The Siamese Cat Club strongly urges all its members when selling kittens to make every possible enquiry to ensure that the destination and ultimate home is a good one for the animal. This is especially important when sending out of the United Kingdom, for then there is no coming back, except through six months quarantine. Do not send your animals off into the blue, and do not send at all to the Far East. Those of us who have seen for ourselves how cats and dogs are treated by many of the orientals know that cruelty abounds that starvation and disease are rife Cats are kept in cages in America, and not the large open air cages that we in Britain confine our cats when they are not allowed full freedom. I quote from an American news letter about Siamese, 'In Florida, USA area, a kitten factory operates. One operation housed in two small rooms, crowded with cats in small cages. ... two brand new litters of babies were on display. Admission charge 75c for adults and 25c for children.'



I HAVE been asked to write on Blue Pointed Siamese, especially for the new-comer to this variety.

I am assuming that the newcomer will begin by purchasing a female BP kitten. It is of primary importance that this kitten should come from healthy parents, and come through from birth to full kitten-hood without any major set back, or any set back for that matter at all.

or any set back for that matter at all.

I never breed from any queen, no matter how good, which had a dead kit in her litter, or whose litters are uneven in the size of the kits. I will not tolerate runts. If a queen produces these faults, maled to different studs, I have her spayed at once. I have her spayed at once. I have followed this policy ever since I began to learn and have experience in breeding. Looking at my records I notice that it is nearly ten years since a queen produced a dead kit, and all my litters of four to seven kits are quite even in individual size, making equal progress up to eight weeks or so, when the difference in sex begins to show. It is heartbreaking and a waste of time and money to continue to breed from an unsound queen.

### Colour at birth

I advocate buying a female kitten of at least 3 months of age, bred from parents which are both Blue Pointed. A good kitten from a correct all BP mating is coloured white at birth, and should not, in my experience, develop a cloudy or dirty coat as it grows older. It should go right through to adolescence with a clear coat. This coat colour in the older kit is not the clear white shade as at birth, but is a faintly blue-white, a difficult shade to describe.

I never breed from a kitten or young adult which has what may be termed a 'whiter than white' coat, as I have found from experience that this ultra whiteness often becomes exceedingly dark in early maturity. In the same way I avoid a kitten with very deep points,

THETIS RENDALL as I have found that these can be a symptom of a dark coat in adolescence.

### Eve colour

Eye shade should be a very bright Eye shade should be a very bright wid blue, not the deep sapphire shade to be seen in the best SPs. When the standard for BPs was first drawn up the description given for eye shade was a 'bright china blue'. The word 'china' was changed about 1958, and 'wivid' was substituted, in my opinion a change for the better, though 'china' expressed what the earlier breeders felt should be aimed for in BPs.

aimed for in BPs.

Recently, in a club journal there was an article by an American breeder who stated that it was nonsense to try for the 'china blue' shade, and inferred that any shade would do, 'the deeper the better'. I beg to differ. The china or vivid blue required is a very difficult shade to breed. The shade tends to fall between a washed-out blue or a deep sapphire. I contend that when the correct shade is won, no other shade is so 'right' for the good BP.

Nature has a way of imposing a

Nature has a way of imposing a balance of colour for the Siamese. If one quality is strengthened, such as eye shade, the rest of the body colour and points tend to deepen also, to maintain this balance. I think the word 'china' was not altogether a good description of blue. I like to think of the shade of a clear sunny sky in Switzerland, over snow clad mountains.

### Body colour

Blue is a difficult colour to breed, and in Siamese it has a tendency to run all over the body. But this can be controlled by rigid selective breeding. For me the all blue coat is a greater

fault than too much fawn, a very ugly fault indeed, particularly when the entire coat is permeated. Unhappily it is a very common fault today. But this fault too can be controlled by correct breeding methods. I doubt whether the fawn can be entirely eliminated, especially in summer. In the young cat I think there will nearly always be slight shading along the lower part of the spine and upper thighs. With age this shading could change to blue, the body, chest, tummy and flanks remaining white.

I think one of the most important rules in breeding is to understand the strength and weakness of one's own stock. The newcomer having bought her streight and weakness of one's own stock. The newcomer having bought her first female kitten, will have to let her have at least two litters before being able to assess her queen's breeding potential. The advice usually given to a new breeder is to mate with a stud which is strong where the queen is weak. This advice is only permissible where it is possible to see some kittens sired by the stud under consideration, and to note whether or not he has the ability to hand on his good points. If this is not possible, and I liked the look of a certain male, I should prefer to use that male's sire, in the greater likelihood of the particular qualities being handed on to the queen.

### Breeding plans

Breeding in the widest sense is a long term process, I always make my breeding plans for a minimum of two years ahead. For the newcomer the first two litters from her queen are in the main experimental, as I have already said. After this I think the new breeder should take stock and decide where her chief interest lies, and whether she wishes to concentrate on improving

certain qualities. Having made her decision, she should hold to it stead-fastly, despite disappointments, for if she learns and observes her mistakes, a certain amount of success will surely come. It is very easy to become diverted off course, and to wander down bye lanes with no fixed idea, but always after some fresh idea which has little or no connection with the main plan.

after some fresh idea which has little or no connection with the main plan.

As is known I have a permanent idea fixed for the pale coat, and frankly have had to withstand quite a few diversionary ideas over the years, which would have led me into a blind alley, and also might not have given me the great interest and excitement of proving and disproving my many theories on producing and retaining a pale coated BP. I have proved for my own satisfaction that this pale coat can be produced by selective breeding and not usually by heredity. For example, a stud or brood queen which has very beautiful eye shade can hand this on to the majority if not all her progeny, even though the second parent may fail in this detail. But a very pale coated parent is unlikely to hand on the same degree of paleness when maled to a dingy coloured partner. But there is every possibility that at least one of the resulting kittens could show an improvement on the darker parent.

I think it is to be deplored that the

I think it is to be deplored that the various colours in Siamese are being interbred, for the most part quite indiscriminately. It may be necessary when trying to establish a new variety in colour to interbreed with those colours already stabilized, but otherwise, in my view the only method to improve all varieties of Siamese is to breed colour to colour But J report that breed colour to colour. But I regret that I must plead guilty in using another point colour to maintain and improve my own strain of BPs.

### Pale coats

Pale coats

For some years there has been a dearth of pale coated BP studs. Rather than use a male which failed to please me in this respect, I have been-experimenting with Lilac Points. In some ways I think it has been a mistake, but at least I have retained consistently a pale coat in my cats. The use of an LP must not be regarded as a short cut to the desired coat colour. The LP must be very carefully selected as many LPs throw very dark BP kittens. The selection can only be made by observation of the BPs thrown and by a test mating. By the end of this year I am hoping to finish using LPs of either sex, and to return to BP x BP breeding in the new year. From then I shall begin to breed out the LP, and hope to have, possibly, four generations of solid BP breeding in seven or eight years time. But plans can go awry.

Whatever the objective in breeding in

Whatever the objective in breeding, whether in the hope of contributing toward the improvement of the breed, for exhibition, or just for the pleasure of having kittens around, the time, trouble and expense, not forgetting the hard work, is the same for a good quality litter as a bad one. So I would urge the pet category of breeder to try to raise the best quality kittens possible. There is no reason that I can see why the neuter or spay which is not intended to grace the show pen, should not be an ornament to the breed and a pleasure to the eye. For the newcomer it can add to the interest to try to learn to have 'an eye' for a good cat.

On re-reading these notes I realize that much of what I have written will provoke profound disagreement. I must reiterate that I have written on results from planned breeding over more years than I care to remember, and many of these views and ideas will be found in other articles which have appeared in various journals, though some of these views have become more firmly entrenched as the result of continued experience. I have had two breaks in my breeding programme, a rather long one in recent years, and it takes time to pick up the threads. True breeding is really a line of continuity yet based on some repeat performances. Some beginners have success at the outset, but it requires knowledge and experience to develop the initial success into some-thing more lasting and ultimately more satisfactory. With cats it is a long road to build up a strain of generation following generation, but perhaps it is his length of time which creates its own pleasure and gratification, I wonder. Possibly rebbits or mice might have brought results more quickly, but probably with less happiness.



I WAS surprised at the virulence of the letter written by R G Silson (FUR AND FEATHER of May 22) as I presumed from what I had previously read that he was, if not a cat breeder, at least interested in them. Let us analyse the letter.

1: Miss Wilson was accused of dishonesty yet Miss Wilson was entitled to make on the Home Office figures.

2: What would R G Silson call a living death. Whilst death is inevitable its manner can vary. The life we live can also vary in its degree of happiness and satisfaction. Would R G Silson say that being kept in confinement and used for all kinds of medical experiment is not a living death. If not, what kind of life is it?

5: Animals are kept to a high standard. Naturally, they have to be. To be constantly subject to tests which affect their health. they must be healthy and strong. Can we presume that they are comforted and given affection by their ja

contented, something essential to all animals including human beings. If so, then these people are of the same breed which under the late Hitler experimented with human beings (for the good of humanity they claimed) but were also good husbands and fathers.
