

QUARANTINE—THE CAT AND THE

HAVING read the recent correspondence on

HAVING read the recent correspondence on the quarantine regulations, I would also like clarification on this issue.

I have just had the misfortune to lose my beautiful Tabby Point queen, Champion Pitapat Baby Mink. The day after returning from a stud (unmated as she had gone off call) she lost her appetite and was sick. The next morning I called the veterinary surgeon who came in the afternoon and gave her an injection and some chloramphenicol capsules. She neither ate nor drank and the flesh

who came in the afternoon and gave her an injection and some chloramphenicol capsules. She neither ate nor drank and the flesh seemed to drop from her bones. During the night I saw her condition worsen. In the morning I was horrified to see her emaciated and dehydrated body. I immediately started to force-feed glucose, egg-white, and water and called the veterinary surgeon again. She was still vomiting and kept staggering to her water bowl and to the stream outside but seemed unable to drink.

When the veterinary surgeon came in the afternoon, he confirmed my worst suspicions. He diagnosed acute panleucopenia and gave little hope for her survival. She was treated but died the same evening, only 44 hours after the first symptoms. But she had been inoculated some ten months previously as a kitten against this disease.

My attempts to arrange a post-mortem were to no avail as it was the week-end, so when I attempted to obtain compensation from the firm manufacturing the vaccine I was told quite firmly that no compensation would be forthodming. What troubles me is that no-one has to my knowledge stated quite openly and clearly the degree of protection which

can be expected with the vaccines. What percentage of casualties do the manufacturers think of as reasonable?

Now to quarantine. My veterinary surgeon said that it would be quite all right to get another kitten—vaccinated of course—in about a month. I only have one other cat, a black and white moggie in excellent health. I read my cat literature and enquired from my friends. It is quite clear from the rules that I cannot show a cat for three months. It is not clear as to the period that I should quarantine myself. It is thought that viruses can only live for brief periods outside a host, but there is little evidence either way. I repeat Barbara Cronin's plea—will the GCCF give us precise instruction. Its all very well to say 'use your commonsense' but I know that some people's ideas of quarantine may differ from my own and I do not wish to be accused of spreading such a ghastly disease as I have experienced.

Furthermore, until some simple method is devised to detect carrier cats, both the quarantine rule and the clearance certificate are meaningless. My house was clear of FIE as soon as the cat was dead and destroyed, but does my one cat count as a cattery? (Rule 29).

Finally I do feel that the GCCF should adopt a more open-handed approach to the whole problem of publicity. There is a very real danger that a commercially run organization, by providing information, could influence the novices coming into the Fancy, in a manner detrimental to the welfare of the cat. At the request of the geneticist, Mr Roy Robinson, I agreed to keep and breed the two 'mutant-kittens'—the so-called 'silver fox kittens'. By so doing, I became temporarily a newsworthy subject.

The months have proved that these kittens' strange coats are probably due to a nutritional factor (as my veterinary surgeon said from the start) and not to a genetical mutation. The cost of keeping the cats and of building a new house and pen has been astronomical, but it was a worth-while project and one which I had promised to undertake.

It is time that cat-owners accepted that the CIC is a commercial firm whose aim is to sell its pet-foods. Originally, it started off badly, with appeals to housewives to 'breed cats for money.' The mistake of this approach was realised and the officials are anxious to receive advice. Surely it is better for anyone to be guided by the knowledge of our own experienced breeders.

Let us not fool ourselves. If we honestly wanted there to be no more tragic strays, then NONE of us would sell our stock for breeding.

OUR CAT CLUBS THE NATIONAL

THEY WORK UNTIRINGLY FOR YOU: THEY DESERVE YOUR HELP

THE CAT FANCY in Great Britain is controlled by the Governing Council of the Cat Fancy-a democratically elected body which does its work extremely well. Of course it comes in for criticism. The plain fact however is that the Governing Council has controlled the cat Fancy for sixty years with the collective wisdom of some of its greatest men and women. There have been ups and downs, there have been heated debates, but a sense of dignity and a devotion to the welfare of the cat has always pre-vailed. The Council has never run ahead as some people may have wanted it to do, but neither has it lagged behind, as others sometimes allege. The facts of its long history speak for themselves.

How did it begin? Let Kit Wilson tell the story, for who knows it better.

tell the story, for who knows it better.

'Before 1910 there had been two registering bodies, The National Cat Club and the Cat Club. The latter had been formed out of a feud within the National Cat Club at an earlier date. The National Cat Club at an earlier date. The National Cat Club, which was the earliest club, was founded in 1887 and reigned supreme until 1898, when some members headed by Lady Marcus Beresford founded The Cat Club And the same aims and origins as The National—that is, to promote the pure breeding of cats and to hold shows, also to keep a register of all pedigree cats.

'Here then was the situation, two clubs,

'Here then was the situation, two clubs, two registrations and one cat! Between the years 1900 and 1902 several other specialist and district cat clubs came into existence and several very excellent shows were staged by both leading clubs.

by both leading clubs.

'However, in 1904 or thereabouts The Cat Club came to an end, and The National again ruled supreme; but bad management and general unrest throughout the Fancy caused another upheaval in 1908, when eight clubs broke away from The National and formed The Cat Fanciers Association, and for two years the same old troubles ensued.

'Eapplere tiring of the Cilberties, estination

two years the same old troubles ensued.

'Fanciers tiring of the Gilbertian situation called a meeting in 1910 and the outcome was the formation of a recognised governing body to be called the Governing Council, and on The National Cat Club handing over its powers to this Council it was granted representation in perpetuity of four delegates. About fifteen clubs formed the original Council, but many of these have ceased to exist and others have taken their places.'

Today the Governing Council through its

exist and others have taken their places.'
Today the Governing Council, through its officials and delegates, its general secretary, Mrs W Davies, Dovefields, Petworth Road, Witley, Surrey, and other workers, deals with registrations, transfers, export certificates, certified pedigrees, issues a standard of points for all breeds, an annual list of cats at stud, controls the general running of shows so that the clashes which occurred years ago are now avoided, and issues challenge certificates which go to the making of champions. It is sometimes alleged that it is all done too quietly. The best and most lasting work often is.

But whilst the work of the Governing

But whilst the work of the Governing Council over the years has been—and still is —invaluable, no one would deny that a great deal of the success of the cat Fancy has come from the enthusiasm and the drive of breed clubs and show promoting societies. Much of this work is voluntary, a fact which cat breeders must never forget. But it is also highly professional.

highly professional.

These clubs have done more than care for the breeds—they have ensured the advance of the Fancy and the growing popularity of cat shows throughout the whole of the country. Much of the tremendous work involved is voluntary, though in many cases it has also become highly professional—which is as it should be. Mistakes may sometimes be made, but lessons are learnt from them.

Some of these clubs are very old. Mention has been made of the National. It was founded in 1887 and used to hold a two-day championship show at the Crystal Palace. The Palace went up in flames just two days before one of these events but with superhuman courage Mrs Sharman, the then show

manager, and her willing helpers, transferred the show to Paddington Baths, informed all exhibitors and, wonderful to relate, the show went on as if nothing had happened.

Present show manager of the National is our very capable Mrs Grace Pond who heads a team which puts on a supreme event toward the end of each year. (Next show November 20, 1970).

The Southern Counties is another old society (founded 1903) but the Midland Counties, though reformed in 1949 after a wartime lapse, can beat it in original formation by a year (1902).

Croydon Cat Club celebrated its golden jubilee a few months ago.

The show promoting societies and the breed clubs are deserving of everyone's support. Without them there would be no progress; indeed there would be no shows.

And the clubs do really offer value for money. They put on classes for their members, not only at their own shows but at others. They offer special prizes and have many other attractions.

many other attractions.

The breed clubs are the 'families' of the Fancy. Not only do they too, cater for their members with shows of their own, with sponsored classes at many other events, with rosettes for winning cats and kittens and with the offer of valuable trophies, but they also devote much attention to the more intimate side of the club with newsletters for members, organised trips to shows, tea

for members, organised trips to shows, tea parties and meetings.

It does far more than provide a most valuable collection of addresses: it gives YOU the opportunity to become a member of those clubs which have done so much for exhibitors in the past and will go on doing it with YOUR help.
