the judge! 'Accidentally', of course, if they were in the line of fire. This may be unbelievable to those who never saw *RED*, but he was a great one to case his audience while the judge was busy looking the class over and then he would actually smile, turn around and the audience would go running in all directions! What fun he had. He also discovered that he was not limited to straight ahead situations but could also make his mark at nearly a 90-degree angle and send the rest of the males in the class wild. This really delighted him. *RED* was never upset around other males and often the judges would put him out on the table and bring another male out with him. At one show a very famous Chocolate Point male was caged next to him during the finals and reached over and clouted *RED*. Well, no one was going to get away with this so he stood up and gave the handsome Chocolate Point a good nip on the ear, sat back down and was ready to receive his wins.

RED would amuse the audience while waiting for the judge to place the rosettes and trophies. He would tilt his head up and watch the top of his cage actually expecting the awards. (I might mention here that *RED* was never caged at home and was a true household pet to us. He lived with the family and did not have the usual male habits at home.)

On Saturday evenings at the shows we would occasionally use him for breeding with females who just happened to be interested. This saved them a trip out to Oregon and *RED* would go right back to the show on Sunday none the worse for wear and, most of the time, win BEST CAT awards.

RED had his own special shipping carrier all lined with carpet. It had a pillow which could be heated by a battery in cold weather. He had an assortment of car coats which kept him warm, too. Always, when making reservations, I would check on facilities for cats and nothing would be too good for him. He stayed in my room, had television going and liked his bed cover rolled back---I could get

in, too. RED always slept with his head on the pillow and liked to have the covers over him. His favorite foods and bottled water were taken to the shows so as not to take him off his regular schedule. Most important, he received all his usual love and attention.

At the conclusion of the 1966 season, after competing in 36 shows (144 rings), GR. CH. PHARO H RAMESES II was named ALL AMERICAN CAT OF THE YEAR by a huge point margin. He had succeeded in going from Number Two to Top Cat. He was, and still is today, the only Aby ever to do this. His relatives have placed high in different associations' national awards including Second Best Cats but never Best Cat. BIG RED contributed much to his breed by this achievement and this was more important that the thrill it gave us.

In 1967 we showed RED only moderately without pushing him but he still went THIRD BEST CAT and Best All American Abyssinian for the third straight year. After that he was retired.

The approximate cost of showing RED and, later, CITATION, was \$8,500.00 for a full show season. Living on the West Coast, it is a long way to travel to the Midwest and East Coast shows.

RETIREMENT

RED missed the shows and when we would get one of our other cats ready to go he would run over to the carrier and want to go, too. We put him on exhibition a few times at local shows which he loved. At a Washington show, he lazed on top of his cage on my coat and greeted all the people. He loved being handled.

Nearly a year of his retirement went by. Just short of his fifth birthday, he was taken to the vet for his annual teeth cleaning. Our vet of many years gave him anesthetic to scale the tartar from his teeth. Suddenly he stopped breathing. They tried everything but to no avail. Our vet was beside himself as

he knew how much this cat meant to us. It was a terrible shock and we spent many sad weeks from that day. It was determined that RED had cancer of the liver which was why his breathing failed under the anesthesia. The unusual part, our vet said, was that he had had no indication of any illness and, in fact, had bred a visiting female the day before he died.

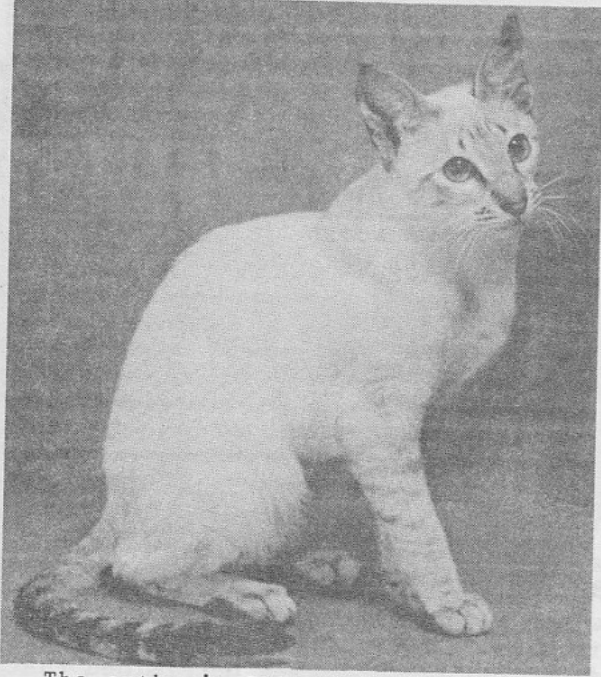
On hearing the news, cat fanciers and judges from all over the country who admired this great cat sent flowers and cards. I was about to give up cats after losing this wonderful friend and companion who had given us so much pleasure. We made arrangements for his burial in a silk-lined walnut casket in our garden. A marked headstone was made and azaleas planted all around. This may seem rather ridiculous to some but, to us, this great cat deserved something special.

'JUNIOR'

To have bred and owned such a cat as BIG RED is more than one would ever hope for but once in a lifetime. As fate would have it, in his last litter bred by Ted and Mary Stegant, there was a gorgeous little female among the four kittens with 'that look' about her. Two well-known All Breed judges in Houston, Texas, saw the litter and immediately picked her out. Since a repeat of the breeding had been done the day prior to RED's demise, Mary and Ted phoned and offered this kitten to us.

We gratefully accepted this baby. Her dam is CH. PALLADY'S PAT so her other half also has a line of top quality cats. We had received many pictures of her and she was everything and more than we dreamed of. Her name? JUNIOR, of course, after her famous sire! Her registered name is TEMAS PRIDE OF PHARO H as she was the pride of both the Stegants and ourselves. Not only did she possess the class and glamor but her showmanship and temperament were so much like her daddy's.

I was helping at the Croydon Cat Club Show in London in 1961 when I became aware that my friend, Mrs. Greta Hindley, was beckoning to me. I went over to her and she seemed very excited. "Come and see what I have found," she said. "I know it is naughty of me, but I have bought one." Highly mystified, I followed her to a cat pen and there were some beautiful Siamese kittens sitting looking at me or were they really Siamese? They didn't look quite right to me. They had brilliant blue eyes, pale coats and solid ears, but with tabby markings on their little faces, legs and long, ringed tabby tails, yet with the most superb Siamese type. I was not surprised that such a well-known and experienced breeder of Siamese as Mrs. Hindley was so impressed.

The breeder of these kittens, Miss Eileen Alexander, then told me her story. In 1960 her Sealpoint Siamese queen, *LADY ME*, had slipped out and found her own mate. Immediately on her return she was mated to Mrs. Buttery's Sealpoint, *DRUID*, and one of the kittens in the litter from this dual mating was a Tabbypoint female, *PATTI*. Because of her attractive and unusual appearance, Miss Alexander had her mated to Mrs. Buttery's Sealpoint, *SAMSARA SARASON*, and these were their kittens. The four Tabbypoints were so similar and well marked that Miss Alexander thought it seemed a pity not to introduce them to the cat fancy and so she got permission from Mrs. Towe to bring them to this show. Mrs. Hindley upon seeing them realized how attractive they were and bought a female, *TANSY*.

From these beginnings have grown the ever increasing Tabbypoint Siamese. Soon

word came of another litter sired by *SPOT-LIGHT TROUBADOUR*, a Sealpoint belonging to Mrs. Warner, and *MISS TEE KAT*, owned by Mrs. Bennett. Mrs. Hindley, Miss Alexander and I went to see them and bought *MISTER BUTTONS* as an unrelated mate for *PATTI*. Here we met Mrs. Warner who had taken a female, *PRALINE*, the foundation of her beautiful Tabbypoints.

The name for these cats gave rise to much controversy as 'Tabbypoint' was considered rather too ordinary for such lovely type Siamese cats. A Club was formed and the name 'Lynxpoint' introduced; this is still used in U.S.A. and some parts of Australia, New Zealand and, I think, Canada. As several breeders disliked this name and it was thought that the G.C.C.F. might not accept it because it is the name of another animal, Mrs. Hindley asked me to help her start another Club. This we did in 1964 and, at the inaugural meeting, it was decided to call the cats 'Tabbypoints' and to add 'Progressive Breeders' to the Club's name. Later on, the name 'Attabiy' was voted for, being the original name for the tabby cat in Persia, but this led to impolite noises such as 'Atta-boy'. Then 'Shadowpoint' was chosen and our Club became the Shadowpoint Siamese & Progressive Breeders Cat Club.

What a time we had getting these lovely Siamese-type cats recognized and our thanks go to Mrs. Hindley for her courage and tenacity in doing this. Finally, the Siamese Cat Club Committee, of which Mrs. Hindley and I were members, decided that these cats should be called Tabbypointed Siamese but that they should not be classified with the solid pointed Siamese. It was decided to give them a different Breed Number to distinguish them as variegated pointed Siamese, for what is a Siamese? To quote Jude: "A Siamese cat is a foreign-type SH cat with blue eyes and colour restricted to the points".

In 1966 these cats were granted recognition by the Governing Council of the Cat Fancy and given the name 'Tabbypointed Siamese,'

ENGLAND'S TABBYPOINTS

The majority of England's really good early Tabbypoints were bred by Mrs. Richard Warner out of her Tabbypoint queen *PRALINE* (CH. *SPOTLIGHT TROUBADOUR* X *MISS TEE KAT*), founder of the Spotlight strain of Tabbypoints, and her Sealpoint stud, *WHITEOAKS MALAHIDE*. The very first Tabbypoint Champion came from this mating, *CH. SPOTLIGHT PENNYLYNX*, a superb specimen of the breed.

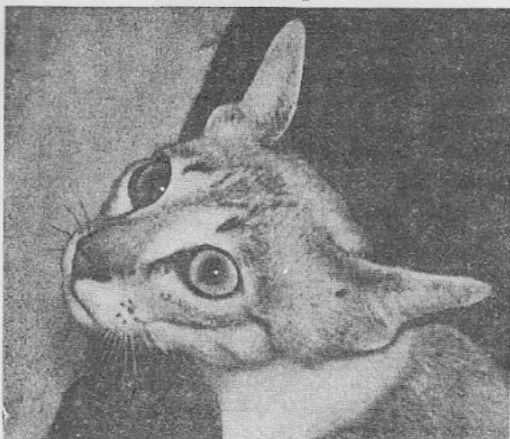
Other well-known Tabbypoints from this mating are: *SPOTLIGHT RICKY-DICKY*, *CHANTILLY*, *INT.CH. SPOTLIGHT FRANKINCENSE*, and *BURLINKS*.

A specialist Club for Tabbypoints was formed in 1964 at a meeting in Mr. and Mrs. Warner's home in Sevenoaks, Kent. The Club was first named the 'Lynx Pointed Cat Club'; however, when 'Lynx-Points' were given their full recognition in 1966 and became 'Tabby-Pointed Siamese', the Club became the 'Tabby Pointed Siamese Cat Society'.

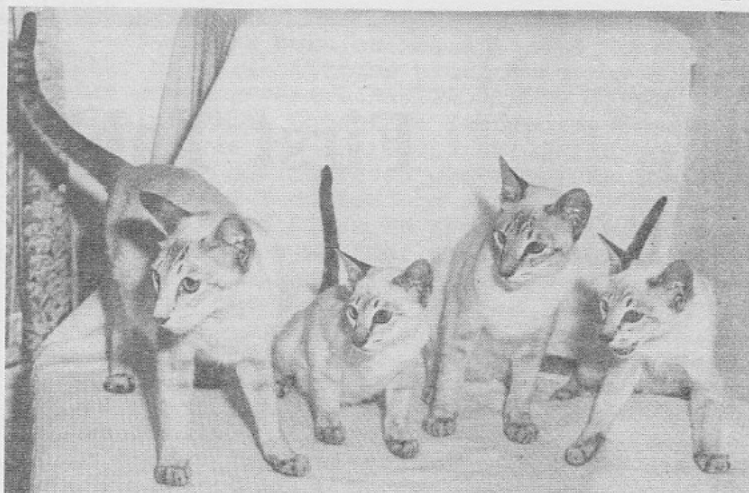
When Mrs. Warner's beloved *PRALINE* departed this life, her lovely daughter, *CH. SPOTLIGHT PENNYLYNX*, took over the production of the Spotlight Tabbypoints. *PENNYLYNX*, in my opinion, gave England it's greatest female Tabbypoint to date, *CH. SPOTLIGHT KOPEIKA*. This enchanting cat was sired by that lovely Bluepoint, *CH. MACEDON MARQUIS*. *MARQUIS* was bred by Miss Alexander and owned by Mrs. Hudson of the Supra Cattery.

KOPEIKA gained her title in three consecutive shows. She was highly acclaimed and gained Best-In-Show awards amongst her many achievements.

My husband and I commenced breeding Tabbypoints in 1967 under our prefix 'Moonfleet'. We purchased a lovely Lilacpoint queen from Mrs. Angela Sayer of the Solitaire Cattery called *SOLITAIRE MICA*. In due course, *MICA* was bred to *SPOTLIGHT PETIT BURLINKS* and from this union we produced two lovely Tabby-



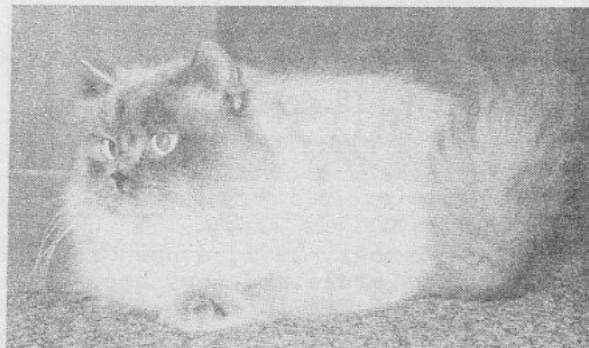
Mrs. Warner's famous queen, *PRALINE*.

points, *MOONFLEET AQUILA* and *MOONFLEET MICA'S ARIES*. We repeated this mating several times and produced numerous quality Tabbypoints and a superb Sealpoint which we called *MOONFLEET AURIGA*.

AQUILA, bred to *SPOTLIGHT KIRIDOM*, produced *MOONFLEET JUPITER*, a Seal Tabbypoint of superb type who gained the most points at shows as a kitten last season and was awarded the 'Starfall Cup'. *KIRIDOM* is a Bluepoint son of *CH. SPOTLIGHT KOPEIKA*. (Cont'd p.23)

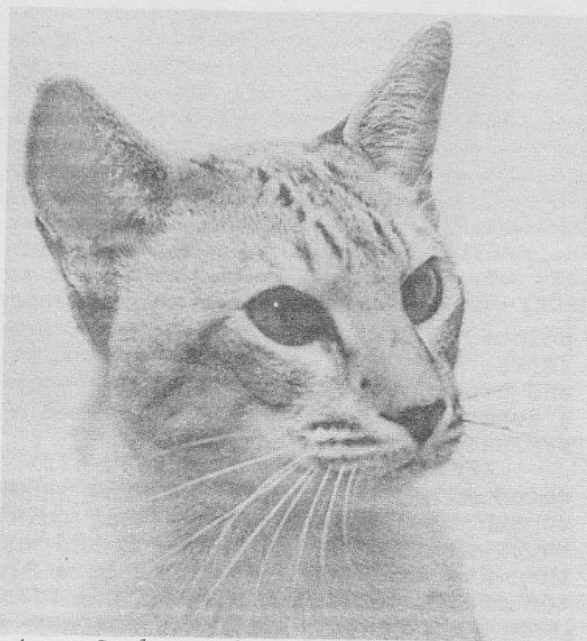

LIGER is Britain's first Siamese Grand Champion and second cat of any breed to win this title. His breeder, Mrs. Anne Aslin tells his story.

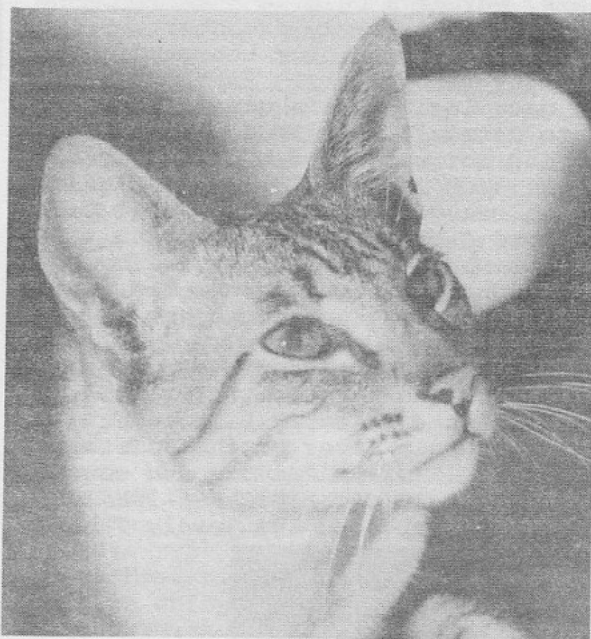
In September, 1972, a new Grand Champion was acclaimed thus becoming only the second cat in England to win this title. *SEREMBAN LIGER*, Seal Tabby-point Siamese, was awarded his third Grand Challenge Certificate by Mrs. Clark at the Herts. & Middlesex Championship Show. England's first cat to become a Grand was Mrs. Absalom's British Blue male, *BRYNBUBOO LITTLE MONARCH*. (*CAT WORLD*, March/April 1973)

KOUNTRY BOY (photo below) is the first American-bred Lynx Point to become a Grand Champion. His story is told by his breeder, Mrs. Pat Collins.

We bred our first Lynxpoint Colorpoint Shorthair in 1966. She was the result of a mating between our Siamese queen and a Silver Tabby half-Siamese male. At that time we were not showing cats or even really aware of cat shows, etc., but since she was such an attractive cat we decided to keep her. To our surprise and delight, this one kitten from the litter began to color up from

her newborn pristine white and develop stripes on her tail and face rather than the sooty black or blue that we were used to. We decided to call her a 'Silverpoint' and later bred her to our Siamese male which produced another female 'Silverpoint'. This cat, in turn, was bred to a Siamese Sealpoint male and we had our first male Lynx.

After reading an advertisement about a cat show, we called the number and got in touch with Mrs. Kim Everett who encouraged us to show the male as a kitten. Although he had beautiful coloring and a fine short coat, long legs and body, he just did not have quite the Siamese head that he should. At the show we met a lady who had some Lynxpoints that she had bred as a hobby for years but she called them 'Polynesians' for her original pair had come to her from Hawaii. We bought her three remaining females and our next step was to buy a Sealpoint Siamese stud, YAMA'S SIGISMUND OF MIJIRI, a cat with a fine pedigree who throws lovely kittens.

Still learning, we bred SIGI to the best of the three queens, SU LANI TU OF KASTL ROCK. When the litter was born on July 2, 1971, we instantly knew that something was different. These four kittens were the boniest, longest, ugliest Siamese that we had ever seen; nothing cuddly and cute about them. The ugliest one, of course, was KOUNTRY BOY. The whole litter was show quality with flyaway ears and each of them has since made finals in shows.

We entered KOUNTRY BOY and his sister, KOUNTRY GIRL, in an ACFA show as kittens. KOUNTRY BOY was Second Best Kitten and Best Siamese Kitten, while his sister was Best Siamese Kitten Opposite Sex (BOX) in Mrs. Belk's Shorthair ring. Then they went on to be Best and BOX Siamese Kitten under Mrs. Chapman who also awarded KOUNTRY BOY Best All Breed Kitten! This set the showhall on its ear because it was unheard of for this to happen. This was his starting point and he has never stopped. He made his C.F.A. Grand Championship in only four shows, very good for a Colorpoint.

He made his A.C.F.A. Grand Championship in three shows, becoming that association's third Lynx Point Grand. (Editors' note: The first two were English imports, Hihoe Curacao of Bon-Jon, bred by Mrs. Dack and owned by Mr. and Mrs. John Berry; and Solitaire Dimity of Mt. Sunrise, bred by Mrs. Sayer and owned by Mr. Dawayne Goodburn. Both are females.)

KOUNTRY BOY is a good-sized cat and very well-balanced. He has huge ears that set well down on his head and finish his wedge to perfection. He has long legs and body and a long whippy tail. His most striking feature, perhaps, after his head and ear set, are his eyes which are the very deep vivid blue. He is a gentle, sweet-natured boy and has never given us nor any judge a moment's trouble during his rather strenuous show career. (Cont'd)

LIGER

LIGER was born on May 15, 1969, one of a litter of three kittens produced by my Bluepoint queen, SUPRA LARKSPUR. Sire of the Sealpoint male, Chocolate Tabbypoint female and LIGER was CH. SPOTLIGHT SEIGFRIED.

At the age of seven weeks, LIGER really stood out and I decided to show him. He won his Open Kitten Class at the Herts. & Mddx., 1969, and at the West of England Show in November, 1969, he won his Open and was also Best Kitten In Show.

In his seventh and eighth months, LIGER was quite ungainly with big feet and paws and a lot of puppy fat, a typical adolescent but we were not discouraged. His first show as an adult was the 1970 Notts. & Derby. Cat Club Show. Judge Miss Rickson awarded him his first Challenge Certificate. His second C.C. was given to him by Mrs. Dadd at the Southern Counties Show in 1971 while the one which made him Champion was awarded by Miss Codrington that same year at the Suffolk & Norfolk Cat Club.

LIGER did have some near misses as he competed for his Championship but, as he matured he seemed only to improve yet still retaining his unmarked coat, and was undefeated in his quest for his Grand Championship. Dr. Groom gave him his first Grand Challenge Certificate in 1971 at the Siamese Cat Club Show; Mrs. Kent the second in 1972 at the Siamese Cat Association Show; and Mrs. Clark

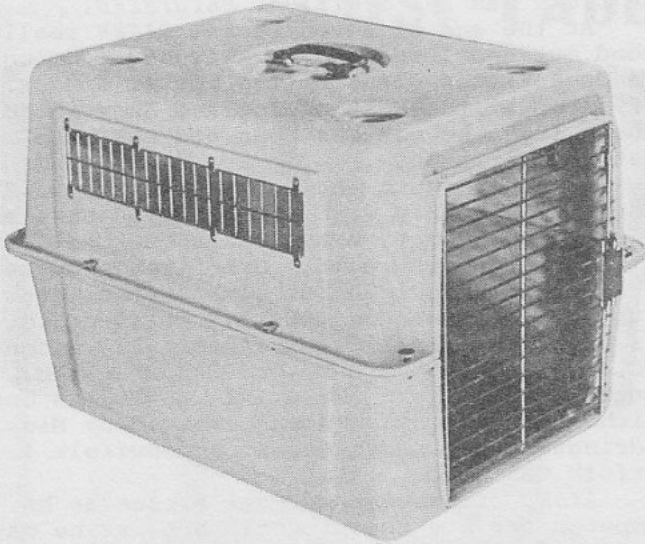

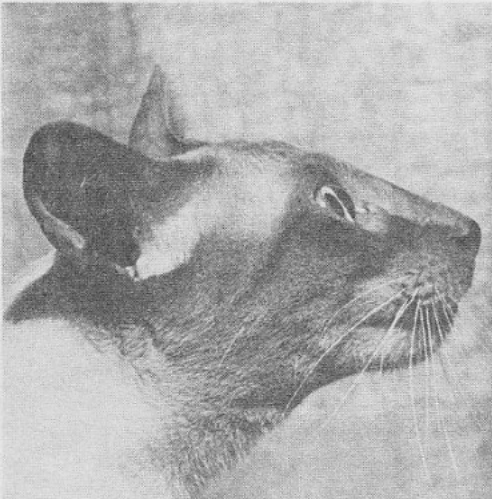

awarded him the all-important third one.

In her judging report, Mrs. Clark wrote: "I have always admired this cat from a kitten and I believe I gave him his first prize and sent him for best in show three years ago. I was pleased to complete his show career and make him our first grand champion. He has the real Siamese oriental look, exquisite coat texture, long well-ringed tail, fine bone and what is so necessary in a stud cat a delightful and equable temperament. He was also best in show Siamese."

GR.CH. SEREMBAN LIGER passes his second-to-none nature on to his families. The kittens are gentle, always purring, loving to be touched and cuddled at all times. Exceptional progeny from LIGER to date are BAYARD AKHENATEN, Seal Tabbypoint male, CASMEN LIVIA, Seal Tabbypoint female, and REOKY PEDRO, Chocolate Tabbypoint male, all of whom have two Challenge Certificates to their credit and should become Champions at their next shows. Promising kittens include REOKY DORRETA, Seal Tabbypoint, MOONFLEET OLYMPUS, Seal Tabbypoint, and MOONFLEET ONDINE, Lilac Tabby point, plus quite a few up-and-coming litters from very nice queens.

LIGER's dam was bred by Mrs. Hudson, to whom I shall always be grateful; his sire, bred by Mrs. Warner, is now a much-loved Neuter owned by Mrs. Sylvia Horan.

England's first Siamese Grand Champion is now 4½ years old. With the few select queens he has and lots of love from me, I only hope he will live forever.

In the 1972-'73 show season he was in 22 CFA shows in which he was given 50 final wins including 24 Top Five awards of which several were Best Cat; and 78 Best of Breeds. He is the 1973 CFA National Colorpoint Shorthair; Northwest Regional 7th Best Cat, All Breed, and 5th Best Cat, Shorthair; and 3rd Best Shorthair Male. In ACFA he was named 1973 Regional and Inter-American Male of Color of Breed.

GR.CH. KASTLE ROCK KOUNTRY BOY, now over 2 years old, is retired from show. He is throwing kittens as good as and better than himself so we will let his sons and daughters take over for him.

ENGLAND'S TABBY POINTS (CONT'D FROM P. 19)

There have been many top winning Tabby-points over the past few years from numerous catteries. The greatest of these is *GRAND CHAMPION SEREMBAN LIGER*, England's very first Siamese Grand Champion. *LIGER*, bred by Mrs. Anne Aslin, is a superbly typical Seal Tabby-point with very deep blue eyes and a very pale coat. He won this award over tremendous competition; in fact, he competed against 30 leading Champions. This was a great achievement for his breeder and for Tabby-points in general. When so many people were putting up their objections to the new variety in the 60's, little did they think the first Grand Champion Siamese would be a Tabby-point.

At the Siamese Cat Club Show in 1972, most top honours were carried off by Tabby-points. *CH. ZILS ZENO* won the Grand Champion Certificate, and *PR. SUPRA TAI-PAN* the Grand Premier Certificate.

Tabby-points have won numerous Best-In-Show awards over the past season. A beautiful female, *MEIKLERIGGS HECATE*, was Best Kitten at the Wessex Champion Show, 1972, and an outstanding kitten, *SHYBU YOUNG SPYRO*, was Best Kitten at the Northern Siamese Champion Show, 1973. Another exquisite female, *CHEONA MEDEA*, was Best Female at the Siamese Cat Assn. Show 1973; she was bred by Mrs. Moore.

The tabby pattern is expressed as a result of a dominant gene. Therefore, cats bred from tabby points which do not show this pattern cannot produce tabby-pointed kittens unless bred to a tabby-point.

A problem which seems peculiar to most of the paler colour Tabby-points, i.e. Chocolate and Lilac, is lack of striping on the legs. I feel it is unfair for exhibits of this colouring to be penalized for this, as point colour develops last on the legs anyway and is usually less intense on this area in all Siamese.

Another problem is dark coats on Seal Tabby-points. Various breeders, including myself, are working on this problem.

One must own a Tabby-point to realize how intelligent, loving and cheeky they are! A cat of true beauty.

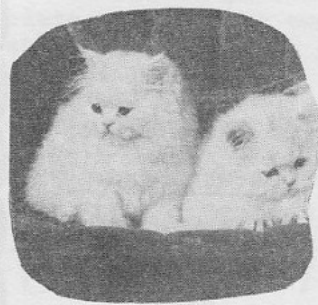

THE TABBY POINT SIAMESE (CONT'D FROM P.18)

Breed 32', and in January, 1967, the Shadow-point Siamese & Progressive Breeders Cat Club became the Tabbypoint Siamese & Progressive Breeders Cat Club and, with joint meetings and cooperation of the Tabbypoint Cat Society, have done and are doing much for these cats and all the new ones that inevitably result from any new breed such as the Blue Tabby-points, Chocolate Tabbypoints, Lilac Tabby-points and, recently, the Red and Tortie Tabbypoints.

GCCF TABBY POINT STANDARD (EFFECTIVE JUNE 20, 1973)

- TYPE & SHAPE:** As for Seal Pointed Siamese.
- GENERAL BODY COLOUR:** Pale coat, preferably free from body markings including back of head and neck and conforming to recognized Siamese standard for the particular colour of points.
- GENERAL POINTS COLOUR:** Same colour essential but varied tones acceptable, i.e. seal, blue, chocolate, lilac, red and cream. The standard for Tortie/Tabby Points is given below.
- EARS:** Solid, no stripes. Thumb marks as clear as possible.
- NOSE LEATHER:** Conforming to recognized Siamese standard for the particular colour of points or pink.
- MASK:** Clearly defined stripes, especially around the eyes and nose. Distinct markings on cheeks, darkly spotted whisker pads.
- EYES:** Brilliant clear blue. The lids to be dark rimmed or toning with the points.
- LEGS:** Clearly defined varied sized broken stripes. Solid markings on back of hind legs.
- TAIL:** Many varied sized clearly defined rings

Since the establishment of the Tabby-point Siamese we may look back and record our progress with satisfaction. These cats have superb type and eye colour, competing on equal terms for show honours with all other varieties of Siamese; the 'Miss Europe' last year was a beautiful Tabbypoint bred by Miss Brabyn, *INT. CH. SAKURA PARTHENIA*.

Having reached such a high standard, we must watch and concentrate on further improvements such as pale coats, strong chins, freedom from kinks, squints and other faults one finds in the Siamese breed as a whole.###

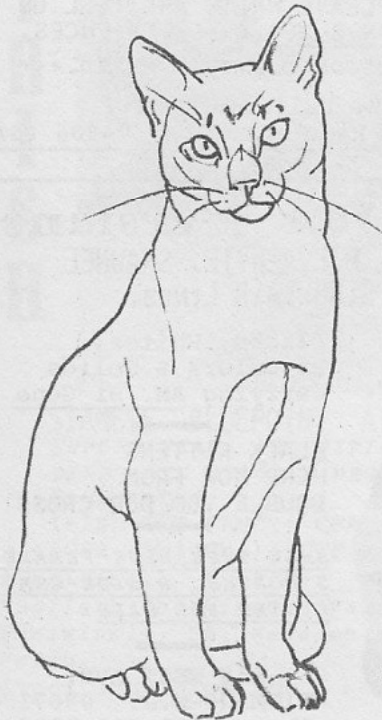

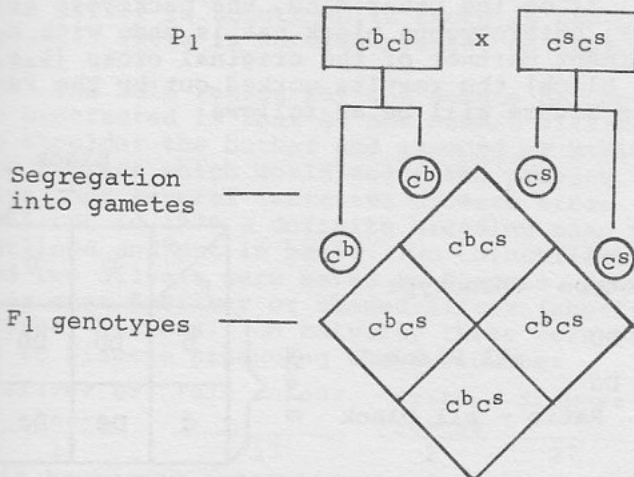
THE 1:2:1 RATIO

Some genes are not completely dominant over each other and this is true of the genes at the albino locus which are listed down the scale from full colour to siamese and possibly albino. In this series burmese is only partially dominant to siamese.

As the burmese/siamese heterozygote (Tonkanese) is reasonably well known, the experiment showing the ratio expected will be reconstructed with burmese and siamese.

The gene for burmese is symbolised c^b while the gene for siamese is symbolised c^s . As c^b is incompletely dominant over c^s the heterozygote is intermediate in effect.

A cross is made between a burmese and siamese, both homozygous.



The mating between $c^b c^b \times c^s c^s$ giving the F1 genotypes of $c^b c^s$ and thus all kittens of intermediate effect.

In order to produce the F2 a mating is planned between the F1 littermates or between cats of genotype like them. Each of these

SOLUTIONS TO SEPT./OCT. "PROBLEMS":

1. 'What is meant by genotype

The genotype of the cat is its "recipe" or coded instructions for its voice, temperament, colour, conformation and all other characteristics. The phenotype of the cat is the total of characteristic that may be seen, smelt, heard or otherwise identified by the senses. Thus, a colour genotype is the complex of colour genes CARRIED on the chromosomes of a cat and the colour phenotype is the VISIBLE colour of the cat.

2. 'If a Blue cat is mated

If a Blue cat is mated to a homozygous Black cat, all the kittens will be Black.

3. 'What colour gene

The colour gene common to the Brown Burmese, Seal Point Siamese, Brown Tabby and Chinchilla is Black, i.e. the Black cat with two genes for Burmese dilution becomes the Brown Burmese; the Black cat with two genes for Siamese dilution becomes the Seal Point Siamese; the Black cat with one OR two genes for agouti becomes the Brown Tabby and the Black cat with one or two genes for melanin inhibitor AND one or two genes for agouti becomes the Chinchilla.

cats produces two types of gametes and again four types of fertilisation are possible.

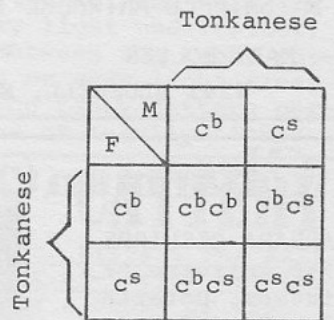

It should be remembered that the ratios relate only to the two alleles under investigation and that type and other factors are not included. Since 'type' is due to the joint action of many genes the F1 and F2 kittens in the above examples would be of indeterminate type.

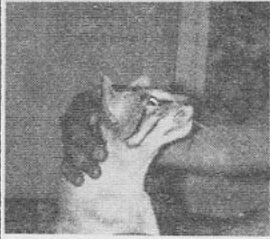

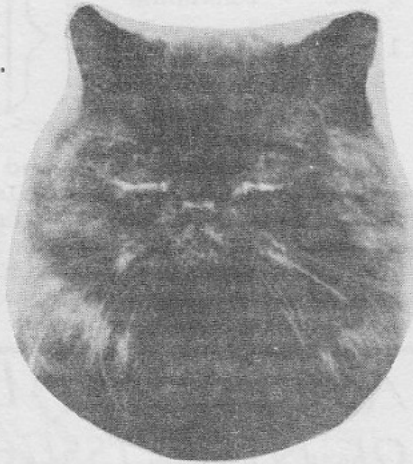

THE BACKCROSS

If a cat that is heterozygous for any one characteristic is mated to either of the two parental types the mating is called a backcross. As has been described the heterozygote forms two types of gametes while the homozygote forms only one. So fertilization results in a genotype ratio of 1:1.

The factors of dominance, partial dominance and recessivity then dictate the phenotypic ratio.

If an F₁ cat of the mating between the original blue and black cats is then backcrossed to its blue parent or to another blue the results will be as follows:

SPECIAL REPORT

GENETICS OF SILVER & SMOKE

BY PATRICIA TURNER & ROY ROBINSON

The precise heredity of silver, chinchilla and smoke has been the subject of debate in the fancy for a number of years especially between the more discerning cat breeders, who felt that their experience contradicted the current explanation of recessive inheritance of silver and smoke, and geneticists, who based their opinion on the published evidence. This article presents breeding results which show that the old explanation will have to be revised.

But, firstly, a little history. In 1933 Clyde S. Keeler and Virginia Cobb published the results of crosses between smoke and

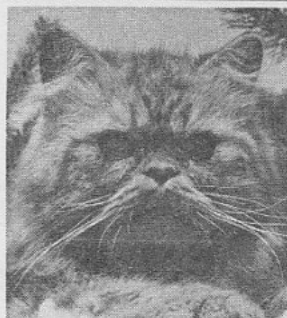

black longhairs and silver, smoke longhairs and Siamese (i.e. smoke x black LH, smoke x Siamese, etc.) which indicated that the gene for silver was inherited as a recessive to full colour but dominant to Siamese. Since Siamese is known to be inherited as a recessive to full colour (i.e. black, blue, etc.), these results implied that full colour (represented in the crosses as tabby or black), silver or smoke and Siamese were a series of three alternative genes. In support of this conclusion, silver and Siamese were likened to Chinchilla and Himalayan of the rabbit which are known to be inherited in this manner. Anyone who is familiar with these varieties of rabbit cannot fail to be impressed by the similarity of appearance of silver and chinchilla and Siamese and Himalayan. The difference between silver and smoke cats is that silver is agouti while smoke is non-agouti. There is no disagreement on this point.

The main reason why the debate has been so protracted is that no one seemed willing to shoulder the bother and expense of making the crosses which would solve the problem. We have made several tentative crosses since 1968 but in 1970 a definite breeding plan was outlined and put in hand. Two Chinchillas and two Silvers were mated to Siamese, producing over 8 silver or shaded-silver (short-haired) kittens. On maturity these were mated to Siamese producing the following:

This backcross generation is decisive and deserves to be examined in detail. On the Keeler-Cobb explanation, the 15 kittens of the two centre classes should not have occurred. In more detail these are 2 black, 1 blue, 1 lilac, 1 blue-cream, 2 blue tabby, 6 brown tabby and 2 Siamese Smoke. Now it could be argued that the first 7 kittens are in reality smoke in which the white undercolour has either failed to appear or is indistinct. This is true and is recognised. However, the 6 brown tabbies were unmistakable. The two smoke Siamese were also unmistakable in that they were Seal except for the white undercolour of the smoke and distinctive tabby facial markings. Only two of these have been definitely observed but others may well have been bred. It is well known that young Smoke kittens are not always easy to classify. The majority of the Siamese in the last group are agouti and we have found it impossible to

distinguish the young kitten that is the Siamese equivalent of the "Shaded Silver" from an ordinary agouti Siamese (Tabby Point).

We have concluded that the above breeding results are consistent with the heredity of a dominant gene which is independent of Siamese. Those breeders who have been maintaining that silver and smoke are inherited as a dominant are thus vindicated. However, it has not been possible hitherto to show that the gene is independent of Siamese and this has now been accomplished. We have symbolised the gene by I (denoting inhibition of hair melanin). The action of the gene is to partially inhibit the formation of melanin in the coat - the effect being most pronounced for those areas which are least pigmented. That is, the basal portion of the hair (to produce a white or very light undercolour) and the agouti areas between the tabby pattern (to produce white or very light areas with dark ticking). The tabby pattern persists as concentrations of heavily ticked

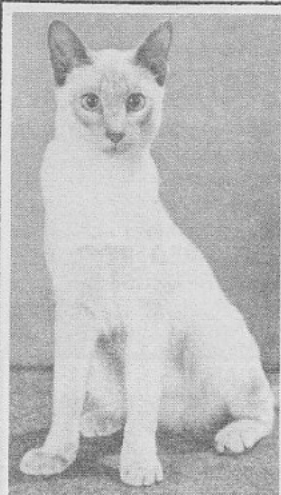

hairs over a white undercolour. This is the silver and it is easy to perceive why it should be confused with a chinchillated animal.

A chinchillated animal is one in which all (or most) yellow pigment is removed. It so happens that the agouti areas most strongly affected by the action of the I gene are those which manifest most of the yellow pigment in the coat. The mongrel silver often shows a suffusion of yellow on the head and back but this has been eliminated from the exhibition silver by selective breeding. Small wonder that the silver resembles a chinchillated animal but the resemblance is misleading genetically.

In the smoke, the white undercolour persists but the action of the non-agouti gene is to extend the black ticking to all parts of the coat. The points become very dark or black and the amount of white undercolour is reduced. There is considerable variation of undercolour as a matter of fact. In some animals the undercolour is obvious, with only the tips of the hairs being pigmented. In others, the undercolour is merely lighter than usual and the cat may, superficially, be mistaken for an ordinary black. Indeed, there are indications that some smokes so closely resemble blacks that even experienced observers are confused. The occurrence of smokes that are apparently black explains the misleading fact that two "blacks" may produce smoke kittens if either parent has a smoke sire or dam.

The chinchilla cat is an interesting breed, particularly in relation to the silver. That the two are related is obvious. In fact, for a short while in kittenhood, the chinchilla looks like a silver but quickly loses the tabby pattern, becoming almost white except for fine black tipping. It has long been accepted that the chinchilla differs genetically from silver by the possession of modifying genes increasing the white undercolour. There is no reason to change this supposition except perhaps to make it more precise. The chinchilla is the extreme expression of the I gene, where the pigmentation has been confined to the tip of the hair. The long hair probably enhances the effect although shorthaired chinchillas are known. The amount and/or quality of the tipping is variable as shown by the occurrence of the shaded silver (in the U.S.A. particularly). It is possible that the I gene is semi-dominant so that II is chinchilla and Ii is shaded silver. We hope to investigate this interesting possibility in due course.

Is it possible to reconcile the breeding data reported by Keeler and Cobb with the present hypothesis? There is only one cross reported by these authors which would seem in direct disagreement and that is the mating of two black cats which produced 5 black and 1 smoke kitten. However, this is not decisive since smoke can resemble black and one parent may have been smoke. In the initial crosses, a smoke mated to a black gave 5 black and mated to a tabby gave 4 tabby. Usually the sum of these two litters (9 kittens) would be sufficient to establish statistically (but not genetically) that smoke is inherited as a recessive but, strictly speaking, the black kittens cannot be counted (because one or more could be dark smoke) and the 4 tabbies by themselves are not numerically sufficient. It is perhaps pertinent to note that Keeler and Cobb remark that one of the smoke kittens produced during their experiments was "darker than the rest and gave evidence of the silver factor only upon the appendages and about the eyes".

There remains the possibility that Keeler and Cobb did actually discover a silver gene which is recessive to black. This idea implies that two genes for silver exist in the cat. Well, it is possible but improbable in our view. Only the future can decide this question. Keeler and Cobb experimented with cats of North America while ours are British stock with remote ancestry featuring imported chinchilla cats. But this difference is immaterial for several American breeders have been just as adamant as the British that silver or smoke are inherited as a dominant. The same opinion has been expressed by a breeder in South Africa.

In 1960 BROUGHTON JANE went to Joan Richards to help establish the Pensylva line. The following year, bred to JEZREEL JAKE, BROUGHTON JANE delivered a lovely blue named PENSYLVA BELLA. In 1962 the same cross produced PENSYLVA QUICKEE. And in that same year Mrs. I. Johnson's JEZREEL JOMO was born. Sired by ALDRA'S DARK TALISMAN, JOMO is perhaps one of the finest British Shorthairs ever bred.

BROUGHTON JANE will be remembered for years to come as one of the most significant cats in the history of the British Shorthairs. She lived to January, 1971. Mrs. Richards has told me the poignant story of JANE's last day. She had cancer and, on the morning of her death, one of her daughters presented a litter of JANE's grandchildren. Mrs. Richards says, "she showed interest and gave each a brief lick, and her contentment and life seemed complete." Thus BROUGHTON JANE died at the age of sixteen years, leaving to us a distinguished line of lovely cats.

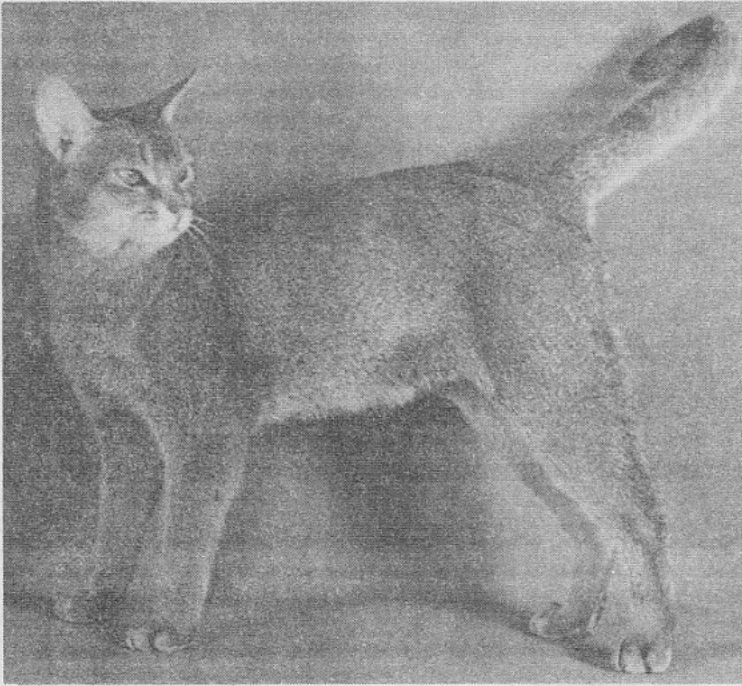
The Pensylva and Jexreel Blue-Creams were particularly outstanding, and these two catteries produced some extraordinary cream shorthairs. The line of succession passed from Mingswyck and Jezreel to Aldra to Pensylva. only will they be delayed, if not rejected, at vetting-in, but no judge is likely to give them a high award.

The second part of the preparation concerns the cat's upbringing. Many cats resent having their mouths opened or their ears examined because they associate these procedures with pills or lotions and they are, therefore, easily upset and difficult to examine. If the owner will look in a kitten's ears and mouth as part of the grooming routine right from the start, it will accept it without complaint (and you will spot signs of trouble sooner). It is also useful to accustom the cat to being restrained by the scruff of the neck in case this is ever necessary at a show.

I hear that in the United States exhibitors are asked to trim their cats' claws before arrival at a show: this reduces the risk of damage to judges and stewards if the cat is frightened or loses its temper. I know that many experienced exhibitors here in Britain already prepare their cats in this

way, but I feel it would be an excellent idea if more people considered it.

FEEDING ORPHANED KITTENS

I was interested to note Dr. Sealing's article in the last issue of CAT WORLD on rearing orphaned kittens.

To feed such kittens, I feel it would be advisable to first try them with a specially designed feeding bottle (see back cover, CAT WORLD, May/June, 1973) and proprietary feed. A strong kitten will usually suck well when the teat is placed in its mouth.

The amount of feed delivered is controlled by the size of hole in the teat, and the amount of air allowed in at the other end of the bottle. Provided that the kitten is not allowed to suck more feed in than it can swallow, it will not suffocate.

Dr. Sealing's instructions on the preparation of the feed and the necessity for frequent feeds apply equally to bottle feeding. Only if the kitten refuses to accept the bottle, or will not take adequate amounts at each feed, would I advise tube-feeding.###
