Cats and Catdom

WHEN rational opposition dies out and is replaced by personal abuse, however courteous, the wise man consoles himself with the knowledge that his argument has been

won.
Nevertheless, it does appear that some of the arguments in favour of the abolition of prize arguments in favour of the abolition of prize money in open classes, however carefully explained, have not been assimilated by all readers. I therefore feel constrained to impose upon the editor's charity by asking for the little extra space needed to spell out some of the answers.

Before doing so, however, I must thank J N Stephens for the excellent letter which appeared in FUR AND FEATHER of February 26. It is of course the fact that the Longhair and Shorthair varieties cover a far greater number of classes than the Sia-

ary 26. It is of course the fact that the Longhair and Shorthair varieties cover a far greater number of classes than the Siamese, per capita, which has brought about the unfavourable financial position with respect to the two former categories.

In other words, it is absolutely certain that if the Longhair, Shorthair and Siamese entries are numerically equal at a given show, the balance of profitability will swing heavily in favour of the Siamese entries because they will be distributed among a far smaller number of classes. May we, for heaven's sake, be permitted to assume that everyone understands this obvious fact (sic). The main weeping and gnashing of teeth revealed by correspondents seems to arise from the inability to comprehend one or two extremely simple facts. First. The average persons exhibit in five or six classes. If prize money is withheld in the open class they will still be able to win it in the other classes. The exhibitor is therefore not being asked to give up all his potential prize money, but only 15—20 per cent of it (if he is an average exhibitor) and as little as 10 per cent of it if he shows in, say, ten classes. For this small sacrifice, willingly made by all sections of the Fancy alike (including the Siamese) we as a Fancy will be able to afford to do all those things which will make us financially viable; and be able to withstand the onslaught of commercial competition. Is this too much to ask our self-righteous critics and opponents?

opponents?

addition, because the new proposals will provide an increased cash fluidity for the show managements, we shall be able to divide our open classes into far more rational age and sex groupings; thus giving all exhibitors a much better chance of gaining the coveted open class awards. Finally, and for the same reason, we shall be able to engage more judges for each show, thus ensuring that our standard of judging is raised and that our overworked judges are treated with the compassion which they deserve.

Miss Cronin's article (Mar 12) is written in a pleasant and witty style. Nevertheless, I feel bound to rebuke her; first, for her excessive self-abnegation (St Augustine regarded it as a particularly insidious form of excessive pride) and secondly, for failing to distinguish between love of cats and love of coessif

love of oneself.
may be an arrogant cerebrotonic with a con-

fessed impatience toward the kind of stupidity which bursts unthinkingly into print; but let no one make the mistake of thinking that I do not know what it is to be poor. The golden spoon which I suckled at birth was ruthlessly torn out of my mouth by the Russian revolution which at the same time denuded my parents of every penny they had in the world. came to this country as a child of five; and my early years are more remembered for the kicks than for the ha'pence. Nevertheless, I feel no sympathy whatever for those who claim that the small additional burden which would fall upon them if prize money in open classes were abolished would frustrate their ability to love cats. It is a hypocritical argument. No one who truly loves cats would want to show them. The great majority of cats hate being shown even if good naturedly they put up with it. Nevertheless, we do it, because the breeding of pedigree stock requires an open market place, an open forum for competition and appraisal.

I feel sure that Barbara Cronin, honest lady that she is, will agree that were she to stop showing, it would in nowise prevent her from keeping, adoring and helping our feline friends. Furthermore, if Barbara were to run a couple of shows or judge at a few provincial shows, she would soon realise why it is that we need much more money in the Fancy.

This Fancy is made possible by the unselfish and incredible burden of work which show managers and judges alike are willing to undertake for virtually no remuneration. We do it for love of cats and love of the Fancy; and we don't enjoy being taken for granted and scoffed at when we ask for our burden to be fractionally lightened.

To lighten these burdens the clubs need to make more money from shows. This muchneeded money must and will come out of the pockets of exhibitors who collectively reap the benefit of our efforts, and the vast majority of whom appreciate this fact and rally around strongly whenever asked to do so. For the few who expect something for nothing (and the Welfare State seems to breed them like flies) if they cannot or will not pull their weight in the Fancy then the Fancy can well do without them. Let them go and be a burden to somebody else.



finally, for the benefit of those who apparently read only with extreme difficulty, may I stress once again that it Is the duty of the Fancy to provide open classes for all and every—I repeat, every—variety of cat. It is not, however, the duty of the Fancy to subsidise financially the owners of the less-popular varieties by paying out thirty shillings on classes with two entries. Considering the minute number of objections to our proposals it is obvious that nearly every-body recognises this simple and obvious fact; and those who for selfish reasons do not want to recognise it should either keep very quiet or else, equally quietly, transfer their patronage to another soup kitchen.

A FEW letters have appeared in FUR AND FEATHER lately which have made me feel very apprehensive. They have been written by judges to criticise other judges.

Apart from this procedure being very 'bad form' it should be remembered that judges act in an honorary capacity; in these days of increased breeding, bigger shows and more exhibitors, judges do not always have an easy time, all do their best but are often attacked by disgruntled people who think they could do better, but due to their arrogant attitude this is doubtful.

Exhibitors do not always recognise that their exhibits vary from show to show and although they may indeed be judges themselves they think that their cats and kittens have no faults although they know quite well that it takes very little to upset a cat. Bringing a stud to a show when he has a queen at home may make him irritable, taking a female from her kittens even if they are quite big, will be enough to upset the mother separated from them for many hours. Kittens may have mild upsets which though not infectious may make them look just that little bit 'off'.

A judge must take this into consideration when making awards. Siamese can change from one week to another very quickly. Cream LH's and SH's may suddenly show a

'hot' coat and particularly in the case of SH's will show markings on the coat and rings on the tail.

All judges make an occasional mistake for

All judges make an occasional mistake for no one is infallible. If a judge has given a high award at one show and then at another gives a different assessment owing to changes in the cat's coat or general condition) he or she, in justice to themselves and the exhibitors, are under an obligation to say why they have done so. The judge may even have seen fit to put down a cat to whom he or she had previously given a challenge certificate. Exhibitors can always ask a judge why he or she has made this or that decision.

Judges should close their ranks and help each other; if a judge really is incompetent he will not enter their exhibits in his or her classes. If judges are to be criticised in public let it be by other people, not by each other. ELIZABETH TOWE
