The Cornish Rex-

Such an affectionate breed

Malcolm Lauder

WHEN I was first asked to write an article on Cornish Rex, I knew very well that there were a great many breeders who could claim to be better qualified than I to fulfil such a task. However, I felt that it might be of interest to other members of the cat Fancy and to novices to read of some of my experiences of exhibiting and breeding, and possibly to help explain the real affection that someone such as I has developed for Cornish Rex cats in preference to other breeds.

three years ago, a fortune teller with a crystal ball had told me that within a short space of time I would be breeding Rex cats, I would have found some difficulty in believing it. Not only had cat breeding as such failed to manifest itself at that time as one of the burning ambitions of my life, but also I would not have had the slightest idea what was meant by Rex cats. Having said that, I could not now possibly deny that I came into the cat Fancy by chance. Not that my accidental introduction has proved to be any the less interesting or exciting; on the contrary.

t would be as well to explain at this point that as a freelance graphic designer, I was offered in 1970 a Cornish Rex kitten called Patshull Black Oedipus in lieu of a design fee. The sire was the first Rex that I had ever seen. I was fascinated and very impressed with his crisp, curly coat. I took a little while to make up my mind but I eventually decided to accept, thinking that he would make a curious and interesting animal to have as a pet. In my innocence I little realised just in how much time, effort, not to say money that small, black curly bundle was to involve me.

curly bundle was to involve me. le made quite an impact when I took him home, with the novelty of his hair style. I felt that my decision was already more than justified. My wife and I had agreed that he ought to spend the first few nights in the comparative safety of our bedroom, removed from the machinations of our two half-Slamese, Suki and Samantha, who had up to that time held sway as twin black queens of the household and who would have made short work of any newcomer. short work of any newcomer.

short work of any newcomer.

It wasn't until after a week, and having got accustomed to his burrowing right to the bottom of the bed, that waking to the sound of the alarm clock didn't bring us face to face with the ominous possibility of our finding him as stiff as a board and suffocated to death. We should of course have learned from Suki and Samantha that all cats are more clever at getting utterly more comfortable than are we humans. Needless to say, he soon grew sufficiently large to impress upon his feline companions the importance of his presence, and the idea slowly began to grow in our minds that perhaps he just might be good enough to show.

Having made inquiries, I discovered that the next show was to be that of the Kensington Kitten and Neuter Cat Club. I sent for an entry form and immediately made the most obvious demonstration of my total ignorance of procedure by entering Oedipus in only one class. A telephone call from the show manager, Mrs Barron, soon rectified my error and it was with a certain amount of nervousness and bleary eyes that we eventually arrived at the hall on the morning of the show. It wasn't so much that we had had to get up particularly early to get there in time, but that we had spent almost the entire evening before the show polishing and brushing his coat and making sure that he would be as perfect as possible. We didn't know exactly where the hall was, but it didn't matter too much because it seemed as if most of Westminster must have been able to pinpoint the presiste the services. because it seemed as if most of Westminster must have been able to pinpoint the precise position from the volume of miaows and howls coming out of the long line of cat baskets at the entrance. Oedipus had soon joined the chorus with even more gusto than he had used to voice his comments of displeasure on the journey to which we had subjected him.

We felt very self-conscious and a bit out of place until we got into conversation with a couple next to us in the queue. They were very kind and explained the procedure of vetting-in when they learned that it was

our first show. We still felt a bit lost when we finally got into the show hall, but it was gratifying to find how friendly people was gratifying to find now friendly people were and how quickly we were accepted. A great deal is said in private, more rarely in public, about the hypocrisy and political manoeuvring that exists in the cat Fancy, but I always try to remember my first impression that the Fancy is made up of a dedicated group of enthusiasts who are working towards the improvement and the well-being of cats.

We didn't expect too much after having seen the strong competition. We were therefore doubly thrilled to find on our return from lunch that Oedipus had won not only his open class but a couple of other firsts and in addition had been nominated for best in show Short-hair kitten. Even though he didn't win the supreme honour of best in show, we took him home in triumph that evening, not really aware that this had been just a first small step along the road. It became apparent as we went to further shows that some male cats can become transformed from a gentle and affectionate Dr Jekyll in the home to a raging monster of a Mr Hyde in the show hall. There are of course many cats which seem to enjoy being shown, but stewarding has taught me that there are a great many that are temperamentally unsuited to it.


It seems such a pity that any cat should be
subjected to the stress of being exhibited
and the possibility of being exposed to
infection. But shows are a necessary evil,
as Dr Raleigh has pointed out; without
them the cat Fancy would not, could not
exist. However, patience and fortitude
proved to be virtues, and it was with great
relief to us that Oedipus eventually won
the third challenge certificate which made
him a champion.

Meanwhile he had matured into an adult, well-muscled boy with an enormous appetite and a growing tendency to spray on the curtains, walls and my work. It became clear that arrangements would have to be made rapidly to provide him with his own quarters. And so we began the difficult and expensive task of building his stud house. We had decided to keep him as a stud because it seemed a pity to have him neutered when it was apparent that he might perhaps contribute his beautiful coat to succeeding generations of Cornish Rex. succeeding generations of Cornish Rex.

In this we were encouraged and helped by Alison Ashford, who we had met at one of our first shows, and who we discovered lived quite near to us. We were very pleased to accept an invitation to visit her home we were impressed with the good health and high quality of her cats and the love and care that was spent on them that we resolved to the ned or well to be a cattern. and care that was spent on them tha we resolved to try and emulate her achieve

Constructing the stud house and run was something of a minor miracle. By no stretch of the imagination could I be considered as the world's greatest expert at 'Do-It-Yourself'. It took the combined efforts of a local odd-job man, a helpful brother, constant expressions of forebodings

thad been hard. The most difficult part,
which I had rather foolishly decided to
tackle myself, had been the laying down
of the vinyl floor covering. I had calculated
that to be on the safe side, bearing in
mind Oedipus's previous accomplishments,
it should extend two feet from the floor on
each wall. With the dimensions of the
stud house being seven by five feet, it
meant a titanic struggle with a piece of
floppy material measuring twelve by nine
feet which seemed to have a mind of its
own, and which positively refused to go
where I wanted it.
hat job alone involved the expenditure of

wnere I wanted it.

That job alone involved the expenditure of two hours time and enough nervous energy to run a marathon race. Not only that, but any hope of buying a piece of vinyl with a plain, cool colour and no pattern had been dashed within seconds of seeing the selection on offer in the shop. The piece with which I staggered out, although the least offensive, still looked like the product of a deranged mind.

withing up glass-fibre insulation wrapping on
the underside of a wooden ceiling is also
an occupation not recommended to those
faint of heart and short of temper. After
that it was fairly straightforward, hammered fingers and frayed nerves notwithstanding. The result was not exactly the
last word in elegance, but it was warm,
dry and suited Oedipus very well.
had by this time realised that any idea of

had by this time realised that any idea of had by this time realised that any idea of making money out of cat breeding would be doomed to failure. But the realisation itself was cathartic and enabled me to see the whole situation with a good deal more perspective. The major difficulty that breeders of Cornish and Devon Rex face is that both breeds have been subjected to some unfortunate publicity at a time when intelligent and honest coverage would have some unfortunate publicity at a time when intelligent and honest coverage would have

intelligent and honest coverage would have helped so much to establish them. The way in which the Press and television have unfairly seized upon and publicised the hairlessness of some of the earlier Devon Rex in particular has done a tremendous amount of harm. It has become the responsibility of the few Rex breeders and their two specialist clubs to do what they can to redress the balance in these difficult circumstances by exhibiting only their best stock and by ensuring that Rex cats get some good publicity for a change. They are such hardy animals and so affectionate that they deserve far greater popularity than they enjoy at present.

is unfortunate that breeders generally find it very difficult or even impossible to recoup the enormous expense involved in raising Rex cats, particularly when one learns of the high prices which Rex kittens fetch in the USA and the huge stud fees which American breeders charge. However, have no recrets that cale in convert and I have no regrets that cats in general, and Cornish Rex cats in particular, have become such an important part of my life.

There can be few more perfect settings for a show than Malvern

IN PAST YEARS I have always been an exhibitor at the West of England and South Wales Cat Society's Championship Shows. It was an exciting change to be 'on the other side of the fence'—as a judge!

There can be few more perfect settings for a here can be few more perfect settings for a show than Malvern, a beautiful old town that still retains an almost mediaeval atmosphere. (This also applied to the train services and the station conditions which were, to put it mildly, Victorian!) From the point of view of warmth and position, the Winter Gardens Pavilion was an ideal show hall. Unfortunately it was not really large enough to accommodate the vast crowds of visitors.

In the afternoon entrances and exits became a real problem. I felt that there should have been a separate exit. When I mentioned this to Mrs Olive (co-show manager with Mrs Roberts) she explained that recently a cage bird show had been held at the Pavilion and hundreds of people forced an unpaid entry into the hall through the exit door, so such an exit was obviously impracticable.


Some exhibitors complained that they had a very long walk from the official car park to the hall, but this was unavoidable. (I am still wondering what happened to the exhibitor who had the temerity to park on double yellow lines, as announced over the microphone. At that time the police were after his blood!) were after his blood!)

However, one can have nothing but praise for the way in which Mrs Olive, Mrs Roberts and their committee managed the show. There were nearly 500 exhibits which to me seems the ideal number for an all-breed show, but which nevertheless must be a real heartene to manage. heartache to manage.

Especially impressive was the entrance and foyer with a beautifully clear painted board foyer with a beautifully clear painted board which gave directions as to where each breed could be found, instructions not to touch the cats and (most important to visitors) the reasons WHY cats should not be touched. This is a really important point, as so often the general public's reaction to the words 'Do not touch' is to say 'Why? I'm not afraid of being bitten.'

The two star attractions for the public were Jason, 'Blue Peter's' cat, and Poppy the Puma, the fabulous 3½-month-old puma Jason, 'Blue Peter's' cat, and Poppy the Puma, the fabulous 3½-month-old puma owned by Helen Humphreys and occupying place of honour in a decorated pen in the foyer. Mrs Humphreys told me that this puma cub had been rejected by her mother at hirth and had been hand-reared by bottle. Apparently she has the run of Mrs Humphreys' house and plays with her children. I was allowed to cuddle Poppy and her only reaction was a deep-throated rumbling purr. rumbling purr.

Prominent amongst the younger visitors were children wearing the distinctive uniforms of Malvern and Cheltenham colleges. These



youngsters took an especially keen interest in the newer breeds of pedigree cats and were asking searching questions on the genetics of some breeds. Here, obviously, are tomorrow's cat breeders!

are tomorrow's cat preeders!

Throughout the show both Mrs Olive and Mrs Roberts maintained a smilling serenity which could not have been easy. John Furber (who is recovering from a nasty burn on his hand) made an ideal announcer, as did the show managers. None of them raised their voices but every word could be heard. I was also delighted that they advised the public not to applaud the Best in Show exhibits, as this is so distressing to the cats. to the cats.

Every judge to whom I spoke was grateful to the show managers for the clearly marked judges' books, and the way in which each judge's task was made as easy as possible. It was especially cheering to find light trolleys marked with each judge's name, instead of those awful heavy tables!

Judges also appreciated the fact that their travelling expenses were paid in cash during the show. I had thought that this was an innovation when Mrs Pring was able to do it, but Mrs Roberts explained that they have in fact been able to do it for the past five years!

xhibitors were obviously delighted with their
Open class awards—a rosette for first
prize winners and all cats in Champion of
Champions classes, and a beribboned shield
for second and third prize winners. Open
classes have certainly been made more
exciting from the viewer's point of view
during recent years. This is, of course,

do not believe that cat-owners should disdo not believe that cat-owners should dis-regard the advice of their veterinary surgeon. Nevertheless I am convinced, through the recent experience of a close friend, that on a very few occasions one has to seek a second opinion. In my friend's case, her two eight-year-old Siamese developed cat 'flu during the two weeks they were in boarding kennels. (Once again this is the same sad story of about a dozen cats sharing one large shed when infection through shared air is inevitable.)

is soon as my friend brought the cats home she asked her veterinary surgeon to examine the cats. He diagnosed cat 'flu and injected the cats, saying that he would see them again in two days' time. The cats lay and sneezed for the next two days, refusing all food and drink. At the veterinary surgeon's next visit he repeated the injections and my friend asked if she should force-feed the cats. The answer was 'No—let nature take its course.' These cats were seen on alternate days for ten days, in gradually worsening states, yet always my friend was advised not to force-feed them. Unfortunately she did not telephone me until the tenth day, when she described the cats as being emaciated, with skin and fur that had lost all elasticity. As soon as my friend brought the cats home

This is a certain sign of dehydration. With even a fairly mild dehydration (due to dribbling and sneezing as well as to lack of fluid intake) the whole metabolic balance of a cat's body is upset and this often becomes irreversible.

At this stage I could only beg my friend to make up a solution of glucose and water with a pinch of salt in it, and to carefully spoon-feed this to each cat, making certain that the fluid went OVER the tongue and not underneath, when it would have been breathed in, causing 'inspiration' pneumonia.

also advised my friend to ask her veterinary surgeon to administer glucose saline by injecting it under the cats' skins. Given in this way, fluid is absorbed fairly rapidly into the cat's system. Her veterinary surgeon agreed to do this, but alas! it was too late. Both cats had become too weak and they died during the next six hours. My friend says that she will never have another animal. Neither she, her husband, nor her little boy, would risk another heart-break.

Patchy shading in Tortie Point Siamese

I READ Mrs Wagstaff's letter on Tortie Point Siamese with interest and sympathy. It echoes the sentiments of many of the Red Point and Tortie Point Siamese Cat Club members.

The main criticisms from judges during the Ine main criticisms from judges during the last year seem to have been patchy shading on the back. But of course a cat with patched points will also have patched shading. Judges also seem to penalise cats with quite limited shading, when they accept a Seal Point with far more darkening on the back.

a Sear Point With Tar more darkening on the back.

Colour and its distribution does seem to cause confusion. A well known Siamese judge criticised a blue Tortie as follows: presumably a blue Tortie, of good type but rather patchy on the face and body'. This statement is quite contrary to the standard of points which allows patching or mingling in all colours, and not mingling only as for LH Blue-Creams. Comments like these occur frequently in FUR AND FEATHER and asclub secretary I always try to take up such points with judges—in person if possible.

I would suggest that any exhibitor who is not satisfied with the judging of Tortie Points should always discuss the matter quietly with the judge concerned to find out the exact reason why a challenge certificate has been withheld or a cat has not done as well as expected. Very often the exhibitor finds that they can have no complaint with the judging.

I would like to make comment on another point which is also mentioned in the same issue. Dr Raleigh states that the exhibits at the Siamese Cat Club show were not as high as he would have wished and he suggests that this is caused by experimental breeding of Siamese.

This sort of statement is becoming very common. But I wonder if there is any real truth in this idea? It would require a very careful study of pedigrees over several generations to justify such ideas and I doubt if any concrete evidence would be found. I think perhaps the fact that there were two

Experimental Siamese

DR RALEIGH commented on the low standard of exhibits at the 1972 Siamese Cat Club show, and stated that experienced breeders blamed this on experimentally bred Siamese. Mrs Kent made a similar remark. I presume they referred to Tabby, Tortie and Red Points. Siamese TYPE in Britain is judged on a common standard of points for all colours and patterns. The best exhibit at this show was a Red Point male, and first and second places for Champion of Champions went to Tabby Points, against all comers, so I hardly think these varieties could have contaminated the 'pure' Siamese.

Anyone who is familiar with pedigrees of

Anyone who is familiar with pedigrees of the cats at this show will be aware that very few of the Seal, Blue, Chocolate or Lilac cats had either Tabby, Tortie or Red Siamese in their pedigree.

Although not a member of the Seal Point Siamese Cat Club, I have bred more Seal Points than any other colour and recommend, if there really is a lowering of standards among them, that Seal Point breeders follow the sound breeding principles used by Tabby and Red Point Siamese breeders to improve the situation

and Red Point Siamese breeders to improve the situation.

Personally, I think the Seal standards are as high as ever, and always use them as a yard-stick when producing 'experimentally' bred Siamese, including self-coloured cats of Siamese TYPE. MAUREEN SILSON.

Readers may remember that in 1970 I was unfortunate enough to lose six cats and kittens with feline infectious peritonitis. My veterinary surgeon sent me to the Small Animal Centre of the Animal Health Trust at Kennett to see Mr Wilkinson who is not only a very good veterinary surgeon but has helped cats through the FAB for many years and isdoing his best to eradicate this dreadful disease. Unfortunately my cats were not cured because as yet there is no cure. The staff at Kennett are all dedicated to the health and well being of animals and every care is lavished on patients and kindness and understanding extended to the distraught owners.

My beloved Angelique was eventually put to sleep when life became a burden—I offered a post-mortem but insisted on having her body for burial. Being an undertaker's grand-daughter I inspected her body. She was in perfect condition—stitched and laid like a perfect toy. I have no doubts at all that they not only did their best for my cats but for everyone elses as well.

One year later dear little Greymantle died of lymphus sarcoma. I telephoned Dr Crighton who as usual was most understanding and agreed to do a PM to ensure that there was no FIP. Mr Wilkinson did the post mortem after which bacteriology tests and three lots of histology tests were run. This is all 'research' but Greymantle had died in the comfort of her own home after three weeks home nursing and my veterinary surgeon's daily treatment.

We should be grateful that we have the dedicated few and I feel sure that apart from not having the inclination I doubt if they have the funds to do anything 'daft'.

Insufficient is known about cat diseases and those of us who have been to Kennett trust and encourage their work, it is for our cats' benefit in the end. ANN EMMOTT (Mrs), Bishops Stortford.

Some catteries on the continent may unfortunately be described as 'cat-Bergen-Belsens', real concentration camps, where the cats are housed in small pens in the loft or in cellars, excluded from daylight and without fresh air and insufficiently fed. It sounds unbelievable but it is true. Some males are kept indoors in cages. Some catteries are filthy and full of germs; some house far too many animals which are thus derived far too many animals which are thus deprived of the necessary attention and individual care and control. In other catteries kittens die one after another.

It is most advisable to wait a bit before you export a cat or kitten in order to get the necessary reliable information. Check it. Inquire with your cat-care committee or with reliable people in the cat Fancy or abroad. In the end, money is not so important as the health and happiness of the cats we love.
