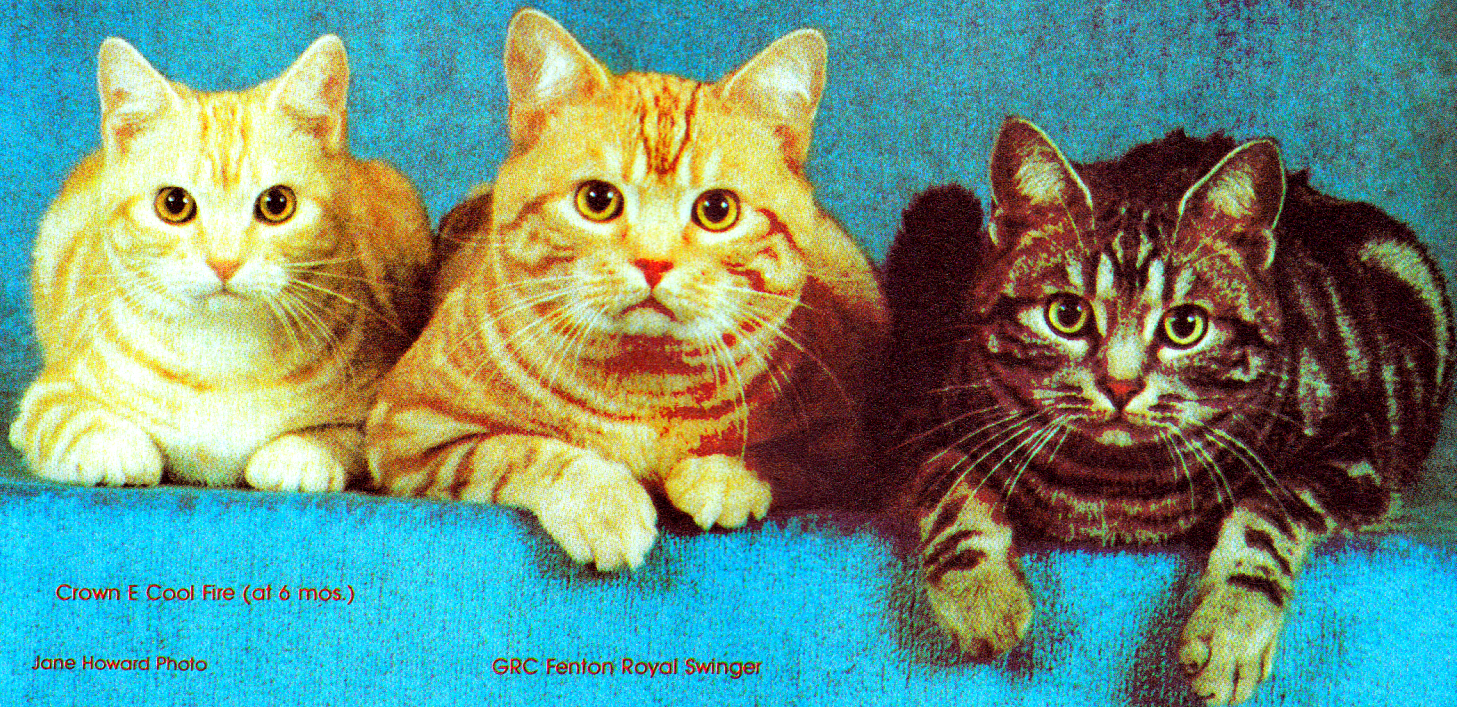



"I DON'T WANT TO MAKE TROUBLE....."

My answer in many instances is: "You aren't *making* trouble — You are already in trouble!" To the novice, so many aspects of the cat fancy are foreign and awesome; they have bought a cat from someone who is "in the know" about the breed so is bound to have sold a "good" one. There are some who wouldn't dream of letting a novice have a "good" cat. At the point the cat fails to get ribbons, is sick soon after being brought home, or turns out to have a serious physical defect, it's not a matter of "making trouble" — the trouble *exists*. Frequently, the buyer knows she's been somehow "taken" and she's as mad at herself as at anybody. The cat is a disappointment but she can't bring herself to take it back to "that place". If the place the cat came from doesn't come up to standards, go elsewhere for a cat.

In my beginnings in the Fancy, I was given a mature female of a breed about which I knew very little. She was squalling and treading so I took her to a breeder I'd heard about through someone who thought she might have stud service to offer. Richard and I drove miles with her to the cattery, presented our odd-acting female, and asked about stud service. The breeder looked at our cat and sniggered — and quoted us a price, which we accepted. We were told to come back in a day or so. Eventually, we were the owners of what was nothing more than a litter of pet quality kittens! *Too late* we found out our queen was a duck, not a swan, and the breeder should have told us to take her home and get her spayed. Did we make a fuss? No, as a matter of fact, we didn't. I'm relating this so everyone will know I'm not sitting in judgment, but have been there myself. I should have "made trouble" so that, maybe, the next novice couple with a screaming pet quality cat would not have received the same shrift. That's a good thought to hold — say to yourself: "I may be stuck, but at least I can do something to prevent this happening to the next hopeful beginner."

Breeders do not sell to novices because they have worked hard for their lines and do not want to squander a

good cat on someone who has no idea how to groom, show, feed, breed it — the cat might as well be buried as handed over to somebody like that. There are some who genuinely try to help a novice. I had a "mentor" to whom I will always be grateful - Mrs. Doris Gardner, *Arcadia Cattery*, Arcadia, California took the time to tell me so much and I will always be grateful to her for her patience and for sharing her knowledge with a newcomer with plenty of enthusiasm who didn't even know she was plunging into a lifelong tussle with the one who in the long run makes all the decisions - *Mother Nature*.

Hindsight tells me I should have *known the standard* and been sure that little cat of mine was worthy of being bred before I ever took her to that breeder! When folks come to me for kittens, I advise them to visit as many shows and as many catteries as possible, obtain and study the standard for the breed — if their heart is set on my breed, I give them a standard and all the lit. I have available — and they get a serious talk aimed at letting them know beforehand what *Mother Nature* may have in store for them if they decide to become a part of our wonderful cat fancy and be a credit to it.

The novice who has really studied her chosen breed will stand a much finer chance of gaining the respect of the breeder, and of getting a finer cat.



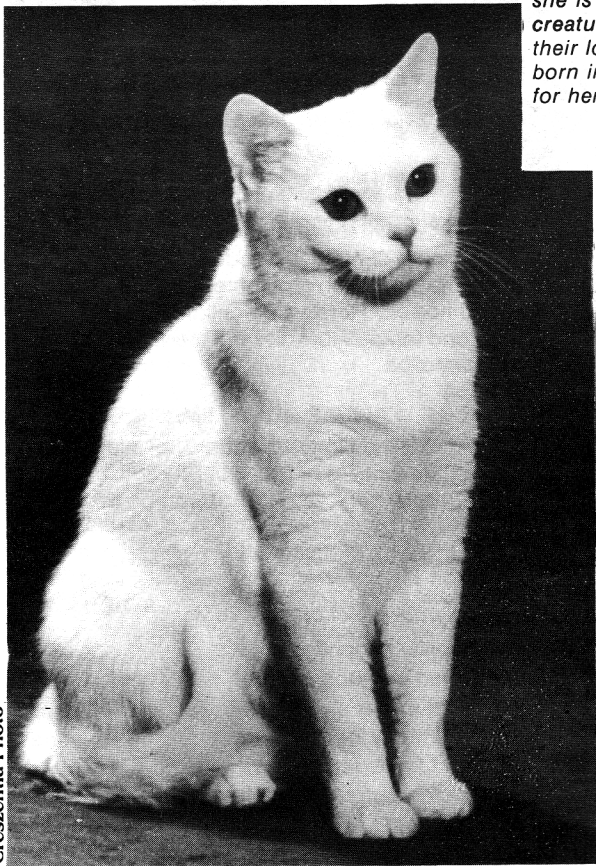
We began to plan a show career for Snowmaiden. We registered her with CFA and entered her in the Empire Cat Club show in New York City, on February 27-28, '79. She did very well but could only be shown as a 'Provisional'; and it was then that we joined the fight to have British Shorthairs accepted in CFA for Championship classes. We entered her in as many shows as we could possibly make. In February, 1980, our daughter, Kimberly, took Snowmaiden to the CFA Quarterly Board Meeting in Houston, Texas and it was here that the British Shorthairs were granted Championship status, to start with the May 1980 show season.

Snowmaiden was awarded the required six Winners ribbons at her first two shows and was the first British Shorthair to become a CFA Champion. As we continued showing her and the judges got to see more of Snowmaiden and become familiar with the British Shorthair breed, the rosettes started coming. On November 5, 1980 in Stamford, Connecticut, she received the final points to make her CFA's first British Shorthair Grand Champion. She went on to become the best British Shorthair in the Northeast Region and, in Las Vegas, at the CFA Annual, she received the plaque as the best British Shorthair in CFA for the 1980-81 show season — a 'First' for a British Shorthair cat!

We are very honored and proud that our Snowmaiden of Denimar, a copper-eyed white female, is the first of her breed to win all these CFA honors, and we are very grateful to her breeder, Mary Stringer, of Scotland, who is one of the best white British Shorthair breeders in the U.K. She made our dream come true.

Importing cats into England from the U.S.A. & Canada

by Brenda Barrett — *FINCHFIELD* Persians

Having been breeding and exhibiting Persian cats for almost 20 years, with careful breeding I have improved my cats and have been successful in breeding Champions, Grand Champions and International Champions, in Blue, CE White, Cream, B/Cream and now Bicolor. Indeed *CWI* (March/April '75) was kind enough to feature *GRC FINCHFIELD MICHAEL*, CE White, who became Britain's first longhair Grand Champion.

The type of the American Persian has improved enormously over recent years and I particularly admire the enormous head, short compact powerful body, and terrific bold eye shape and super color. Some of the Persians I have judged here in England are tending towards the rangy body shape, and require bigger heads and wider faces, together with a prevalence of weak eye color (and sometimes green rims). I decided to try to import a colorbred blue male with US type and eye color.

With the help of *CWI* and the *CFA* Yearbooks, I began writing to breeders of colorbred blues. Looking for "colorbred" blues in the USA is not easy as very few breeders specialise in pure-blue breeding. On the whole I would say that breeders in the UK are more "pedigree proud" and do not mix strange colors into their blues. I must have written about 20 letters — and got 4 replies for which I thank those who took the trouble to answer.

At last I was fortunate enough to contact Mrs. Ray of *BLACK BLUFF* cattery in Rome, Georgia. She was willing to sell me a kitten. After a lot of persuasion, Mrs. Ray let me have one of her Grand Champions and she took in exchange *Finchfield Nathan*, a young colorbred blue male, to introduce new blood into her cattery. Hence our first import was *CFA GRC Black Bluff Tinker Toy*. He arrived in UK October 9th, 1980 and we took him home April 8th, 1981.

He has proved a valuable asset to the Finchfield cattery and is siring some fabulous kittens. The first to be shown, *Fleurielle Model T.*, a blue male bred by my friend Carole Mellor, went Best in Show at his first 2 shows and 2 litter sisters, *Finchfield Elly May* and *Finchfield Tinkas Gal*, have both been Best Blue Kitten — *Elly May* at our mammoth National show (3,000 cats), held at Olympia, London, December '81, where her new owner, Mme. Burel, of Paris, France, came and collected her and showed her in Poitiers, February '82, where she was Best in Show. *Tinkas Gal* was Best Blue Kitten at the Surrey & Sussex CC show in March 1982.

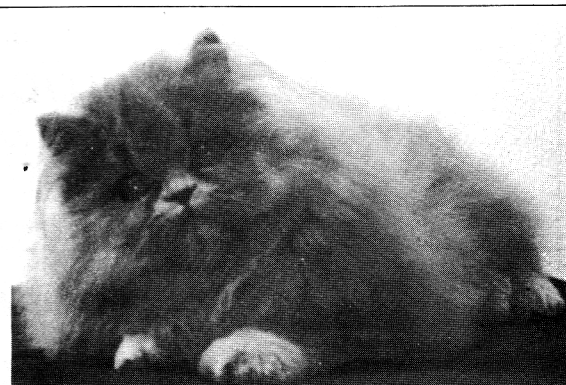
Our second import was a CE White female from

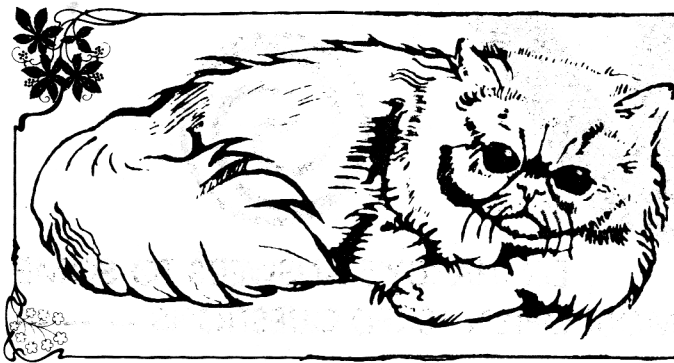
Holland, out of US parents. This turned into a disaster as she had such awful epileptic fits that my vet said she must be put to sleep. This broke my heart.

The third import was not planned as we had no intention of buying a Bicolor, but when we got a phone call to say that *Quapaw Samovar* was up for sale, my husband bought Sam for himself as he breeds the Bicolors. Sam is the most superb Cream/White, 3 yrs. old. Sam arrived between snow blizzards and airport strikes in January 1982.

On visiting Sam as soon as we were allowed to see him after his arrival in UK quarantine, we couldn't believe our eyes! . . . he was gorgeous!. Sam has caused quite a stir over here, as our Bi's just don't have his type. He was bred by Thelma Sequoyah Sloss, of Belfast, Prince Edward Island, Canada. Thelma and I have become great friends, exchanging phone calls and magazines.

Finally, I needed another colorbred blue to put to Tinker Toy's daughters. I have been most fortunate in being able to buy a male and female kitten from Mrs. Norma Jean Bromwell, *IOWANA* Cattery, Springfield, IL. Indeed, I am honoured as these are the first "Iowanas" ever to be shipped. They arrived in UK in February '82 and are in quarantine at Wild Acres quarantine cattery, Clows Top, Worcs. As I was able to choose their names, I thought it would be nice if *Iowana Mr. President* and his wife, *Iowana First Lady*, could come to live at the Finchfield cattery in l'il ol' England, and we have the presidential suite waiting for them when they come out of quarantine in August. We hope they will do great things for the British Cat Fancy as they are both beautiful, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank the breeders

of these superb cats for entrusting them to us.

An animal coming into Great Britain must do 6 months compulsory quarantine, at owner's expense. This is a government ruling. We are a rabies-free country and want to stay that way, although I wish there were an easier way. After choosing the cat, the next step is to book the quarantine unit. Obviously it is wise to visit several places beforehand to see whether they are suitable etc. The quarantine proprietor will then apply for the import licence which will go, together with the labels for the carrying box, direct to the seller from the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food, the Ministry that controls quarantine matters. The licence and official labels are proof to the airlines that quarantine space is booked. The owner may not greet the cat upon arrival and as the cattery agent is the only person allowed to collect the cat from the airport, a mutual date must be arranged all round. Upon arrival at the cattery, the cat will be given shots for rabies and 'feliflu', even if they were given in the USA before departure. Another government rule is that the owner or buyer may not visit the cat for the first 14 days. This is to see if the cat isn't sickening for something. On the first visiting day, I am always so excited - but apprehensive - waiting to see if the cat lives up to my dreams. To bring a cat into Great Britain from the USA and Canada does not leave much change out of \$1,000, excluding the purchase price of the cat. Thus some careful thinking must be done before importing.

The final commodities that must be in abundance are patience and perseverance. It took all my resources in these departments during the 3½ years leading up to finding Tinker Toy, and then more in organising his safe arrival to Finchfield cattery. However, Tinker Toy's first few kittens have been reward enough. I look forward in eager anticipation to kittens from these American lines in the next few years.

DR. HARDY'S ANSWERS TO SOME MOST OFTEN ASKED QUESTIONS — — —

1. How common is FeLV infection?

FeLV is not common in the general cat population. However, in multiple cat households in which a leukemic or FeLV infected cat has lived an average of 33% of the healthy cats are infected. Only 1% of stray cats are infected with FeLV.

2. Is FeLV always found in cats with lymphosarcoma?

Approximately 70% of leukemic cats actively produce infectious virus. In the other 30% of leukemic cats, FeLV is not actively produced (i.e. these cats test FeLV negative), even though it is now known that FeLV is the cause of the disease. In these cats, FeLV had previously damaged the cats genes leading to the development of lymphosarcoma, even though the virus was later rejected.

3. How is FeLV transmitted? FeLV is transmitted contagiously between pet cats. The primary route of infection is via the saliva which contains more virus, volume for volume, than the blood. FeLV is also present in the urine. Thus, feeding bowls and litter pans are the most likely sources of infection. (also see answer 12.)

4. What happens as a result of exposure to FeLV?

FeLV exposed cats either become persistently infected (28%), become immune and develop an antibody response to the virus and reject the infection (42%), or remain uninfected and susceptible to future infection (30%). A lot depends on the degree of exposure and the immune capabilities of the individual cat.

5. What makes FeLV important? What diseases are related or result from it?

FeLV is the largest single killer of cats apart from accidents. The virus causes several non-cancerous diseases in addition to leukemia. For example: non-regenerative anemia, panleukopenia-like syndrome, fading kitten syndrome, late occurring abortions and resorptions as well as numerous secondary infectious diseases resulting from the suppression of the cat's defense mechanism are all caused by FeLV.

6. What is the prognosis for cats with a persistent FeLV viremia?

Healthy cats with a persistent FeLV infection have an 83% chance of dying from one of the FeLV diseases within 3½ years of infection. Only 3 to 5% of persistently infected cats reject the virus and become immune.

7. Which cats are likely to develop persistent FeLV infections?

Cats that have lived for some time in the same household or cattery with an infected cat are most likely to become infected as a result of the continuous exposure to the infected cat.

8. Are some cats more susceptible than others to FeLV?

No one breed of cat is more susceptible than any other. Susceptibility is primarily a function of exposure, although sick cats (who have a lowered resistance to disease) and newborn kittens are especially vulnerable.

9. How can persistently viremic cats be detected? What are the signals?

Viremic cats can only be identified by a properly done immunofluorescent antibody test or ELISA blood test for FeLV. These tests are available through veterinarians.

Cats that have one of the FeLV diseases, in addition to the virus, often exhibit non specific signs such as anemia, poor coat condition, loss of appetite, diarrhea or difficulty in breathing. If any cat has these signs a veterinarian should be consulted immediately. However, many FeLV infected healthy cats show no signs of illness at all.

10. Why should cats be tested for FeLV?

A cat should be tested for FeLV if:

- 1) it is suspected that the cat has been exposed to an FeLV infected cat,
- 2) the cat is suspected by a veterinarian of having one of the FeLV diseases,
- 3) the cat is being sent to live in another (FeLV free) cattery for breeding purposes, or,
- 4) as part of the FeLV test and removal program.

All FeLV infected cats should be strictly kept away (isolated) from all other cats in order to prevent the spread of the virus (see answer 11.)

11. Can FeLV infections be controlled?

FeLV infections can be controlled by means of a test and removal program. In this program all the leukemic or FeLV infected cats are removed from the cattery, the litter pans and feeding bowls are cleaned with detergent and all the remaining cats are tested for the virus. The household is quarantined for 3 months and all the cats are then retested to ensure that no cats are incubating the virus. If all the cats are negative in the two tests the cattery is then FeLV-free.

12. Is there a minimum age for FeLV testing?

If a kitten is suspected of being exposed to FeLV it can be tested at any age from one day old on. However, the queen should have been tested before being bred, if she lives in an FeLV exposed household. If a queen is infected with FeLV she will pass the virus to her unborn kittens, while they are in the uterus, and also in the milk shortly after birth.

13. What should be done with cats with persistent FeLV infections?

Persistently infected cats have a poor prognosis and are a danger to uninfected cats. For these reasons I recommend that all immunofluorescent antibody test positive cats be euthanized. At the very least such cats should be isolated from all other cats. I must caution against euthanasia of ELISA positive cats unless they are rechecked by the immunofluorescent antibody test because many (30 to 50%) ELISA positive cats are NOT infected with FeLV.

14. Are FeLV-positive cats a danger to humans?

FeLV can grow in human cells in the laboratory. However, the public health risk from FeLV is at present unknown. But because of the uncertainties surrounding this question I recommend that human contact with infected cats be kept to a minimum. I would not live with an FeLV infected cat.

15. Can immunity to FeLV be assessed?

It is possible to determine on an experimental basis if a cat is immune to FeLV. However such a test is not routinely available and would probably not be of great value to cat owners. The most important test for cat owners is the FeLV test, from which the current FeLV status of a cattery can be determined.

16. How can a FeLV-free cattery/household be maintained?

All cats that are brought into the household, or who return from breeding at another cattery, should be tested for FeLV before they are allowed to mix with the other cats in the household. This will prevent infection of cats in the cattery or household.*

17. In a cattery from where (a) positive cat(s) has/have been removed, how long before other cats can be introduced?

To be absolutely safe the FeLV test and removal program should be followed rigorously. In households in which only one infected cat was present and subsequently removed, a period of 1 week is sufficient before reintroducing cats into the cattery or household.

Sometimes Known As The **SWIMMING CAT**

The Turkish Van Cats have been around in Britain since 1955 when Laura Lushington and her friend, Sonia Halliday, brought in the first pair from Turkey. Four years later they imported a further pair. At the time something of a stir was caused among cat fanciers as the Turks, having no woolly undercoat, neither fitted into the long-haired category like the Persians, nor could they be described as short-haired. Furthermore, the head was said to be too Asiatic for a supposed long-hair. This resulted in suggestions that they should be crossed with white long-hairs in order to correct these peculiarities. Miss Lushington, however, would have none of this, her view being that they were a pure bred type and, if they were crossed with anything else, they would no longer be Turkish Vans. VAN was the name Miss Lushington took for her cattery prefix, taken from the district of Lake Van where the cats were first seen swimming in the lakes.



When she decided on that name she did not then know that, according to the rules of the Governing Council of the Cat Fancy, one must not use place names, thus the reason for finally deciding to call them Turkish Cats rather than Van. Now, with the Angora it has become necessary to call them Turkish Van to avoid confusion.

With the assistance of the officers of the *Colourpoint*



Rex-Coated & A.O.V. Club, with which the Turkish Group is now affiliated, Miss Lushington's stance was accepted and, in June 1967, the breed was granted a Provisional standard by the Governing Council of the Cat Fancy (GCCF), who are the sole Authority in Britain on such matters. In 1969, the standard was confirmed and championship status, together with the Breed No.13d, was granted. The points are as follows: -

COLOUR & COAT: Chalk White with no trace of yellow. Auburn markings on face with white blaze. Ears white; nose tip, pads and inside ears a delicate shell pink. Fur long, soft and silky to the roots, no woolly undercoat.

HEAD: Short wedge; well feathered large ears upright and set fairly close together; long nose.

EYES: Round, colour light amber, rims pink-skinned.

BODY: Long but sturdy, legs medium in length; neat round feet with well tufted toes. Males should be particularly muscular on neck and shoulders.

TAIL: Full, medium length, auburn in colour with faint auburn rings in cats, more distinct ring markings in kittens.

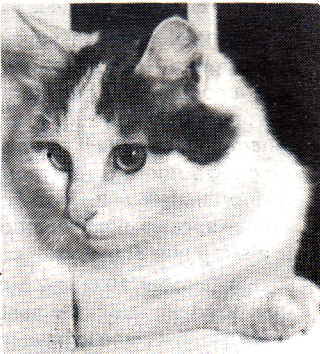
Average weight of the males is about 12-lbs. (Neuters have been known to tip the scales at 19-lbs.) They are cobby and muscular in build and they are affectionate and cuddly. The females are dainty, and average about 8-lbs. They make good mothers and, together with their owners, dote upon their kittens. These are born with the markings already defined, and they are beautiful right from the start.

Vans are at their best in winter. In their country of origin — the area of Lake Van and Mt. Ararat, the winters are lengthy and very cold and their beautiful silky coat grows long and abundant, the males displaying a magnificent ruff. In the summer, however, the weather gets very hot and the animal sheds its coat to such an extent that it could easily be taken for a shorthair. It is then that it takes to the waters — to cool off.

My interest in the Turks was aroused when I first read about them in the early days; but I did not actually become involved until 1966. I was intrigued by the fact that they were still striving for recognition as a breed, and that a number of worthy cat people were interested. I received my first queen, *Van Fethiye*, from Miss Lushington and commenced breeding. She was a delightful little queen, very dainty, with the sweetest nature you could hope for. She adored shows and seemed to bow to her public as they stopped by her cage.

My next queen was *Gelidonya Karides* (Shrimp), who is still with

me now.

The first Turk I showed was *Van Nukre*, also still alive and very beautiful at 15 years of age. She was spayed when I bought her, six months old, and not at all used to human company. This, I believe, was the reason for her doubtful temperament. She is still very shy, although she lives in a box on top of my washing machine. Van Nukre drew unfavourable comment twice, I am afraid, by biting a steward. Judge Dr. Ivor Raleigh remarked in *Fur & Feather* that he thought it would be unfair to show her again, a view with which I heartily concurred. There

have been others of this breed that have had skirmishes with judges and stewards — just as there must be judges and stewards who have had

skirmishes with other breeds, so that I find nothing extraordinary in this. I personally have always found the Turks easy to handle and I am sure my fellow breeders would agree with me. With the growth of the number of breeders it is quite evident from the comments of many judges, both in Britain and on the continent, that these cats are now becoming very adaptable. They are animals of individual personality and much depends on the moulding influence of their owners.

I would estimate that there are about 100 breeding Turkish Vans distributed over Britain, France, Holland, Denmark, Switzerland, Germany, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Canada. There were one or two breeders in the States, as a friend of mine, who no

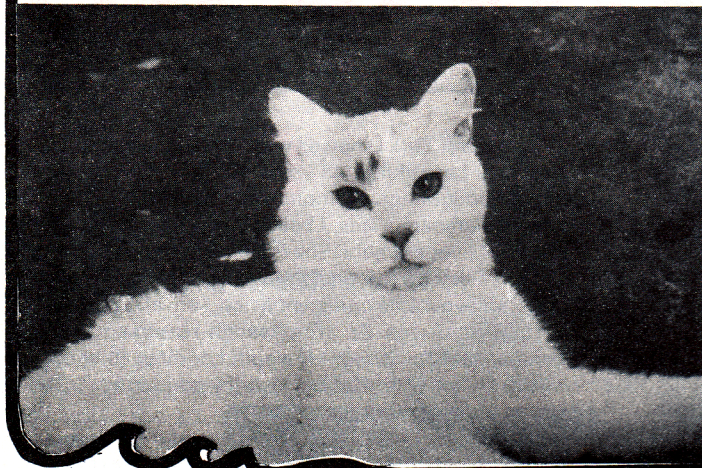

longer breeds, exported one or two a few years ago. But I don't think anything grew from this. Indeed, I am informed the Turkish Vans are not even recognized in America. I gather that some of the withdrawal symptoms go back to the days when the likes of Van Nukre let the side down. This, according to one American breeder's veterinarian is "due to inbreeding". It is remarkable how glibly veterinarians blame inbreeding as the cause of the temperament of a high spirited animal when you think of how incestuous are the pedigrees of many dogs and cats that have been evolved by man in the past. In fact it would be possible to infer that the reasons why some animals are docile is for precisely the same argument. The veterinarian is after all a man of business, and he can be forgiven for latching onto the inbreeding theory to avoid offending the client who pays the bills.

However, for many reasons which do not have to be explained to the experienced breeder, the introduction of new blood is of paramount importance. As long ago as November, 1972, Miss Lushington made this point in *Fur & Feather*:

"I am in the process of importing further Turkish cats to enlarge my stock and that of my co-breeders. I have engaged the help of a friend, who has been working in Turkey (and who has long been associated with me in the establishing of the breed), to obtain a pair of Turkish (Van) kittens or of young cats for me. She has been making arrangements with this object in mind, but has been

for the last three months, and still is, coping with the multifarious regulations regarding the export of these cats from Turkey.

"Other breeders of this unique breed are fully aware of their responsibilities in perfecting their recently established lines. They have agreed with me that we cannot, for the time being, sell further queens for breeding and subsequent mating to our present studs, until more pure Turkish (Van) cats are introduced to our stocks. This is a hard and laborious tenet to stick to, but other breeders will realise that we hold ourselves true to the requirements of the GCCF.

"We are all striving to keep the Turkish cat pure, refusing to cross or in-breed. They have been granted their own Standard of Points and are as they are, without scientific experimentation. Seventeen years of establishing this interesting breed is not going to be helped by undue haste or reckless breeding."

In 1980 I sold a stud to Michelle Ledermann of Draguignan — the first Turkish Van to enter France. *Kastamonou Fahir* has literally done the Grand Tour of Europe with his owner. He is now an International Grand Champion, but this is not his only achievement. I have it on good authority, from more than one source, that he is an inordinately well-loved Tom, with several ladies of the human species, not to mention the gentlemen, delighting in seeing him at the shows.

In October, 1980, my husband and I realised a long-cherished ambition. My husband, Noel, went to Turkey twice, once in June to pave the way and again in October to bring back two unrelated queens. One is called *Benek*

Kadikoylu Ikingi — Benek means Spot and she was thus named by her owner in Turkey because she has one on her shoulder. This is quite common in the breed and the Turks call these spots the "thumb mark of Allah". Kadikoylu — from the village of Kadikoy, Ikingi — 2nd. The other queen is *Cicek Modali Ucingi* — Cicek (pronounced Chichek) means flower; Modali — from the village of Moda; Ucingi — 3rd. (There was to have been a first, but this is another story!)

In Britain, owing to our anti-rabies laws, importing livestock is a complicated, long and expensive business and the cats have to spend six months in quarantine. My husband will tell how he got them in Turkey:

IMPORTING TURKISH VAN CATS INTO BRITAIN

"Turkish people are among the world's worst correspondents as I found when letters to certain veterinary and zoological contacts remained unanswered. It was obvious that to obtain new stock of Turkish Van Cats I must go to the country and look for myself.

"Once having arrived, I found the people charming, hospitable and very helpful — it's just that they do not like writing letters. I made contact with an animal protection society, *Istanbul Hayvan Sevenler Dernegi*, who introduced me to families who possessed the type of cats I wanted, and I spent a pleasant two weeks getting to know these people and making arrangements to be advised when kittens became available. I have some knowledge of the Turkish language, which proved very helpful.

"Six months later, having been advised by telephone (not by letter!) that some kittens were ready, armed with a British import licence (which I was lucky enough to get within a week) I set off again for Turkey, where I selected two unrelated females. I paid nothing for the kittens. They were a gift. Honour was satisfied by my making a contribution to the funds of the animal protection society — in fact, I became a member.

"The Turkish Government imposes no restrictions on the export of Van Cats; but the red tape involved in getting them away took two days of concentrated effort and travelling between the offices of the various departments concerned, even with the help of my friends in the animal protection society, who knew all the ropes.

"I used a special crate, which I took with me, but I understand I could have bought one at Istanbul airport. The cats travelled in the cargo compartment of the same plane as myself. On arrival at Heathrow (London airport) they went immediately into quarantine and I was not allowed to go near them.

"The next time I saw the kittens was a few weeks later, when I was allowed to visit them at the Cheldene Quarantine Cattery, (Mrs. Margaret Manolson), Aldbourne Chase, near Marlborough, in Wiltshire, where they received first class attention." — *J. N. Russell*

We took possession of Benek and Cicek in April 1981 and, on October 25th we were able to show three of their offspring at a meeting of our Turkish Group. I was not able to use my prefix because, according to GCCF rules, new, unregistered imports cannot be given one. There is no Cat Fancy in Turkey; there are no organised breeders as we know them. There being no registration of cats in Turkey, our imported animals are regarded as non-pedigree. Under the rules of GCCF no progeny of these are eligible for exhibiting until the third generation. We cannot, therefore, show any of these cats in Britain as yet, but this restriction does not apply in Europe. We hope, therefore, in due course, to have established new lines which will be beneficial to the Turkish Vans of the future.

From the litters produced in July '81, by both Benek and Cicek, two have been exported to Europe where they will be able to be shown. Three of the remainder have been selected for breeding in this country so, hopefully, at the end of this breeding season, we should have our second generation.

I have some nice kittens from Benek just now, including a really good male, and her import companion, Cicek, is expecting kittens.

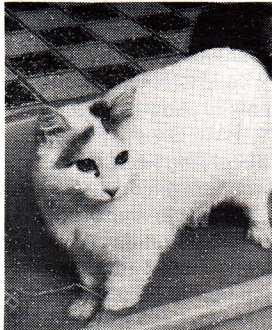

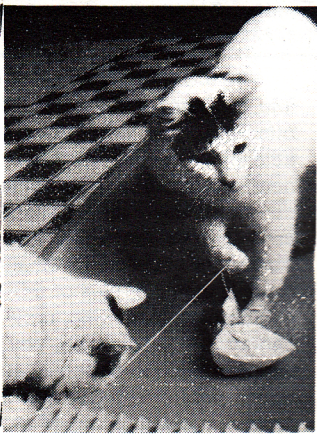

However, there is no problem in exporting the cats from England to

VANS IN FRANCE - Michelle Ledermann's Recipe for Falling in Love with a Turk —

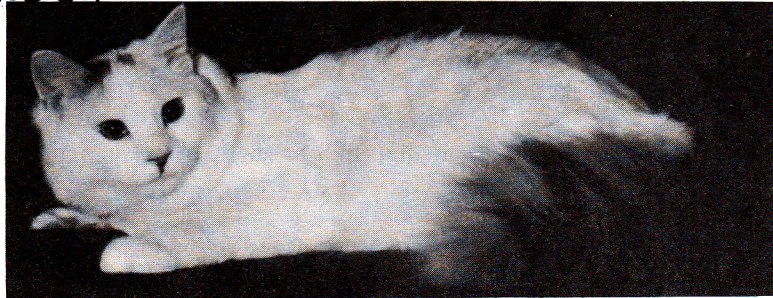

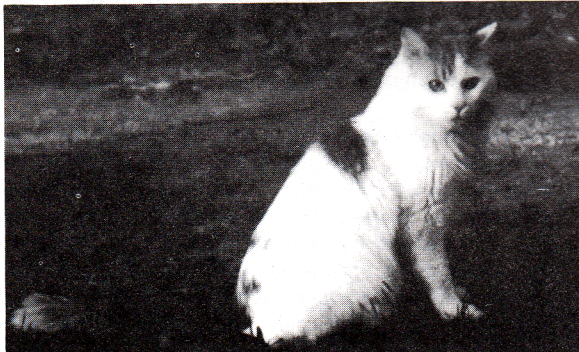

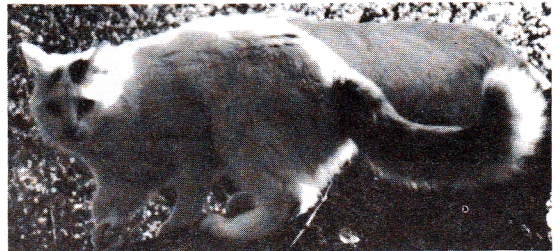

I have been tracing the origins of the Turkish Van Cats. Lake Van lies at the foot of Mt. 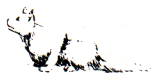

VETERINARY VIEWS



Q and A

Deborah Colker, D.V.M. Practice Limited to Cats

Q. My 4-year old shorthair cat is exhibiting hairlessness on the backs of both ears, the inside of one hind leg, and the hair has never grown back following her spaying. A SH breeder told me she used *Synthroid* for her male and it replenished his coat, which had been sparse. What are your comments?

A: The breeder here is suggesting the benefits of thyroid replacement therapy. An animal with low thyroid levels will commonly have a thin, dull coat which lacks luster, often is dry and scaly with dandruff. Whenever a cat presents to me with a poorly conditioned coat, I routinely measure thyroid levels with a simple blood test. If these levels are low, *Synthroid* (synthetic thyroid) is indicated. If, however, the cat is not low in thyroid levels, side effects of supplementation with a product such as *Synthroid* will produce hyperexcitability, restlessness and severe personality changes. Therefore, such a product should not be given for every cat with a poor or denuded (hairless) skincoat. Thyroid levels should always be

measured first before any supplementation is undertaken.

Q from OSH breeder: There seems to be a hair loss around eyes and upper nose area in 10-week old kittens, chestnut color; is not manifest in lavenders. It is not fungal. Any ideas of cause?

A: Recent hair loss, not present at birth, could suggest an infectious causation, such as bacterial, fungal or parasitic organism. Was a fungal culture taken? Was a skin scraping taken to detect the presence of any ectoparasites? If the queen did not confer adequate colostrum to her kittens, they may be susceptible to these external parasites without the ability to mount a sufficient immune response and prevent lesions. A Total Serum Protein would be indicated to detect their antibody levels and ability to fight such infections. However, in view of these possibilities, one would expect the entire litter to be involved.

The real question becomes, "Was the hair loss present at birth?" It is possible that the gene that carries the chestnut color is also responsible for the lack of hair in the areas you mentioned. Perhaps the hair loss is a congenital, inherited anomaly, present in the breed. If so, the hair loss would not progress and, if present in one year's time, your answer is in the genetics of that particular breeding.

Q from owner in New Jersey: Having previously had a cat with cystitis, I thought I was familiar with the symptoms — the straining to urinate, blood in the urine, and urinary obstructions from the crystals that kept forming.

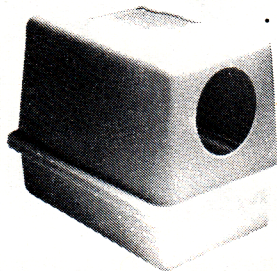
However, I now have a three year old neutered male cat that had what my vet called cystitis, but it seemed very different.

He stopped eating and drinking for two days, layed in the same spot, and had a temperature of 104°. On the third day he was seen by the vet and was put on Amoxi drops for his temperature. He urinated after the vet visit and started eating and behaving normally. Two days later the cat was still acting fine, but had a urinary obstruction. He was catheterized and the bladder emptied. The vet found no cystals. What I can't understand is the absence of straining; the cat didn't even attempt to urinate, and,

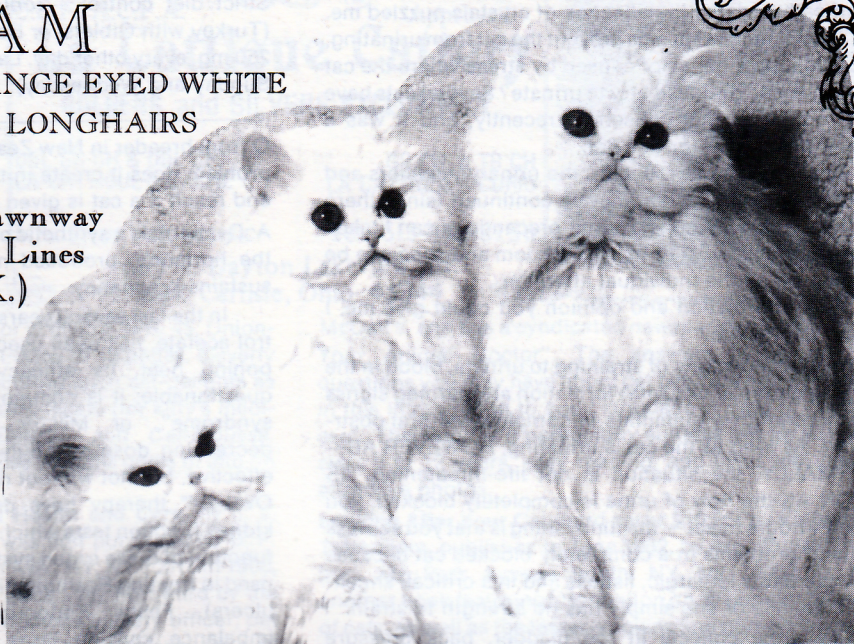

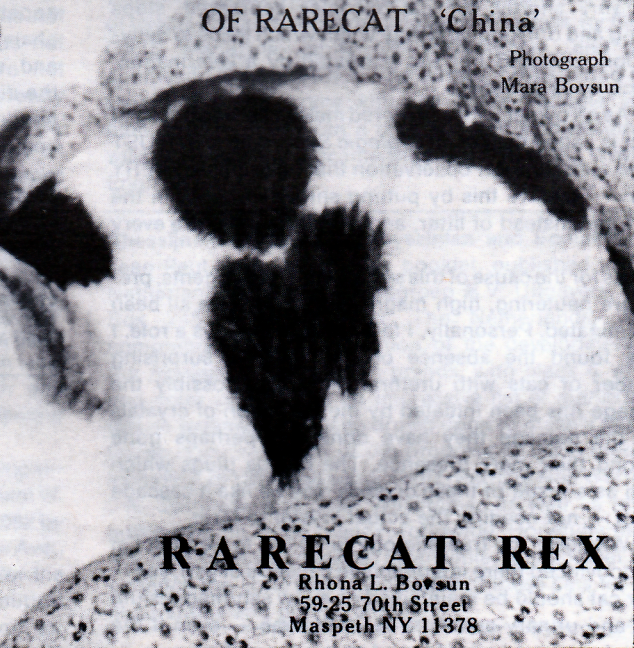

when catheterized, the absence of crystals puzzled me.

Could muscle spasms prevent the cat from urinating, or could it be a behavior caused by stress where the cat just refuses to or doesn't try to urinate? Several cats have been added to this household recently, and it was a stressful situation for this cat.

If this is the case, should the urinary acidifiers and low ash and magnesium diet be continued (since there are no crystals forming)? What precautions can I take? The cat is still isolated in my bedroom and seems to be thriving on all the individual attention.

Any information and opinion you could give me, I would appreciate.

A: Your observations of straining to urinate, blood in the urine and crystal (struvite) formation are warning signs which commonly culminate in complete urethral obstruction. As long as the cat is urinating, HOWEVER AB—NORMALLY, the situation is not life-threatening. AS SOON AS the flow of urine is completely blocked, you have 24 hours to act — the funny thing is that you see *less* signs of problems in a completely blocked cat because now the cat is lethargic, listless and in a critical, shock-like state. He or she simply has no strength to strain.

As urine collects in the bladder, back pressure causes the kidneys to stop functioning which results in metabolic disturbances (like high potassium which slows—the heart) and ion disturbances. Most importantly the kidneys stop filtering toxic wastes from the blood — and very shortly, the cat becomes depressed, stops eating and drinking, and may vomit which leads to dehydration. UNLESS this cat is treated by a veterinarian, shock leads to death.

As an owner with a neutered male cat predisposed to what is called the *Feline Urologic Syndrome*, you MUST make sure through observation that he urinates EVERY DAY — observe this by putting shredded paper in the litter pan instead of litter, and check for moisture every day.

As for the cause of this syndrome — viral agents, premature neutering, high magnesium diets have all been incriminated. Personally, I feel stress also plays a role. I have found the absence of crystals in a surprising number of cats with urethral blockage. Possibly the damage has been initiated by the formation of crystals but the damage they have done has perhaps gone beyond their mere presence. The mucus plugs which form as a result of these crystals may be like a cascade effect — not needing the actual crystal to form.

Whatever the true etiology turns out to be (and I'm not convinced there is a definitive cause as of yet), **yes** — your cat should be maintained on a low ash/magnesium diet and urinary acidifiers **for a lifetime** — even if the crystals are not being formed at the present time.

My protocol for such cats includes the following:

Strict diet control — *only* CD, IAMS, Friskies Buffet (Turkey with Giblets, or Beef & Liver *only*). Vitamin C — 250 mg. every other day. Lasix — 10 mg 2X per week (say Sunday and Wednesday).

Q from breeder in New Zealand: What is *Ovaban*. . . what problem does it create in the cat taking it. . . what is the end result if a cat is given it?

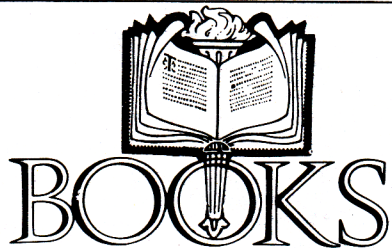
A: *Ovaban*™ is a synthetic progesterone. Progesterone is the hormone, produced naturally in the body, which sustains pregnancy.

In the last several years, *Ovaban*™, a brand of megestrol acetate, has been used as a contraceptive for postponing heat. Its efficacy here has been clinically questionable; it is commonly used in the "scabby cat syndrome", or Miliary Eczema Complex. On a decreasing dose schedule, I have found it to be very effective, but not without risk. Those cats on prolonged *Ovaban*™ therapy have developed elevated liver and kidney function tests which can indicate impending dysfunction of these organ systems. *Ovaban*™ has also been used in treating Eosinophilic Plaques and Ulcers (rodent ulcers), Feline Endocrine Alopecia (a hormonal imbalance causing large areas of thin or denuded haircoat) and in the prevention of tom cat spraying. Recently *Ovaban*™ has fallen into disfavor because of the various side effects, some of which can be life-threatening. These side effects include *polyphagia* (increased appetite) and subsequent weight gain, personality changes, *Pyometra* (pus in the uterus), mammary tumors and, most importantly, *Diabetes Mellitus*. In some cats the diabetes mellitus can be permanent and insulin dependent. It is for this last reason that I have almost completely discontinued using this product.

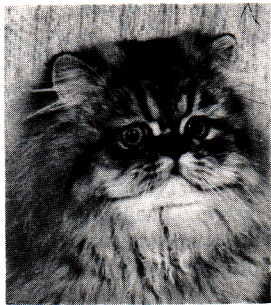

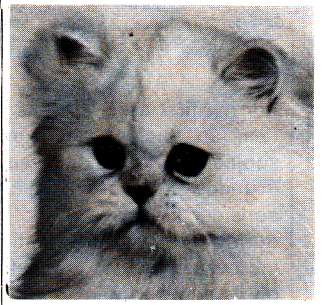

S.R. 45, Unionville, IN 47468), is a 3x5 mini-book of 18 pages, cleverly illustrated by Eric White, featuring such cat-delights as *Out-of-Cat-Food Dinner*, *Garlic-Gusto* (for kitty's medications), *Spoiled-Morris DinDin*, and *Cat-Mousse*. Sprinkled in among the recipes are little gems of info on care and behavior.

The Complete Book of Cat Health and Care, by J. J. McCoy, (paperback \$5.95), was first published by G. P. Putnam's Sons, 200 Madison Ave., NY, NY 10016 in 1968, and has been printed with a June 1982 Foreward by the author, an animal scientist, humane society officer, pet consultant and cat lover. The general contents are well organized into easily read and well indexed chapters, covering basic information on a wide spectrum of health and care of the cat; the author warns that this book is not meant to be a substitute for the professional knowledge and services of a veterinarian. Since the book has not been up-dated, information on feline diseases is not current. The photos of the various breeds are not representative of the standards as they are currently recognized in the Fancy; a novice breeder would surely be misled in selecting their stock if they were to rely on the photos in this book. The author devotes many pages to the care and training (?) of wild or exotic cats as pets, specifically the Margay and Ocelot. We definitely do not approve of keeping wild cats as house pets. The Margay and Ocelot are regarded as "peripheral" mammals by wildlife authorities, just one step away from being considered as rare or endangered animals, and only to be kept by experts in their care and management

The book's Appendix is lacking in depth and accuracy — i.e. CFA, Inc. currently has over 500 member clubs, not "more than 50".

What Is Your Cat Saying? (hard cover \$9.95), a companion volume to **What Is Your Dog Saying?**, by Michael W. Fox and Wende Devlin Gates, published in June 1982 by Coward, McCann & Geoghegan, Inc., 200 Madison Ave., NY, NY 10016. Dr. Fox, Director of the Institute for the Study of Animal Problems, in Washington, D.C., is author of several books on pets, writes a Pet Care column for **CAT WORLD™ INTERNATIONAL MAGAZINE**, July/August 1982.

McCall's, and has a syndicated newspaper column, "Ask Your Animal Doctor". The answers to dozens of questions you may have about cat behavior can be found in this introduction to body language of cats, or "Felineese". This book is a particularly suitable gift for youngsters 8 to 12 years, easy reading, and filled with many attractive photos.

Looking After Your Cat (hard cover \$10.95) by Katherine Tottenham, published in June 1982, by Arco Publishing, Inc., 215 Park Avenue South, NY, NY 10003, is yet another book featuring information on all popular breeds of cats, as well as the lesser-knowns and non-pedigreed. Tips on selecting and raising a kitten and other general information on health and care of the cat are covered adequately. Her chapter on cat shows is based on the British system. Her listing of cat registry associations is somewhat sketchy, confusing and inaccurate. Her listing of useful contacts contains outdated addresses for CFA, CATS Magazine, omits CWI and others, and has confused CFA and ACFA. The author, now sharing her Devon, England, home with one Tortie "moggie" and nine dogs, formerly ran a farm and had a collection of wild animals which became Bideford Zoo in the West of England.

Abessijnen en Somalis (Abyssinian and Somalis), by Jean-Paul Maas, hardbound booklet, published in The Netherlands, copyright Zuidgroep B.V. Uitgevers, P O Box 245, 5680 AE Best, The Netherlands, is a comprehensive documentation of the development of the Abyssinian and Somali breeds, with black & white and color photos and an impressive list of authorities whose writings have been drawn upon to make a painstaking documentation of the progress of these breeds, including Dr. Rosemonde S. Peltz, Patricia Nell Warren, J.N. Stephens and Joan Wastlhuber as well as other authorities on these breeds worldwide. Hopefully there will be a translation made; meanwhile, this booklet will enhance the library of any devotee of these cats for the illustrations and photos alone.

For my first article in this series (Jan/Feb.'77) the flea, an ancient and formidable pest, was the subject. California received more rain this year than in many previous years, causing one at times to consider building an ark. After so much moisture during the warmer weather, there could be an increase in the flea population. I feel another article on fleas is pertinent.

The type of flea that we are concerned with uses certain warm-blooded animals as hosts from which they obtain their food - viz. blood. In speaking of a "Dog flea" we refer to the fact that this particular flea prefers to feed on dogs. But if a dog isn't available when the flea is hungry, it utilizes other host animals in an order of preference. The list often includes cats, rabbits, guinea pigs and Man.

The flea only remains on the host to obtain food. He does this by cutting small holes in the skin with saw-like mouth parts and ingesting the blood as it flows from the wound. At the same time, he will defecate on the animal. Since his waste products contain the dried blood materials, they appear as brownish flakes in the coat. When mixed with water, these droppings dissolve into a red-brown solution.

Fleas actually spend more time off their hosts. They seek the lowest surface available which may include dirt, rugs, or the cracks between flooring. Here they lay their eggs and eventually the young hatch, appearing as small, worm-like organisms as larvae. They eventually change into adults after going through the egg, larval and pupal stages characteristic of some insects. If the preferred host is available to the flea population, a human never knows of their existence except by examination of the host animals. But if all the warm-blooded animals are removed from the flea infested area, the situation changes. As the fleas' hunger increases their preference for hosts decreases; sometimes they even lower their gourmet tastes so far as to consider humans as suitable fare. This is often what happens when animals with fleas are permitted to live in the house. The fleas breed in the rugs or on the floor. They will live for years without a meal. As soon as a warm-blooded animal walks through this hungry group, it will be attacked.

Fleas are secondary hosts to roundworms whose adult forms are parasites in dogs and cats.

When a dog or a cat is bitten it will often respond by biting the area and ingesting the flea which releases the roundworm larvae into the host's digestive system where they develop into the adult forms. They feed on the intestinal wall and eventually lay eggs that are passed out in the animal's feces. The fleas ingest the eggs in the dirt and the cycle continues.

There are several methods for controlling fleas. Generally, fleas cannot jump over 1-foot high. If you place your cages on legs at least that high the fleas will often jump to the floor and not be able to return to the animals. Even better, if you place an insecticide on the floor, the fleas will die when they contact it. For large runs, you can make a grid of laths. I have used 1" x 2" pine strips, nailed on 2" x 4" runners 1" apart. This is the floor the animals live on. I place insecticide on the floor surface beneath so any fleas will die when they fall through the lath floor and contact it. It also acts as a self-cleaning floor as hair and other material falls between the cracks. The floor underneath can be cleaned periodically by vacuuming or washing and new insecticide applied. The effectiveness of any insecticide varies with the resistance built up in any flea population. *Sevin* (dimethyl carbonate) is considered to be one of the safest to use, especially with kittens.

During the past year I have been using a systemic insecticide product. It is used on cattle to control grubs which are the larvae of a fly that has a life cycle phase in the cattles' bodies. It is being used in some areas to control fleas in dogs and, by some people, in cats. One application generally lasts for up to three months. I re-apply it only after the fleas begin to reappear. It should not be used on pregnant or lactating animals, or those under 6 months of age. But it can be applied to other animals running with them and when the fleas feed on the treated animals they die. The product is called *Spoton* (produced by Cutter Laboratories) and it is a type of fenthion. It is used by some veterinarians so they should be able to provide information on dosage and frequency of application.

Next time, I will discuss other methods of flea control - please do send me your questions!

Members of Mo-Kan Cat Club of Kansas City presented a donation last month of \$1,000 to the Kansas State University's School of Veterinary Medicine in Manhattan, KS.

This donation will fund the development of the first colony of cats ever established at K-State. Under the direction of Dr. Gabbert, several projects will determine some of the normal physiological processes of healthy cats in order to establish a basis on which to evaluate treatment of cats suffering from various disorders.

Dr. Mosier, Chairman of the School of Veterinary Medicine, pointed out that by establishing this first cat Colony at K-State, Mo-Kan Cat Club is breaking new ground. "This cat colony will pay the widest dividends of anything you could possibly support," he observed.

Receiving the club's gift, the director of K-State's Veterinary Hospital, Dr. Coffman, led members of the group on a tour of the school's modern and sophisticated facilities.

Mo-Kan Cat Club, a non-profit organization founded in 1949, raises funds for the welfare of cats by presenting championship allbreed cat shows in the Kansas City area as well as household pet shows. The group has a membership of both purebred cat breeders and household pet owners and is affiliated with the Cat Fanciers Association — a national registry of purebred cats.

Mo-Kan Cat Club has also donated to such local organizations as the Mayor's Christmas Tree, Friends of the Zoo, People for Animal Welfare, Animal Haven, and is currently supporting a caracal in the K.C. Zoo's "Adopt-a-Wild-Child" program.

National organizations such as Morris Animal Foundation, which funds research into several animal health problems; the Winn Foundation, which also funds feline health research; the Cornell University Veterinary School; and S.O.C.K., which contributes to research into feline infectious peritonitis, have also received funds

"Response of Feline Leukemia Virus-Induced Non-regenerative Anemia to Oral Administration of an INTERFERON-containing Preparation" —

M.B. Tompkins, D.V.M., J.M. Cummins, D.V.M., Ph.D.

FELINE PRACTICE, May-June 1982 published the above entitled report on a preparation containing bovine beta-type interferon applied as treatment in 4 cases of FeLV-associated nonregenerative anemia. Preparation of the interferon and the treatment protocol are described. The anemia responded favorably to treatment in all 4 cases. Hematologic findings before, during and after treatment are presented in table form. The possible actions of the interferon-containing preparations on the virus-induced anemia are discussed.

Mary B. Tompkins, DVM and Wayne Tompkins, Ph.D. are conducting a study at the U. of IL, Urbana, sponsored by **The Morris Animal Foundation**, into the possibility of interferon for treatment of feline leukemia and related diseases. 'Interferon may work against leukemia by hampering the reproduction of the virus', Dr. Tompkins says.

Sam L. Scheer, the Secretary, *Quarterly* Editor and very backbone of **The Siamese Cat Society of America, Inc.** gifted The Morris Animal Foundation with his superb cat library. His letter to us: "How nice to get your friendly July 12 letter and a copy of your truly outstanding publication. JUDGING THE SPECTATORS

As my readers (yes, both of them) were tacky enough to point out, I have neglected a rather important segment of the show population — the spectators. Your basic 'gate' ranges from nil to upward of 4,000-per-day warm-bodied, slow-moving, garlic-breathing, and — most importantly — admission-paying persons of all ages and at least two sexes. The public is regarded by show committees as being anywhere from a confounded nuisance to be actively discouraged to — and this last with a gleam of unmitigated greed in their collective eyes — a natural resource to be tapped and exploited. The attitudes of exhibitors closely parallel those of the committees, more or less dependent on whether or not enough space has been provided to keep these respective segments from each other's throats, and whether or not the exhibitors either have kittens they want to place as pets, or are trying to transport several cats to six or eight rings.

From the amorphous masses, common behavioral characteristics can be identified by all of us, allowing us to pigeonhole large categories of the show-going public before they are likely to crystallize into individuals with names and faces.

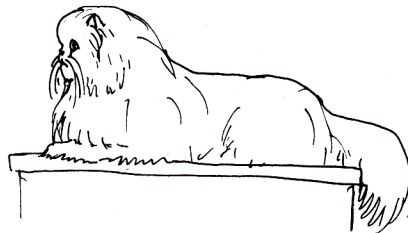
The consensus Low-Person-on-the-Totem-Pole is the one who goes from cage to cage ignoring the diplomatic and carefully worded DO NOT TOUCH signs. He (or she) either assumes that the admission price buys him the right to do exactly as he pleases, or he finds the shining eyes, soft fur and compliant personalities of our show cats irresistible. This person plays much the same role that rats did during the bubonic plagues of Europe. Any germ or virus gets a free ride as its human vector thoughtlessly flits from one damp little nose to another. Curbing your natural urge to commit mayhem, all you can do is explain that the cat really isn't starved for affection, that it is bred to be attractive and appealing and, yes, it only takes once to make a cat sick. You feel justified in becoming wroth with a supposedly literate adult of this type, but there is no way you can reprimand a small child without looking like the Wicked Witch of the West.

It is fascinating to encounter the unwilling fellow who has been dragged to the show by his wife or girlfriend and, once there plays the Expert Commentator to impress her. At a recent show I saw a cage housing a Russian Blue and an Abyssinian where the Aby had been removed to a ring for judging. One the front of the cage was an attractive little sign that read "Aby", so Our Hero assumed a superior manner and explained to his wide-eyed Lady,

"The bars are not there
to keep the cats IN — they're there
to keep you OUT!"



"Of course, this is a Blue Abyssinian." At this point, a Siamese exhibitor witnessing the scene choked audibly and bit right through her martini glass. (It can work both ways. There is also the Rex breeder who has managed to confuse hordes of credulous youngsters by explaining that his cats look that way because he winds their fur in tiny little rollers each night.)

Recognition should also be given to the flotillas of pre-teens who swarm through the hall "collecting" business cards from the exhibitors. They compete with each other to see who can amass the largest and most varied assortment, trading them off like baseball cards. The winner gets the privilege of dumping them all into the nearest trash basket. Now you know why you have no cards left for your kitten prospects by Sunday afternoon.

Ah yes — the kitten prospects. Everyone wants a kitten from a cat they see winning heavily, cage draped in ribbons — until you actually have kittens and begin to quote prices. And everyone must have encountered the prospective buyer who gets as far as prices and terms, and then loftily informs you that he plans to buy from a local who will let him have a kitten with papers for half your price. This dark little farce doesn't end here; it culminates at the same show a year later when your former prospect shows up, hat in hand and very humble, telling sad tales of a poorly kept cattery and wormy kittens. You can either attempt a total reeducation or write the man off as an unredeemable fool because he bought one of the kittens anyhow.

The paying public is fascinated by the rings and the judging procedures. But it is unsettling to have a dear little old gentleman, somewhat hard of hearing, demand that you tell him what exactly is taking place up there and what all those ribbons mean about the time your lovely little Jekyll-and-Hyde is on the table frantically scanning the crowd for "his mommie". Or the proud owner of a pet who surveys the line of show specimens of the same breed and stridently remarks: "Mitzy has much better points than any of those!". Or the lady in rhinestone-trimmed glasses with a voice that could saw wood asking: "Which cat is yours?" when you would prefer it to remain anonymous. You may counter with "Ma'am, it is considered unseemly to discuss the exhibits until the class judging has been completed," and

hope that the judge and your fellow exhibitors credit you with virtue and a sense of fair play rather than an advanced case of lily liver.



By Sunday afternoon, the show hall seems to be filled with a homogeneous mass of humanity approximately the consistency of jello-filled balloons, relieved by occasional knees and elbows, and your cat, called up for its fourth, or sixth, or eighth ring, is becoming somewhat impatient about accommodating your mad little eccentricities. The whole experience can only be compared to wading chest-deep in breaking surf while balancing a prickly pear cactus on your head. All that is necessary to unnerve you completely is to have some unseen hand reach out of the crowd and gently pinch you. This will either trigger your sense of the absurd, and those around you will be startled to see you suddenly dissolve into helpless laughter, or, if you are the less laid-back type, the show committee will be prying you (and your cat) off the ceiling as they break down the cages that night.

There are certain spectators that are present because of the very nature of the shows. They are the frankly interested and generally curious. If it were not for these people there would be no gate at all. "What kind of a cat is that?" is a legitimate question, even if you do hear it a thousand times. "What are they like?", and, "Where do they come from?" are the second and third most popular. If you can work up a two- or three-minute spiel on your breed, you can use it to lay the groundwork for a future kitten sale. If you look upon this as an opportunity to make a convert for your breed, you can render the interruption less annoying. Spectators do remember with gratitude those exhibitors who were gracious — I have been asked for the names of people "who were benched in this spot last year" because the spectators are now ready to talk seriously about getting a cat or kitten and would like to deal with the persons who went out of their way to help. The question that is fourth in frequency is most difficult to answer: "How did you get into all this?" I would much rather deal with hundreds of such questions, put sincerely by people who are concerned with what we are doing, than to see the few blank faces that coolly regard cats and exhibitors alike with the same detached look of total boredom.

In addition to the undifferentiated multitudes, there have been various individuals who impressed themselves on us, for good or ill. Among them was the man in a wheelchair who, with remarkable aplomb and an engaging sense of humor, asked which of the cat breeds could be taught to retrieve best, since he had trouble with dropped objects rolling into inaccessible locations.

Remembered with an entirely different emotion is the small girl who, while playing with her bubblegum, managed to drop it into the cage of an immaculately groomed Persian. She assumed that if she didn't say anything no one would notice. The owner did when she took the cat out of the cage to prepare it for the next ring. There are several ways of removing pink bubblegum from cat hair — eventually, anyhow — few of which are in ready supply at a cat show. If the owner had been able to get her hands on aforementioned girlchild, the kid would have been removing impacted bubblegum for a week.

We were rather favorably impressed at one show by a local television personality who had given the show mention on his newscast, and then decided to pay it a visit himself. He arrived in a highly inebriate condition, wandering through the judging rings poking at the cats, and becoming loudly abusive when asked to desist. He was forcibly escorted from the hall, vowing revenge by all the gods of broadcasting. The show is still in existence, and doing fine, long after the newscaster has been laterally percussed to a weather channel in Podunk, Wyoming.

One cat exhibitor was approached by a gentleman of rosy neck and azure collar, who evinced an interest in the cat she was showing. He inquired the price of such cats, and she quoted him two-fifty for a pet of that line and that breed. In evident indignation he informed her: "Hell, lady, I ain't payin' no two dollars and fifty cents for no cat!" Even the most unquenchable pollyanna would find the basic disparity in point of view here difficult to deal with.

Some of the least likely spectators appeared at a Detroit cat show. Upon hearing a voice say: "Man, that cat has whiskers like Fu Manchu!" our Fearless Exhibitor spun around to defend her cat's appearance and found herself face-to-face with a representative contingent from the local motorcycle gang, who had decided to take a break from their customary mildly terroristic activities to attend a cultural event.

My Unforgettable Spectator turned up at a show hall that was located up an embankment and a short hill from the railway tracks. A character with long hair, moustache and beard, faded, dirty, torn clothing and a duffel bag walked into the hall, looking as if he couldn't have afforded a razor blade, much less the price of admission. He wandered from cage to cage, commenting on the cats and carrying on a lengthy and knowledgeable conversation with an exhibitor on the bloodlines behind a certain cat. CFA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING — JUNE 16—17, 1982, CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

June 16, 1982 The CFA Board convened at 1:00 PM with the John Royal hearing on recertification scheduled for 2:00 PM. This was a closed hearing with John found guilty of several of the levied charges. John is suspended from the Judging Program for one year, at the end of which time he can re-apply directly to the Board if he wishes to re-enter the Program.

Ken Griffin's resignation from the CFA Judging Program was accepted with regret.

Helen McFadden, Theodore Napski and Nancy Nash were dropped from the Program. Earl Sandefur was not relicensed last February but due to a change of address no contact has been made. A new address will be used and a report will be brought to the Board at the October meeting.

June 17, 1982: CLUB APPLICATIONS: The meeting convened with 528 clubs in good standing in CFA. All twelve applications were accepted and CFA has 540 clubs at this time (6/17/82). The resignation of *Felines Canada* was accepted with regret.

DISCIPLINE HEARINGS: Steve Witmer (Clerking Program infractions) and Mrs. S. Schmitz (Falsification of age of kitten). The files of each were reviewed by Everett Anschutz. Neither party was present. Both were found guilty of levied charges. Steve was suspended from the Clerking Program for one year and Ms. Schmitz's kitten lost its points and awards.

JUDGING PROGRAM: No new Applicants accepted. **Trainees** advanced to the **Apprentice level:** **Nancy Dodds, LH; Werner Kachel, SH; Allan Kienzle, SH; Evelyn Prather, SH.** Rae Simpson was dropped from the Program.

Advanced to Approval Pending: **Russell Haussman, Jr., SH; William Lee, AB; Larry Swanson, LH; Wayne Trevathan, SH.**

Advanced to Approved: **Leta Williams, LH.**

Wayne Inlay was granted a one year leave of absence due to health problems.

SHOW RULES: Alternate Show status was granted in February to the Expanded or Multiple Ring Format show. Any club can plan a 4, 6 or 8 ring show. However, clubs were understanding this to mean that cats could be judged 4, 6 and/or 8 times in one day. *Not so!* The authors of the Multiple Ring format meant that cats could be judged *three or four* times per day in a 6- or 8-ring format show. Any show *already* licensed with cats to be judged six (6) times in one day may use this format, but the Board passed the motion that **NO MORE** shows will be licensed with cats being judged more than four(4) times in one day. (Exceptions being Best of the Bests format and a Trainee's required handling.)

CENTRAL OFFICE: CFA Central Office is in the process of purchasing our own computer system. Since February 1979 CFA has leased computer time from Brooksmith Assoc., a nearby company. An increase in user fees (rent) plus the need for greater utilization of the system by our personnel has revealed the need for our own system. Brooksmith Assoc. has offered CFA a refurbished Hewlett-Packard Corp. system also to be serviced by H-P. CFA will be able to add more terminals and double our disk storage capacities — forecasting better, more efficient service to the breeder/exhibitor.

WINN FOUNDATION SYMPOSIUM was held Thursday evening, June 17, with 136 people in attendance. Dr. Edward A. Hoover (formerly of Ohio State University) spoke on "Feline Virus Infections". Dr. Shirley D. Johnston, from the University of Minnesota, spoke on "Lessons

In Feline Reproductive Biology" — a most interesting and informative talk. She predicts artificial insemination for the purebred cat is in the very near future. A synopsis of these speeches will be available at a later date and will be printed in our *GLR* October Newsletter.

All Proposed Amendments to the CFA Constitution **FAILED** except the Board recommended #2, which was presented to clarify the meaning of the third paragraph, Article XIII.

RESOLUTIONS: All resolutions **FAILED** with the exception of.....

10. Add to Show Rule 158a: "...or in a L-shape." **ADD:** *No cage may be placed so that a cat in one ring can see out the back of its cage into another cage in the ring behind it. Backs of cages must be covered if cages are arranged in this manner.* Passed by a 2/3rds majority.

15 — *That CFA approve the use of permanent ribbons for all flat ribbons up to and including Best of Breed or Division, with the provision that fabric ribbons be available at each ring using permanent ribbons for those exhibitors desiring those ribbons.* Carried favorably.

18 — *Whereas all exhibitors should be assessed an equal amount for the entry of their exhibits, and Whereas at present this is not the standard practice, it is proposed that all entry fees be paid in the "coin of the realm."* Carried favorably.

40 — Article XVIII - 176 — Change paragraph to read: *The show Entry Clerk must acknowledge receipt of all entries within 15 days of their receipt.* Passed by 2/3rds majority.

A number of Resolutions were presented from the floor — some were favorably accepted by the Delegates. *All resolutions will be referred for the Board's consideration at the October Board Meeting.*

The 1981-82 season boasted 238 CFA shows—down 3 shows from the previous season, however, this year 2 day shows outnumbered one day shows 128/110. Total paid entry reached 57,953 down only .02% from the 1981-82 season. Total entries present and competing stood at 44,096 down a mere .007% or 321 entries less than 1980-81. There were 27,789 Championship cats present, 12,073 Kittens present and 4,234 Cats in Premiership present. With the vast number of multiple ring shows available to the exhibitor this past season, and clubs worried that entries would drop because of the higher entries, the exhibitors proved otherwise. The average show had 186 registered entries present, of which 117 were championship cats, 51 kittens and 18 cats in Premiership. According to CFA's Executive Manager, Mr. Thomas Dent, attendance at shows by breed very closely follows the registration figures. Total registrations with CFA reached 41,000 with 17,700 Persians, 10,500 Himalayans, 3,300 Siamese, 1,900 Abyssinians and 1,350 Burmese.

NEW CFA GRANDS

681 Cats won the prestigious title of Grand CHampion during the 1981-82 show season, a new record topping 1978's high of 610. All shows this year were held using the Top Ten Format allowing for many more cats to receive grand points if deserving enough to be awarded a Top Ten win. In addition to the 681 new Grand Champions, there were 130 cats who earned the title of Grand Premier this past season.

Twenty Seven breeds are represented on the 1981-82 list of CFA Grands, Persians again placing first and Himalayans moving into second place. All breeds recognized for Championship competition acquired at least one new Grand this season, including the newly recognized Solid Himalayan.

LEADING BREEDERS OF CFA GRANDS

The sought after honor of being the breeder to gain the most CFA Grands in one season resulted in a clear winner this season. The record of 9 new Grand Champions held by Betty Crotzer of Sin-Chiang cattery has been broken. Greg and Judy Brocato of South Paw Cattery in Rome, Georgia, now hold the record with 10 new Grand Champions and a Grand Premier.

Vive la difference! was my impressions of New Zealand show cats versus their American counterparts!! For those "foreign" CWI readers, New Zealand is situated 1200 miles south-east of Australia (No — it's not next to England). The two main Islands, North and South, are about 500 odd miles long with the North Island having lush green rolling hills and dense native bush, while the South Island has rugged, spectacular snow covered alps. Weather is reasonably mild — not too hot or cold, with considerable rainfall. Population is around 3 million.

My husband, Michael, and I recently spent 6 weeks visiting my native country "Down Under" and while he ogled a few million of the 80 million sheep, and the beauty and greenness of the countryside, I visited the cats and their catteries. The former (in the longhair breeds) were so huge they appeared more suited to a tropical jungle. . . and therein lies the latter — Catteries were adapted as such with trees, grass, vines and flowers; such gorgeous settings. I couldn't believe the size of the Persians — easy twice as large as in the U.S. I daren't think how long they took to bathe and dry!!! They had massive heads to go with those massive bodies. . . tho not as extreme type as here in the US. I did see a few cases of over/under bites, and it saddened me to hear a longtime respected NZ judge say that that particular fault is now no longer heavily penalized. Longhair Colourpoints (Himalayans) had extremely good type. They do hybridize with Persians and can show the solid colour hybrids in the Persian class, unlike most associations here.

At one show I saw my first Longhair Scottish Fold. I also saw only one British Blue at this show, *Redwyton Joffregal Reo (Imp.Aust.)* and what a gorgeous chubby cheeked fella!!! There were no representatives of Korats, Maine Coons, Turkish Angoras, Bombays, Exotic Shorthairs, Egyptian Maus, Japanese Bobtails, Russian Blues, Somalis or Tonkinese. . . but this was a small show (300, not including HHP) and the variety in colour of the breeds there kept me more than occupied and asking a million questions.

I attended 2 cat shows. At the one held by the Takapuna Cat Club in Auckland I was privileged to be able to hand out several CWI Awards and congratulate

the winners of New Zealand's Supreme Cats. The owners were delighted with the beautiful rosettes. It seems they treasure our rosettes as much as we delight in their sashes.

The number of cats which die annually from adverse drug reactions is likely to be many thousands more than can be assumed from this summary. However, observations during field use of any given drug are an important entity in evaluating the safety and effectiveness of drugs. Please encourage your veterinarian to report all drug reactions to the FDA and, should you diagnose and administer drugs to your own cats, please take the time to drop the FDA a line, should problems occur. The FDA also has a "Adverse Reaction Hot Line": (301) 443-1209. This is a recorded message and your call will then be returned at a later time by a veterinarian on the staff of the FDA. Do not report problems with vaccines, etc. These are handled by the Department of Agriculture.

The FDA also welcomes observations on particularly good results obtained through field use of any drug.

Appended is a brief glossary of words from the summary. I hope that these will aid you in reading the words used in the summary. A more precise description of each condition will be found in your medical dictionary. It is hoped that you will keep the summary in an easily accessible place near your drug cabinet for ready reference.

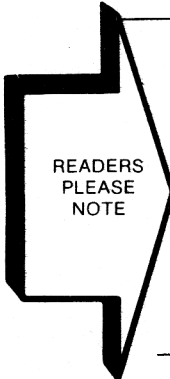
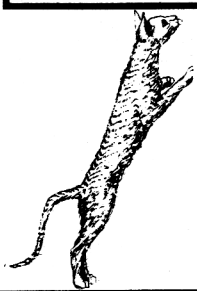

The Silver Abyssinian in New Zealand

On Mrs. Julia Fowler's farm, in Dunsandel, New Zealand, back in 1976, her Chinchilla queen and her daughter's young Aby male had an unplanned mating that resulted in three kits — two females and one male. They were beautiful kits, decidedly Aby-ish, with ticked coats but chinchilla eyes and stocky type.

When Mrs. Fowler went to register the kittens on the Provisional Register, the Registrar, a member of the New Zealand Genetics Advisory Council, suggested that since they were such a good start for the Silver Aby, perhaps these kittens could be the beginning of an experimental breeding programme. So the boy was neutered, and Mrs. Fowler and I, with a female each, started our programme with advice from the G.A.C. My female was in time mated to my Sorrel (Red) stud, *CH Aztec Ratau (Imp.Aust.)*, and had three kits. One male had the appearance of a sorrel Aby, absolutely a sorrel Aby except that he had LONG hair. The other male had Aby type and white, short hair with pinky-red ticking on top. *Charma*, the female, was a delightful little lady featuring a white undercoat of short silky fur with silver ticked fur on top, the ticking tipped with black. Her head was still chinchilla-ish, but recognizably that of an Aby, too.

As a safety precaution, we mated our G-1 (1st generation) girl again, this time to my other Australian stud, *Gr Ch Optima Ishaq*, a ruddy Aby. This time she had 6 babies: 5 boys and 1 girl. There were two ruddy boys, a red-silver boy, two silver boys and the most beautiful Aby-type silver girl. As with the first litter, the boys were neutered, while the silver girl, *Sheena*, became our second G-2 stock. *Sheena* was all Aby in type, having a lovely silver colour, ticked with black on her head and back.

Our next problem was to concentrate on getting better type and, although I would have preferred to use a stud not carrying red, the only one in N.Z. belonged to someone anti the new colours, so I used only my own studs. *Charma* mated to *Ishaq* produced, after a long and difficult labour, one silver boy who was neutered and given away as a pet. *Sheena*, mated back to her father, produced one perfect silver girl. We were most excited: we were on our way! But nothing is predictable and we had an appalling stroke of misfortune. A fine healthy litter of ruddy kittens and our G-3 Silver girl suffered disastrous side effects from the respiratory vaccines: they died,

depriving us of a whole generation. *Sheena* was also vaccinated and suffered complications, thus delaying further matings.

Fate had not yet finished with us! In 1980 *Sheena* was again mated, and at eight weeks pregnant was a picture of health. Then someone in our neighbourhood sprayed their garden and the spray drifted on to *Sheena* and two young, newly imported studs, who were in the cattery. *Sheena* lost her babies the next day and, in spite of everything my vet could do, haemorrhaged to death. This tragedy was compounded by the deaths of the two studs the following day. Post mortems showed all the things that it *wasn't* but, apart from showing that they had been sprayed with something with a warfarin-like effect that had caused all three deaths, no exact poison could be named.

Mrs. Fowler had a lovely G-2 boy, so we mated our ruddy Aby girl, *Jecalyn*, to him. She had one Silver male kit. His type is superior to that of most ruddy Abys on our show bench today. His colour is pure silver, with a silvery-white undercoat, and he is ticked with black. To us, who love the Aby dearly, he is an Aby of exceptional beauty. He has the loving Aby nature, is a ball of energy, and walks proud.

Like all those who try to breed something new, we have had some hostile, vocal, and totally misinformed critics. Yet all we have done has been done openly — perhaps our mistake is to have been so honest — and we have recorded our results, none of which is claimed to be a "spontaneous mutation" either! We have also desexed every kitten not used in the breeding programme. The purists who claim that we will spoil the breed by the addition of the silver gene conveniently forget that the Aby has had many additions in its history, and that maybe it is the delightful creature that it is *because* of them! 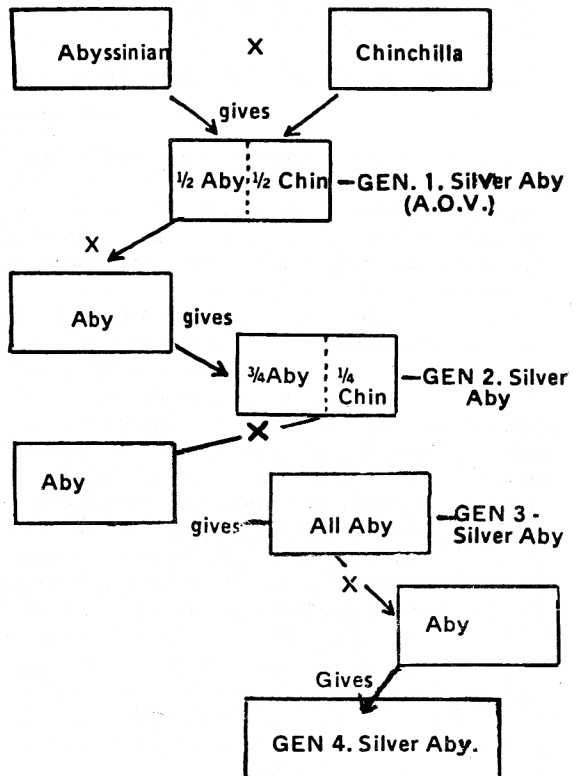

published circa 1905, the Aby is described as follows:
"This is a short-haired variety of cat, occasionally seen at
the larger shows. In colour it is hare-brown with
brownish black tickings. There should be a sharply
defined black trace running the length of the spine,
ending in the tail. The eyes are hazel. Abyssinians are a
good deal used for cross breeding. They should be of a
smart and compact conformation of body. In size they
are about the same as the ordinary English cat." *"...a
good deal used for cross breeding"* — in 1905!

In his article on the Blue Aby, George Kennedy, the
Australian Aby historian, stated that there were undoubt-
edly other breeds "behind every darned one of them"
(meaning the blue Abys). To the lover of the Blue Aby this
is now quite acceptable, but does it make any difference
WHEN the donor gene was introduced? It is only the
difference of time — twenty generations ago as in the
Blue Aby, or two or three generations ago as in the Silver
— well, only time will tell. Perhaps in twenty generations
of the Silver Aby the purists will accept them as being
pure Aby (whatever that is). Note that in New Zealand
Silvers, the Silver gene is introduced only once. Moreover,
silver is DOMINANT, so if the kitten is NOT
silver it does not "carry" silver. Silver to ruddy matings
are made until, at the 4th generation, the Aby kit is as
"pure Aby" as one of twenty generations.

There seem to be quite a few strange ideas amongst
Aby folk as to how the silver colour is introduced into the
Abyssinian Breed. A simple diagram shows how. . . .



Once reaching Gen.4, matings of SILVER to SILVER
may be undertaken without loss of type, colour, etc. As
silver is a dominant gene, only cats that actually ARE
silver CARRY the silver gene. This should banish the fear
that a silver carrier be used in an all ruddy programme,
thus disrupting a breeding line, as a dominant gene can-
not be carried.

In New Zealand, the silver donor is used only once (a
chinchilla to introduce the silver, and yet retain the
ticking), and all succeeding generations bred back to the
Aby. At 4th generation the breed is as "pure" as it can
ever be. Hundreds of generations are no guarantee of
"purity"; hidden recessives (not dominant genes) can be
carried forever.

From this soundly constructed breeding programme
we have endeavoured to reproduce the very attractive
Silver Aby, first seen nearly 100 years ago on British
show benches.

In England, (Mrs. Carmen Bachelier), as in Australia
(Mrs Paolina Silverside, Mr. Ron Cole), breeders are also
attempting to breed a Silver Aby, having used the Silver

Tabby Shorthair to introduce the silver gene. In the Netherlands, the Chinchilla has also been used and the progeny from both programmes seems promising.

In 1980, one of New Zealand's well-known judges went to judge in Victoria, Australia. There he saw Mrs. Silverside's *Silver Sabre* and was much impressed. He went back to Auckland, full of admiration for the Silver Aby. At the 1980 National Show, several judges were shown *Ayudhya Silver Sheena* (Gen-2). One judge, herself an Aby breeder, gasped when she saw *Sheena*: "She's beautiful. . .she IS an Aby — absolutely an Aby!" Lord knows what they thought that we, who have been really dedicated to the Abyssinian for so many years, were spending so much time and energy breeding! From that time, the attitude of the NZ Aby Club changed and, at the A.G.M. of the NZ Cat Fancy (1980) they, together with the Short Hair Cat Breeders Association, presented a list of breed numbers and a Standard of Points for five new Aby colours. The Breed Numbers now recognized in New Zealand are: — 23— Ruddy. 23A— Blue. 23B— Sorrel. 23C— Lilac. 23D— Sex-linked Red. 23G— Sex-linked Cream. 23S— Silver.

In 1981, the Silver Abyssinian was granted Challenge Status.

It has been a long, hard struggle for my husband, Hurle, and me but, thanks to the encouragement of the Genetic Advisory Council, the Short Hair Cat Breeders Association, the Abyssinian Cat Association of England, and to many individuals in England, Australia, the U.S.A and New Zealand, we can now see the day when the beautiful, elegant Silver Abyssinian will grace our show benches, and live in our hearts alongside the Ruddy, the Blue and the Sorrel Abyssinians.

Footnote: There are now three full register Silver Abyssinian kittens at *Ayudhya* Cattery — *Silver Paolina*, *Silver Lucinda* and *Silver Talisman*. (Add a "large Silver girl", born in April, after this Ms. arrived. _____ Editor.)

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Rae Rayner and her husband, Hurle, have been involved with cats since 1970 when they registered their prefix, *AYUDHYA*, first with Sealpoint Siamese and a red Abyssinian. Have bred mostly Abyssinian, specializing in reds. Best cats (show & breeding stock) have gone to Australia and most are now Grand & Double Grand Champions. One red, sent to Boston, USA quickly granded and was Best All-American Red Aby and CFF's 5th Best Cat. I did fall in love with a beautiful Siamese Seal Pt. boy, *Kelli Pacific Prince* (*Imp.Aust.*), only 9 months old. . .but his "difference" stood out. His owner told me he was imported from Australia, tho his Sire was a NZ cat, and he hadn't done a thing on the show circuit. The reason in my mind was he was too typey and refined as the NZ Siamese are much larger with a more rounded head than we show in the US. I would have loved to have brought back all their ear flares tho. . .stunning! Burmese was another breed quite unlike what we show in the States, and in colours ranging from Seal Tortie to Cream. The Orientals also had colour classes such as Blue Silver Tabby and Chocolate Tortie.

I attended a small show in Tauranga and met several judges and lots of cat people who happily gifted me with their handsome club badges. The show hall was situated at the local horseracing track. The view of the green hills, sheep grazing, and jockeys exercising their horses was just so different from the Arizona desert. The judging rules differ considerably. Only 1 male and 1 female can receive a Grand Challenge per show. It takes three of these to be a Grand Champion. The cats are judged only once. One judge will have LH Adults, another SH Adults, another Neuters/Spays and so on...and their claws need not be trimmed!! The exhibitor arrives at the show hall around 7 - 7.30 a.m. and has until 9 a.m. to groom, chat, organise and make sure their cats are comfortable. I LOVED the Siamese kneading their hotwater bottles. Cages are small, with white furnishings, no advertising or coloured drapes until after judging. Then the long wait until 1 p.m. or so (passed cheerfully with numerous cups of tea and snacks). It's strictly personal. . .and selfish. . .but I do prefer the American style of judging. But with all the spectators, and there are so many of them, 3 hours just flies by and I couldn't get close enough to my favourite cats for more admirations or a chat with their proud owners. But, as I said, *Vive la difference*. . .and a big THANK YOU to the breeders who drove me to other catteries, arranged sashes to exchange, introduced me to judges and judging procedures, took time out to chat and exchange views, and show me their LOVELY cats. . .
